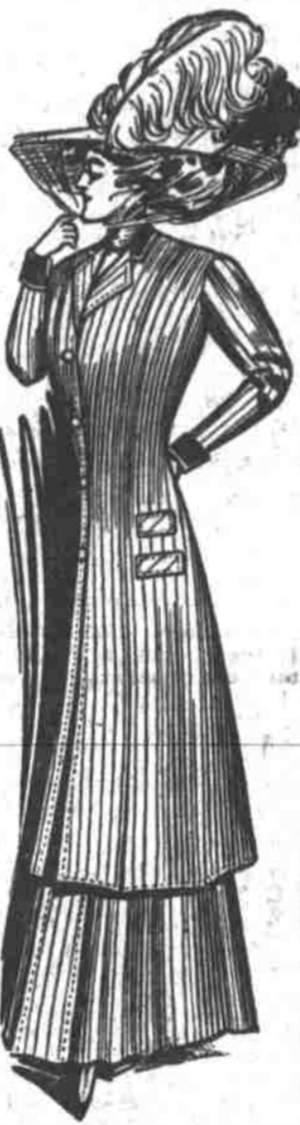

YAQUI INDIANS GREATLY ABUSED

Mexicans Took Their Lands and Sold Them as Slaves, It Is Said.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Oct. 21.—John Kenneth Turner's second article on "Barbarous Mexico," which will appear tomorrow in the current issue of the American Magazine, declares that the Yaqui Indians, generally supposed to have been marauders and murderers, were originally the best workers in Mexico and would have been a sturdy and thrifty people had not the Mexican officials driven them to war through plots to dispossess them of rich lands in southern Sonora.

The article will say they were taken "prisoners of war" and sold into slavery at \$55 each.

Turner quotes a Mexican colonel who said he had sold nearly 16,000 slaves in the past three years, receiving \$10 himself for each one, besides getting the lands of the prisoners, the rest of the purchase price going to the government.

Among other things in his article Turner says: "For 24 years the only governors of Sonora have been Ramon Corral, who is now vice president of Mexico; Rafael Yasabel and Luis Torres. These men have rotated in office and the people of Sonora had no choice in their selection. These three men had to answer only to President Diaz and their authority was practically absolute."

Quoting Teresa Urrea Cabora, a highly educated Mexican woman historian, Turner says the war was begun against the Yaquis at the instance of a pair of officials who wanted to grab rich lands. In this connection the article says: "Took Yaqui Money and Land. The officials saw a great opportunity for graft in bringing soldiers into the state, who continually harassed the Yaquis. Bogus surveys were sent throughout the Yaqui valley to mark the lands and tell the people that the government had decided to give it to foreigners. Eighty thousand dollars belonging to Chief Cabora was illegally confiscated from a bank. When the chief complained, armed men were sent to bring about his arrest. They could not find the chief, so they burned Cabora's house and the homes of his neighbors, and assaulted the women."

Even Calame's wife was not spared, and finally the victims were graded into war.

Fighting for 24 Years. "Since that day, 24 years ago, Mexico has kept an army of from 2400 to 6000 men in the field against the Yaquis. Thousands of soldiers and tens of thousands of Yaquis have been killed. Finally, in 1894, the government took the land belonging to the Yaquis and gave it to General Lorenzo Torres and the deportation of the Yaquis to the Yucatan henequen plantations began about four years ago. "It was a common practice to force a Yaqui wife to marry a Chinaman. The official explained this practice by saying that the Chinamen were better satisfied with conditions than the Yaquis and were not likely to run away from their wives."

RAILROAD STARTS BOOM IN IDAHO

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Nampa, Idaho, Oct. 21.—Much interest in railroad building prevails in southwestern Idaho because of the railroad that is to be built along the south side of Snake river from Buhl, in the Twin Falls section, to connect with the main line of the Short Line at Nysa, the first station on that road after it enters Oregon. Three large crews of surveyors are at work a short distance up the river from Nysa. Surveyors from the Buhl end of the new line have reached as far as Grand View, in Owyhee county.

The railroad as proposed will open the immense tract of land to be reclaimed in Owyhee county known as the Brunson segregation, which includes about 60,000 acres of the best of the Snake river valley lands of the state. Real estate values are soaring and there is a great deal of buying.

