

# GLORY THIRST MODERNIZES NIPPON

Old Japan Rapidly Passing With Ambition to Become World Power—Western Scenes on Every Hand—Tourists Wanted.



Has full of enthusiastic and determined woman suffragists starting from Kingsway, England, for a campaign tour. Washington, Oct. 21.—Legends have been written and anecdotes told to illustrate the futility of the efforts of the Westerner who would hustle the East, but here in Japan the East is hustling itself. The hustle is so great, the expense so heavy, the future so problematical, that the world is asking itself what is next upon the program of the Japanese and whether this "plunge" among the nations will not meet with crushing reverses.

Since this country became conveniently near to the west through the improved transportation facilities that resulted from its doors being opened to the world's trade and travel, the island empire has been the happy hunting ground of the tourist who has a penchant for the picturesque. Some of the picturesqueness of Japan is being destroyed as the country is being reconstructed in the image of its advanced neighbors over seas. This is causing those who loved the Japan of a generation ago because of its quaintness to lament. There is also material for the ruthless westerner in some of the methods adopted by the Japanese to attract the attention of the tourist to the "sights" of the country.

Hotels Provide Baths Now. Tokio and Yokohama, it is true, are cursed with hotels which have the western vice of charging stiff prices to the tourist for the oriental fault of providing third rate accommodation, but neither Tokio nor Yokohama is Japan. In most of the other cities and small resorts frequented by the traveling public the hotels meet the requirements of the westerner much more fully than those of any other part of the east with the exception of the few awakened spots in China. A few years ago the Japanese mind could not conceive of a

same person getting into a tub of cold water in the morning. The result of this idiosyncrasy was that the most elaborate instructions looking to the preparation of the medicinal cold tub resulted in the water being tepid. A little further back in Japanese history filling a tub with fresh water for each tubber was considered unnecessary. Nowadays the newest hotels provide tub and shower baths, with hot or cold water at all hours for all and sundry, and rooms are equipped with stationary washstands. Japanese hotel men have sent representatives to America—whence come the majority of the visitors to this country—to learn what is required of first class hostellers.

Real Dining Car Service. Japanese trains, upon the important railroad lines, are equipped with dining cars conducted upon the most modern and western plan. Upon these cars one may have a five course dinner for one yen—the equivalent of a half dollar in America—and each dish is cooked to order. It is true that the portions are small, but the dinner is sufficient and it is as well cooked as it would be in New York or Paris.

"Riksha" Here to Stay. Japanese trains are still slow, as compared to the fast American or Canadian trains, but they almost invariably make their scheduled time and rates of transportation are low. The least satisfactory mode of conveyance to the westerner to whom its novelty has ceased to appeal, is the riksha—the gift of an American missionary to the Orient. The "riksha," which had its origin in a man power vehicle arranged for the accommodation of an invalid, and which is now used as far from Japan as Ceylon, strikes the new arrival in Japan as being cheap at the price. It is upon the contrary quite expensive. The minimum fare for a ride in the riksha is as much as a streetcar fare in the United States, and the "riksha" coolie's objection to anything but a short haul is such that a rate of 20 cents a mile for a slow vehicle is about what is paid, and where there is a sharp upgrade one must walk, hire a coolie to push, or feel ashamed of himself. But the riksha is an institution between Yokohama and Colombo, and it will doubtless remain so.

For the visitor who prefers to live in Japanese style there are still plenty of hotels where one may sit on the floor to drink tea and eat his dinner, and sleep on the floor with an uncomfortable thin slice of bedding between himself and the boards. One has only to dodge the smart hotel runner with the label on his cap to find his way to one of these native places of public entertainment where he may enjoy "Japanese life" and aching joints to his heart's content.

Tourist Business Is Good. The revenues Japan is deriving from an increasing stream of tourists, both in the expenses of travel in this country and in the business done by merchants with visitors, constitutes an item by no means negligible. To encourage the continuance and expand the growth of the business of catering to the tourist, the habits of his kind are being intelligently studied, and means of entertaining him are being improved from year to year. One no longer makes the pilgrimage to Nikko by riksha or in a chair. Upon arriving in this sacred city at a prosaic railroad station, instead of approaching it gradually through the cathedral dimness of an avenue of giant cryptomeria trees, he finds several solid blocks of tawdry curio shops interspersed between the station and the splendid lacquered temples. But he may stop at a modern hotel where he dines de rigueur and dines as well as he would in an European or American capital. If he prefers, he may get discomfort around the corner in a Japanese hotel just around the corner. But wherever he goes in Japan he will find the east a hustling.

ALLEGED MURDERER WORKED AS BELLBOY. (United Press Leased Wire.) Pacific Grove, Cal., Oct. 21.—After evading the authorities for 18 months, Alvin Karpis, alias Sam Phillips, wanted in Hyden, Ky., for the shooting of John Sizs Moore in March, 1908, has been located at Delmonte, where for some time he has been working as a bell boy. Sheriff Nantz and Deputy Early who arrived at Monterey Tuesday from Hyden, have left with Karpis from Kentucky, where he will be placed on trial. The shooting is said to have been the outcome of a mountain feud and was the direct result of Karpis' quarrelling with Moore over the latter's pretty sister.

Former Portlander Killed. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Dayton, Wash., Oct. 21.—News of the accidental killing of William Middlemass, former Portland railroad man and a son-in-law of L. E. Harris of Dayton, near Marysville, Cal., last Thursday has been received by relatives here. Meager details received by telegraph ascribe death to a railroad wreck, in which Mr. Middlemass received injuries from which he died shortly. Mrs. Middlemass, who was with friends in Portland, has gone to San Francisco. The body will not be brought to Dayton. Middlemass was employed with a railroad company in California. He married Miss Harris, daughter of L. E. Harris, one of the first settlers in eastern Washington and a retired business man of Dayton.
