Surprise their Pastor.—In the Universalist Church of Good Tidings last Sunday Rev. James D. Corby had preached an inspiring discourse to a large congregation, when W. W. Hills, the president of the parish, called the people to order, and in fitting words said that in behalf of the congregation and at their request, he desired to express the love of the people for Rev. and Mrs. Corby, and especially to thank them for the skill and perfection of the arrangements in connection with the placing of the corner stones by President Taft. He assured them of the affectionate regard in which the people held them, and promised the heartiest cooperation in the forward movement made possible by the modern equipment of the new church. Rev. and Mrs. Corby, deeply touched, thanked the people for their kindness.

Will Go to Foochow.—A service of extraordinary interest will take place at the First Congregational church Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, when Edwin Dwight Kellogg and his wife, Alice, will receive their commission as missionaries to Foochow, China. The commission papers will be presented by Rev. H. Melville Kinney, D. D., of Berkeley, who is secretary of the American board of foreign missions and district secretary for the Pacific slope. At the evening service Rev. G. W. Hinman, who has been in missionary work at Foochow for the past ten years, will speak of the work in that field, and Mr. and Mrs. Kellogg will speak of their ideas and hopes in the work.

At the Museum of Art.—In gallery "B" of the museum there is now displayed a selection of the photographs of the Barbizon school, including Millet's beautiful "Spring, with the rain-bow." Corot's "Small Boat on the Lake," and the strong and simple drawings of Rousseau, delineating effects so like those seen here in Oregon. George De Forest Bush's, "The Sculptor and the King," a loan which has been the object of much admiration, will leave the gallery on Monday. The museum, corner of Fifth and Taylor streets, is open each week day from 9 until 5 o'clock; free Thursday and Saturdays afternoons; also Sunday from 2 to 6.

TAGS SHOW BABES
WHO NEED HELP

The tags for Tag Day next Saturday differ greatly from the tags of last year. Tag Day is instituted for the benefit of the Baby Home and to bring this idea more forcibly before the buyers of the bits of cardboard. The thought has been embodied in the tag. A group of baby heads on a square mat shows 43 of the 48 infants now in the home and serves as a reminder of their helplessness and their need.

The tag, while smaller than last year's, retains the general shape of the regulation tag and is strung for convenient fastening to the button of a buttonhole. Thousands of these tags have been prepared for sale and a unique manner of entertaining has been introduced by Mrs. D. C. Burns, who entertained the tag party. Columbia Slough Navigable.—The Columbia Land company, which built the trestle to carry the line and county road over Columbia slough to the Union stockyards, has been notified by Major J. B. Kavanaugh of the engineering corps of the United States army, that it must be so altered as to provide an opening for the passage of barges and small steamers up the slough, which is held to be navigable water. The opening must be not less than 60 feet in the clear and not lower than the present trestle. In the event of failure by the company to get Major Kavanaugh says the necessary legal steps will be taken to compel the change to be made. Major Kavanaugh has sent a copy of his letter to County Judge Webster and the latter's information and guidance.

Rev. J. D. Corby Explains
the Case of Lizzie
Miller.

In the police court yesterday the case against Lizzie Miller, an inmate of a north end diva, was dismissed. She had been arrested at the instance of Rev. J. B. Corby, pastor of the First Universalist church. He did not appear in court when her case came up for trial. Dr. Corby has given The Journal the following, explaining his connection with the case.

"Seeing a girl, who was a child in stature, and who can hardly be 17 years of age, enter a dive on Clay street I notified Chief Cox and at his request accompanied Captain Moore to secure the girl.

"We walked down together, and at Yamhill street, Moore showed down my name and address and I said good night, with the understanding that I would be phoned for when wanted. He said the girl must prove proof of age, and as such proof must come from San Francisco and was only procurable from a brother of whom she had not heard in years, it was certain that days would elapse before papers giving her age could come.

"The girl said she came here from San Francisco four months ago when the wide open town was adopted. She was in a dive at the north end for a few months, then when a few of those were closed, she was moved down to the south end of the city. So the local police have no long record of her. At the hour when police court was in session, I was in the office of Mrs. Baldwin, the police aid, asking her counsel and offering every assistance the Universalist church could afford to help and save this poor girl from the hell in which she has been incarcerated.

"Why the girl was not held and why I was not notified are matters that can be interpreted in several ways. Can it be that there was a desire to force the chain tighter on this unfortunate white slave in this fair city of Portland?"

"Who is Lizzie Miller? She is the daughter of German parents who died when she was eight years old, leaving her a waif under the care of a brother; he dropped out of her life very soon, and this babe in years was early inured to the miserable existence from which I sought to save her. Today, though 17 or 18 years old, she can neither read nor write, and from debauchery is below the average of her age in intelligence.

CHASE BURGLAR
AROUND HOUSE

East Side Family Gives Mid-night Prowler Good Scare.

It was a lively chase that a burglar had at 3 o'clock this morning when discovered in the bed room of Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Brown, 611 East Couch street, who ran the man through the house, twice around the lawn and into Sullivan's gulch at the rear of the home. He escaped without securing anything of value, although several hundred dollars worth of jewelry was on the dresser.

Mrs. Brown was awakened by a squeaking of the floor, but remained quiet to see if it would be repeated. Soon another squeak told her that some one was in the room. She could hear a man moving about. Then she called loudly to her husband, who was asleep by her side.

The thief started to run for the stairway, with Mr. Brown in hot pursuit. At the foot of the stairs, the son joined in the chase. The burglar fell down the stairway, but got up quickly and ran out of the front door. Around the house he darted, apparently not knowing which direction to go for a hiding place. Brown and his wife were close upon his heels. After making two complete circuits of the building, the man jumped into the gulch at the rear of the house and escaped.

He had gained entrance through the pantry window. The screen had been removed and the crockery cabinet by the window placed on the veranda. He also removed his shoes before entering the house, and went through the kitchen, dining room, and opened the front door to allow a quick escape.

In the sleeping room of the Browns were Mrs. Brown's jewelry, but he had not found it. In his efforts to escape he left his shoes. They are practically new, of No. five and a half size, and of an expensive kind.

But, you say, "the telegraph companies will reduce their present rates to meet this new competition." Will they? The actual average cost of sending a 15-word message is 20.3 cents, according to the Western Union of sending latest figures, and is steadily increasing. It cost 22.5 cents in 1907; 23.7 in 1908; 25.1 cents in 1909; 26.6 cents in 1910; and 27.6 cents in 1911. The profit on long messages merely makes up the loss on the short ones. The wire companies make their great income from the press dispatches, leased or purchased wire, and repeating the business. In two years we will have a station in every town and city of over 5000 people in this country. We are now installing them as fast as men and money can do it, with three factories turning out the equipment. These stations will make the present telegraph for the simple reason that we can reach by wireless any 200 stations within a circle of 1000 miles from one station, with one message. For the wire companies to send that same message to the same 200 cities would require from 10 to 50 separate messages—and each of these 10 or 50 messages would cost 10 times what our one general message would cost. Do you still think they can compete?

EVA BOOTH TO
LECTURE HERE

Famous Salvation Army Commander and Leading Orator.

Commander Eva Booth, who has charge of all Salvation Army operations in the United States, will arrive in Portland from San Francisco Friday morning, October 23, and in the evening at 8 o'clock will deliver her famous lecture, "The Song of the City," at the White Temple.

Miss Booth is the third daughter of General William Booth and has been in active service since she was 16.
