

WIFE ADMITS SHE ROBBERS KILL SLAPPED HUSBAND WHEN OPPOSED

Mrs. Hallack Gives Her Two Thugs Secure Much Version of Domestic Trouble. Cash From Hotel and Shoot Three Men.

Stoutly maintaining that her husband was the one who taught their baby boy to crave the taste of beer and denying that she was to blame for the fact that two of her children died from drinking poison left within their reach, Mrs. Cora D. Hallack yesterday afternoon told a detailed story of her domestic troubles in Judge Gatens' department of the circuit court.

Mrs. Hallack explained how the boy, Chester, crawled over a table and drank concentrated beer while she was in another part of the house for a moment, and how another child, Violet, drank the contents of a bottle of carbolic acid that she placed far back on a shelf while she was away from the house for a few minutes. The fatal drink was taken in each case, she said, under circumstances that could not be foreseen.

The witness admitted that she had slapped her husband, Manuel Hallack, at times and that she also called him bad names. She said she did so because he teased and tantalized her beyond the point of endurance. She said that he cursed her, too, but he always spoke in a low tone, while she gave her opinion of him in a voice loud enough for other roomers to hear.

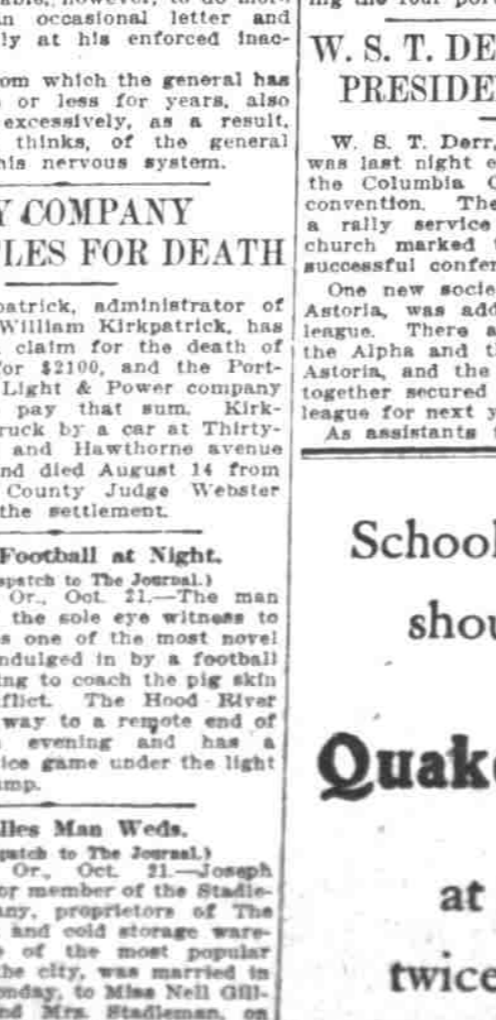
