Clubs Assured of Support—Full assurance that no enemies of the Broadway bridge would be allowed to work against it through the Oregon representatives to the United States senate was given a committee from the push clubs of the city by United States Senator George E. Chamberlain in a conference in the senator's office yesterday. Delegates from the Northeast Side Improvement association, the North Albina Push club and the United East Side Push clubs attended the meeting and many of the members spoke to the senator, telling him of the needs of the city. Judge M. G. Munly, president of the Northeast Side Improvement association and of the United East Side Push clubs, headed the committee.

Must Work on Bookplate—In his crusade against men living on the earnings of immoral women, Municipal Judge Bennett is giving the maximum penalty where such cases are well proven, and this morning gave Ray Elliott 90 days on the rock pile, and a fine of \$100. He was charged with accepting money from Jessie Raymon, who was arrested at 204 Clay street by Police Detectives Hellyer and Maloney. She is 30 years old, and stated that she has given Elliott \$15 a week for the past two years. Elliott claimed to own a restaurant at San Francisco worth \$3000, and said that he has not worked since coming to Portland two months ago.

To Adopt Bertillon System—A regulation Bertillon system and finger print identification method will be adopted by the Portland police department. In connection with this a photographer's outfit will also be installed. Chief of Police Cox has placed this in his estimate for the annual appropriation and feels that it is something the department has long needed. The expense of the three new features will be \$800. Police Detective Hunter has returned from Oakland and San Francisco, where he has been studying the system, and will have charge of the bureau.

Schlewe Leaves City—By a hasty departure from the city, Adolph Schlewe avoided an appearance before Judge Bromough in the juvenile court yesterday afternoon. He had been served with a citation to answer charges that he beat his 14-year-old son with a broomstick, the father having been on a spree for some time before. Some of the neighbors saw the affair, and Schlewe evidently decided that departure was the best plan for him. He is supposed to have gone to San Francisco. The boy is at the detention home and the case was continued for future action.

The positions draw salaries of \$1200 to \$1500, \$250 a month and expenses and \$1200 to \$3000 a year respectively. A number of vacancies exist in each branch. "What we need is a peace conference that will promote peace," said William A. Jamieson, Cleveland, Ohio, at the Oregon today. "War is too terrible to speak of without a shudder. If nations would quit spending the people's money on armies and navies and use it toward aiding humanity, there would be a different people here on this earth. Peace belongs to civilized countries. Only brutes fight."

BOOTLEGGERS MUST DO TIME IN JAIL

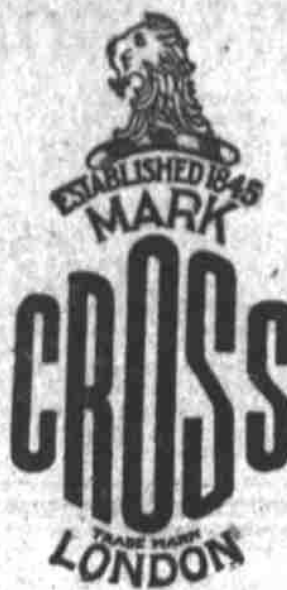

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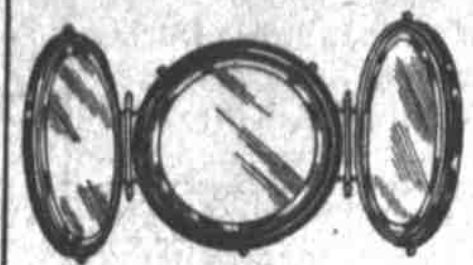
