

LOSERS STOCK BUYERS IN TROUBLE

Postoffice Department Issues Fraud Order Against the Guarantee Securities Company of Los Angeles—Assets Only \$65.

(Hearst News Service.)

Washington, Oct. 23.—The postoffice department has issued a fraud order against the Guarantee Securities company of Los Angeles, Cal., depriving it of the use of the mails. The concern was engaged in the business of purchasing stock for people, not having sufficient capital to buy outright, and accepting payment on the installment plan. Delivery of the stock was not to be made until all installments were paid.

The concern advertised extensively in metropolitan papers and got the bulk of its business through this method. In the advertisement it was stated that no interest, commission or other charges would be made for purchasing stocks.

Falsity in Circulars.

A circular issued and sent through the mail entitled: "Stocks and how to buy them," represented that on the receipt of the first installment the entire amount of stock desired would be purchased at the prevailing market price and held until the receipt of the last installment, when it would be sent to the owner.

The investigation made by the postal inspector developed the fact that it was the practice of the concern, when stocks were ordered on the installment plan, to make no attempt to purchase them, but to retain the money. Delivery was made only upon the payment of the last installment, and only then if the market values had in the meantime decreased. The concern relied on this device to fulfill its obligations and did not intend to deliver stocks which had increased in value.

Assets Were \$65 Worth of Stock.

The inspector, who conducted the investigation, found that the concern consisted of one Junior Sloan, who was without any financial responsibility. Sloan stated that the assets of the concern amounted to between \$10,000 and \$15,000, consisting of stocks, bonds, etc., but when asked to exhibit them he could not produce them, and the only assets were a total of only \$65.

STANDARD OIL FILES PROTEST

Agent Says He Does Not Value Property in County.

It has remained for the Standard Oil company to make the most unique protest against the valuations fixed by Assessor Sigler of any of the 320 corporations or individuals who had filed their objections up to the time of closing business before the board of equalization yesterday.

This is the sworn statement of the true valuation of Standard Oil property in Multnomah county, according to the local agent, George C. Flanders:

Merchandise—Don't know.
Money, notes and accounts—Don't know.

Wagons—Don't know.
Twenty-two horses—Don't know.
Beneath this information, which will be of questionable value to the board, which has to deal with hard figures, is written a general complaint that the assessment is too high. The board's figures read \$100,000 for merchandise, \$60,000 for money, notes and accounts, \$1300 for wagons and \$2200 for the horses. This is a raise from last year, the assessor having a lingering idea that John D.'s interests were not paying quite their share.

Mr. Flanders said he thought it too much, so he was invited to make the usual sworn statement as to the true valuation. The sheet was thereupon filled out with his "don't know," and if he has any more tangible proof to back up his complaint he will have opportunity to present it later.

Tomorrow will be the last day for the reception of complaints of taxpayers regarding the valuations of property on the tax roll. The law says the rolls shall be kept open for one week, and as there is some question about the legal meaning of one week, the equalization board has decided to keep open the full seven days. After tomorrow there will be two weeks in which to check up the objections and give hearings on protested assessments.

Archibald & Schanz have objected to an assessment of \$35,000 on merchandise and \$20,000 on money, notes and accounts. The true figures should be \$13,484 and \$11,000, it is stated.

The Portland, Spokane & Sea-land railroad claims that a double assessment has been made on 1.78 miles of right of way across certain lots it owns in North Portland. Holding that the lots are assessed for full value, the road says for cancellation of the assessment on the right of way for the distance named at the rate of \$44,000 per mile.

There is no objection to the \$44,000 valuation on the right of way, although the Southern Pacific has protested that its main line should be reduced from \$35,000 to \$20,000 per mile.

H. L. Pittcock says the assessment is 50 per cent too high on a number of lots in Abernethy Heights, assessed to him as trustee in the total sum of \$35,100.

A. Neppach asks for a reduction on timber land owned by him near Larch mountain in the Bull Run canyon. He says the cost of logging is unusually high there, largely because of the care required to keep the logs from stirring the waters of Bull Run, which must be kept pure for the city water supply.

