ROBNETT TO TURN STATE'S EVIDENCE

New Witnesses for Government in Land Fraud Cases in Idaho.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Lewiston, Idaho, Oct. 25.—"I am going to stand with the government this time. I have made up my mind after long deliberation, and I will say that I am with the government because I am tired of fighting it. I have been fighting the government for three years and the odds are too strong for me. I see things differently now. When I was engaged with others in the operations which caused us all the trouble I did not regard public land laws seriously. I thought they were mere matters of form; that the laws gave us a license and a liberty to acquire all the land possible. I have come to realize that the laws confer a benefit on the citizen rather than a license.
"I assume this attitude from no motives of self protection, as may be seen from the fact that I am still under indictment on charges to fraudulently obtain public land—I have received absolutely no promises of immunity from any government official, nor have I asked for any. I believe I should abandon my former position, even though at some personal risk, and I am with Uncle Sam. That means that I am ready to tell all I know. I ask my friends to suspend judgment."
This startling statement was made by Clarence W. Robnett yesterday when asked to make a statement regarding his position in view of the fact that the federal grand jury meets in Moscow tomorrow. Once convicted on a charge of subornation of perjury, sentenced to two years imprisonment and freed by the United States circuit court of appeals, which dismissed the case, Robnett is now under bonds pending action by the grand jury on charges of misappropriation of approximately \$90,000 of the Lewiston National bank's funds.
Attitude Strengthened Case.
That he is now ready to abandon his former position and give evidence against the men who stood trial with him materially strengthens the government's case against W. F. Kettnerbach, George H. Koster and William Dwyer, who are under indictment on timber fraud charges.
Friends of this young bookkeeper, who has been through the stress of trial and conviction, say that he is the victim of environment.
Raised in the atmosphere of disregard for public land laws, steeped in the belief that he was licensed to acquire all of the public land that he could handle, he knew no reason why he should regard the law as he would the law against murder or arson, but he sees a new light. He has come to realize that he has been in error; that he is waging a useless fight against insurmountable obstacles, and he will no longer fight Uncle Sam on timber fraud suits.
When asked if his defense in the bank cases would implicate others in charges of violating the national bank law, he said: "I do not care to discuss that phase of the case. I am interested in my own defense, and I feel that it would be unwise to discuss that matter."
Miles S. Johnson, former United States

district attorney, who prosecuted Robnett, Kettnerbach and Dwyer, has been retained to defend Robnett in the bank cases, but he will have nothing to do with his defense in land fraud suits. He said when asked to make a statement regarding the defense of his client: "As an attorney it would be unwise for me to outline my client's defense for publication. To do so would be anticipating the action of the grand jury. He is under indictment, but if he should be indicted we will prepare a strong defense, which will come out in due time."
Many Important Witnesses.
That Clarence W. Robnett intends to turn state's evidence may be inferred from his statement, but his evidence will not be the only new testimony secured by the government. J. E. ("Bert") Chapman, former teller of the Lewiston National bank, who is also held to the grand jury on charges of bank defalcations, may take the stand for the government also. In addition to these two witnesses it is believed that Assistant Attorney General Peyton Gordon, who is in charge of both the land fraud cases and the bank charges, will probably introduce new and important witnesses who will give strong testimony for the government.
"Bert" Chapman authorized the following brief interview when asked to discuss his position: "As I have not violated the national bank law and, for that matter, no other law, I have nothing to conceal. If the government wants any information that I possess I will give it to any official who is qualified to receive it. This applies not only to the bank cases, but to any other matters under investigation. I am innocent of any wrongdoing and, consequently, I have no fear of the ultimate result of the charges against me."
In view of these statements it is expected that sensational news will be sprung in Moscow. The government will actively prosecute in the timber land fraud cases, and if indictments are returned in the bank cases the government will prosecute as actively as in the timber and bank cases in the east.

Logging Camp Man Injured.

Marshfield, Or., Oct. 25.—George McIntosh, employed at the Pierce logging camp, was injured while examining a tree. He partially opened a hammer-axe shotgun and the shell exploded. His hands and face were burned.

DOG TRIES TO SAVE MAN'S LIFE

Asleep on Railroad Track, W. S. Wilson Is Killed—Collie Warns the Crew.

Ellensburg, Wash., Oct. 25.—The story of a dog who did his best to prevent his master from being run over and killed, was brought to the city today by Northern Pacific trainmen.
While the engineer, W. T. Wilson, of No. 53, the fast Northern Pacific freight train between Pasco and Ellensburg, was half a mile west of Chandler, a blind siding west of Prosser, he noticed that a big Collie dog on the track ahead of him was behaving in a peculiar manner.
The attention of the fireman was called to the dog which was barking, running in circles, leaping in the air, and running toward the train and back again and trying in every possible way to attract the attention of the crew of the approaching train. Not understanding the actions of the dog the engineer made no attempt to shut off steam until he saw a man lying across the track asleep.
The emergency brakes were applied and the train broken up by the attempt to stop it suddenly, but the wheels of the engine rolled over the prostrate man. The victim, horribly mangled, was picked up and taken to Prosser and given medical attention. The dog which had done his best to save the man was carried in the caboose with the body and moaning and whimpering it licked the dead hand of its master trying to bring him to life.
In Prosser the victim of the accident was identified as W. H. Howard, a resident of that city.