Degree of Honor Meets.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Oct. 21.—The semi-annual convention of the Degree of Honor of this district, consisting of Lane, Linn, Marion and Benton counties, began in the A. O. U. W. hall this afternoon with a fairly good attendance. The first session was called to order at 2 o'clock by Mrs. J. A. Shaw, the president, with Mrs. O. A. C. Archibald, district secretary, in charge of the minutes. The semi-annual election of officers will take place today and the next meeting place will be selected.

Yakima Man Buys Farm.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Walla Walla, Or., Oct. 21.—C. W. Moore of North Yakima, Wash., has purchased the Couch & Bost farm on Bear creek. The place consists of 210 acres and the price paid was \$12,000. Mr. Moore's son will move here and reside on the place, using it for a dairy ranch.

FATHER JUMPED CHILD ON CACTUS

Maud H. Lambert Recites Many Woes in Divorce Action.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Oct. 21.—Maud H. Lambert, through her attorney, B. S. Martin of Brownsville, has filed a divorce suit against her husband, Frank Lambert. The plaintiff states that her husband has always treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner and offenses made her do a man's work. They were married in 1893 in Iowa and later removed to Montana. It was while in Montana, Mrs. Lambert alleges that her husband made her dig a cellar and when she fell sick, refused to secure medical aid for her. When a storm came and the house was surrounded by water she was abandoned, she averts, and forced to wade through the water and carry her two children to higher ground. While drunk, Lambert pointed a gun at her, and would have shot but for the intervention of a sister. The plaintiff also states that Lambert took one of the children, bar-jointed and jumped it up and down in a cactus plant.

ROBBERS GETS \$1000 FROM WISCONSIN BANK

(United Press Leased Wire.) MINNEAPOLIS, Wis., Oct. 21.—Armed robbers are securing the surrounding country for five masked men who last night robbed the State bank here and escaped with \$1000. Shortly before noon a report reached here that the bandits had been surrounded in the woods near Hasehurst, five miles from here. Thirty shots had been exchanged between the posse and the highwaymen, and although the robbers escaped injury, it is said one of the bandits was seriously wounded. Later reports indicate that the fugitives escaped with \$5000 in bills.

DAYTON PASTOR GOES TO CORVALLIS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Dayton, Wash., Oct. 21.—The Rev. F. M. Baum, for two years pastor of Grace church of Dayton, has accepted a call to Corvallis, Or., and with his family will leave here the first of November.

The Rev. Baum has returned from a short trip to Corvallis and was much impressed with the place, particularly as regards educational advantages. Before coming to Dayton Rev. Baum was rector of the Episcopal church at Pomeroy, Wash. No successor to Rev. Baum has been named.

GETS LEASE RENEWED FOR A LONG TERM

The lease held on the Sherman, Clay & Co. building, at Sixth and Morrison streets, has been renewed for a long term. In speaking of the deal G. F. Johnson, the general manager, said: "We will follow up the renewal of our lease on this corner by making extensive changes in the use of some of the floors. We must increase the size of our salesrooms. When our plans are worked out we shall have the most up to date piano store in the northwest. At least three floors and the basement will be devoted to selling space."

Department Store Incorporates.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., Oct. 21.—Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday in the county clerk's office incorporating the Reeves-Clark department store of Lebanon, Or. The directors of the new company are A. M. Reeves, F. L. Clark and Mary J. Reeves. The company is incorporated at \$25,000.

WOULD IMPROVE TRAIN SERVICE

St. Johns Commercial Club Gives Some Data on Freight.

The meeting of the St. Johns Commercial club last night was the most interesting session held for some time. Mr. Morse of the O. R. & N. was present gathering data on the amount of freight that his road could secure provided a local rate in less than carload lots was given to St. Johns.

Shippers present showed him that it would be an easy matter to get one or more carloads per day provided a daily service was put on. As there is now a daily train through St. Johns to Stockdale this is thought to be feasible. Interesting facts brought out were that 3400 cars of freight in car lots have been shipped out since the establishment of the office there and that 905 cars were shipped out during September. Mr. Morse talked very favorably toward the project and assured the club that he would do his best to have the local rate established.