Frank A. Spencer objects to \$2000 assessed against his dwelling and \$600 on household goods. He says the foundation of the house is all that has been erected and he would sell his furniture for \$250.

IONE TO HAVE FIRST EXHIBIT

O. R. & N. Farming Demonstration Train Ready for Tour.

Leaving Portland on a special sleeper which will be attached to the 8 o'clock east bound O. R. & N. train tomorrow night the members of the party that are to accompany the O. R. & N.'s farming demonstration train will give their first demonstration at Ione, on the Heppner branch of the O. R. & N. Tuesday morning.

The subjects to be discussed by the members of the faculty of Oregon Agricultural college include soil tillage, conservation of moisture, more and better livestock, horticulture, dairying and poultry. The train will remain three hours or longer at each point visited, thus giving opportunity for a full discussion and exchange of ideas on all questions pertaining to agriculture. The train will be operated through Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow counties Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday on the Heppner, Condon and Shaniko branches of the O. R. & N.

The speakers to accompany the train are Dr. James Withycombe, director of the Oregon Experiment station; Professor C. L. Lewis, horticulturist; Professor James Dryden, poultry husbandman; Professor H. D. Scudder, agronomist; Professor C. E. Bradley, chemist; Professor F. L. Kent, dairy husbandman.

The schedule of the train follows: Tuesday, October 26—Ione, daylight lecture from 9 a. m. to 12 m.; Condon, daylight lecture from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., illustrated evening lecture from 7:30 to 9 p. m.

Wednesday, October 27—Clem, daylight lecture from 9 a. m. to 12 m.; Condon, daylight lecture from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., illustrated evening lecture from 7:30 to 9 p. m.

Thursday, October 28—Grass Valley, daylight lecture from 9 a. m. to 12 m.; Moro, daylight lecture from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m., illustrated evening lecture from 7:30 to 9 p. m.

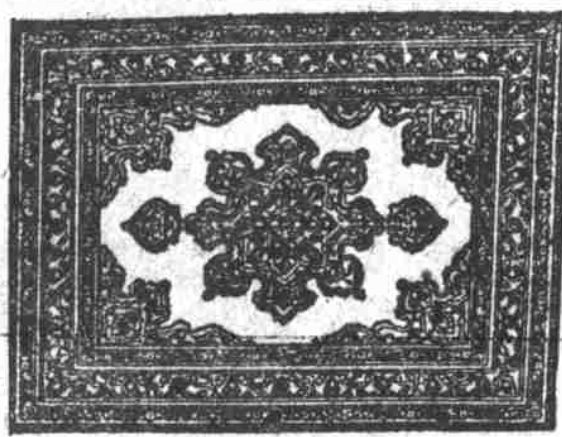

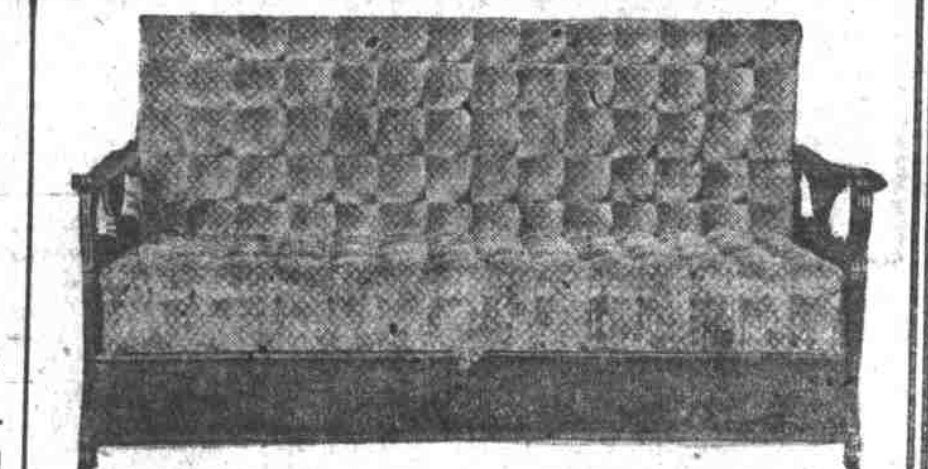