NEW ORDINANCE FOR PENDLETON SALOONS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pendleton, Or., Oct. 25.—The committee appointed a week ago by Mayor Murphy to draft an ordinance for the regulation of saloons, should the county again vote wet, has drawn up the provisions to be incorporated. The committee is composed of E. B. Aldrich, W. H. Peterson, J. V. Tallman, Henry Johnson and Dr. L. U. Temple.
The ordinance providing for a strict licensing system, if legalized, with a license fee of \$2500 a year; one saloon for each 1000 inhabitants or major fraction thereof, with not more than two saloons on any one block.
Saloons shall be closed at 11 p. m. and shall remain closed from 11 p. m. Saturday until 6 a. m. Monday.
The business must be conducted in one room without partitions, screens or booths and without chairs. This room must not open into any other room where games are allowed to be played, or into any room having chairs or tables for the convenience of saloon patrons.
No screens or frosted glass windows will be allowed in a saloon, and said saloon must be kept lighted at all times so that the interior may be plainly seen from the outside.

MANY VESSELS TO CHANGE STATIONS

(United Press Local Wire.)
San Francisco, Oct. 25.—The cruiser Albany and perhaps the New Orleans will be sent to Magdalena Bay within a few days to remain a month at target practice, along with the torpedo boats and destroyers, the supply ship Albatross and the Iris. Later the Albany, from present appearances, will be sent to the far east to take the place of warships which have been ordered home.
The protected cruiser St. Louis, the flagship of Rear Admiral Flagg, the Porpoise, is to be sent to Mare

Island to undergo further overhauling. Its crew and officers will be transferred to its sister ship, the Milwaukee, which has recently been given an extensive overhauling.
The cruisers Galveston and Chattanooga, also on the Asiatic station, are to go to the navy yard at Bremerton for their overhauling, made necessary by a long stay in Asiatic waters. Bremerton is to be the home station for those two vessels.

ALBANY FAIR ADOPTS YELL FOR VALLEY DAY

Albany, Or., Oct. 25.—"Albany apples, Albany pie, Albany dumplings—oh, my!" is the official yell which has been adopted by the committee for the Willamette Valley day, October 28, at the Albany apple fair. The committee met last night and completed the plans of entertainment. Postmaster Van Winkle will welcome the guests in behalf of the city.
A mounted escort in charge of Grand Marshal W. O. Woodworth will lead the procession to the apple fair exhibition rooms.
Rev. W. B. Gordon of the M. E. church was appointed to ask the public schools and the college to close for the afternoon.
The committee on "homecoming" day will meet this evening.

POULTRY ASSOCIATION FORMED AT LA GRANDE

La Grande, Oct. 25.—Poultrymen of Union county have organized an association which has for its purpose the expansion of the poultry industry in this valley. The first meeting of its kind was held here last Saturday when C. C. Coolidge was elected temporary chairman and D. D. Stoddard temporary secretary.
A few years ago chicken raising was not included in the by products of the country west, but of late years the industry has suddenly increased in popularity until now hen fanciers have some of the finest of the fine species that thrive in the northwest. A chicken show later in the season is now being promoted.

HOPE TO RELIEVE SUICIDE STIGMA

Wife of Murdered Police Sergeant May Have Died of Heart Disease.

San Francisco, Oct. 25.—The police today are trying to determine whether the widow of Police Sergeant Fred Nolting, the officer who was murdered by Private Jordan, an enlisted man at the Presidio, last January, who was found dead yesterday at her home committed suicide or died from natural causes.
A note found under the pillow of the woman's bed indicated that she had committed suicide, but there are no outward signs that Mrs. Nolting took her own life and her brother-in-law declares that her death was due to heart disease.
Mrs. Nolting had mourned continually since Private Jordan laid her husband low with a bullet.
The note found under the woman's pillow read in part as follows:
"The charm of life to me has gone, and without my dear husband, life can never mean anything again. No matter when or how the end comes I feel I will be better off with him. I believe that more charity should be shown to those who, in such moments of sorrow, as I have passed through, or in desperation take their lives. It is not for us to judge of their act or of the bitterness of soul that prompted it."
"My feeling toward the murderer of my husband is so great that I cannot but wish that he may suffer some of the agony that his terrible act has caused me."
