

BALLOTS HELD UP BY SUIT OF HEARST

Civic Alliance Alleges Tammany Stole Independence League Primaries — Gaynor Charged With Tainted Decision in Racing Case

New York, Oct. 26.—Justice Gerard this afternoon decided that Tammany could not use the Independence league column of the ballot in the city election and ordered that that column be left blank.

New York, Oct. 26.—Justice Gerard is today hearing arguments as to whether Tammany Hall should be allowed to place the Independence league emblem on the ticket headed by Justice Gaynor, Tammany nominee for mayor of New York city. The printers in the meantime have been enjoined from printing any ballots and they declare that unless they are allowed to start work immediately they will be unable to print enough to go around and that many voters will be compelled to go balloting on Tuesday.

Hearst's attack on Otto F. Bannard has split the Republicans and the Civic Alliance, and Tammany is accordingly jubilant, declaring that whenever there have been three candidates in the field Tammany has always won.

Hearst claims he will get all the votes that he received before and an additional hundred thousand.

Tammany offers even money that Hearst will run third and that he will not poll over 100,000 votes.

New York, Oct. 26.—The printing of the municipal election ballots was held up last night by a court injunction on the plea of the Civic Alliance men, who declare that Tammany Hall deliberately stole the primaries of the Independence league, Hearst's old organization, and this morning the anti-Tammany papers print excerpts from court records to show that at the time Judge Gaynor decided the famous golf ball case and turned it into a decision to fit the interests of race track bettors, he held a mortgage of \$5000 on the Brighton Beach race track.

Gaynor declines to say anything, but this latest attack has set all Tammany in an uproar.

Judge Gaynor has added to the gaiety of the nation by bringing a libel suit for \$100,000 against the World, his chief supporter, because it printed a statement by Arthur Brisbane that the judge didn't like. The action is based on alleged libelous statements in an article in the Evening World by Arthur Brisbane, editorial writer for Hearst, who has been pressing the Hearst side of the campaign in a series of articles under his signature. The Evening World opened its columns at the beginning of the campaign to the principal supporters of the various candidates.

The three mayoralty candidates were as busy as bees last night. William R. Hearst, the Civic Alliance candidate, spoke before three great meetings, in which he lambasted Otto Bannard, the Republican candidate. He referred to him as "a messenger boy for financiers." Bannard was also heard by big crowds. In all he made 10 speeches. William J. Gaynor, the Democratic color bearer, did the spellbinding act at three meetings, the first of which he had since the campaign started. In each hall there were hundreds of vacant seats. He abused everybody who opposed his candidacy. He denounced Hearst and all New York newspapers and took a fling at Mayor McClellan. He made a great hit with his audiences when he said he would, if elected, see that a man who tapped another on the

head for a good reason would not be arrested.

White Slave Charge Murks.
So much for the candidates themselves. Never has Tammany Hall been so stirred as by the charge in a magazine that it is behind the white slave traffic in this city. John Gallo, a Tammany Hall candidate and millionaire, has offered \$50,000 to the man who should prove these charges. Charles P. Murphy issued two statements; in fact, everybody in Tammany came out with statements. It has been the greatest blow of the campaign for the Tiger.

VOTERS CAN'T TELL HOW TO VOTE NOR WHOM TO BET ON

New York, Oct. 26.—The most remarkable campaign in the history of the city of New York, enters on its last week with the leaders of the various parties claiming victory and with the common citizens, the individuals who will deliver the vote and badly puzzled that all but the bitterest of partisans confess themselves at sea as to which particular set of candidates will get their votes when they reach the voting booths. Even the usual state-election betting has taken on the feverish fluctuations that ordinarily characterize the stock market, no two sections of the city quoting the same odds.

And the three candidates for mayor, Gaynor, Hearst, and Bannard, have succeeded in clouding the issue with such a mass of personal vituperation and abuse directed against their opponents that many voters are openly bewailing the fate that limits their choice to this trio.

Woodruff Says Bannard.
At the request of the United Press the leaders of the campaign have summed up their views in the following statements:

"The next mayor of New York will be Otto Bannard. The people have cried out for years for a business man in the mayor's chair, and the fusionists have offered them the man. He is the only man since the greater city was established who has been named for mayor who was a real business man. Van Wyck was a lawyer, Low a college professor and McClellan a Tammany politician. Bannard sacrifices his business career, one of the institutions with which he is connected paying him \$50,000 a year, to take the office of mayor at a salary of \$15,000, and our figures show that he will be elected by not less than 50,000 plurality."—Timothy Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee.

Will Have Honest Count.

"Hearst will have fully \$25,000 of the total vote, thus assuring his election. He will keep every one of the 220,000 votes Tammany allowed to be counted for him four years ago, and to that will be added more than 100,000 from men who have learned during the last four years that he is on the level and is the friend of the common people. Men do not lose friends when they are faithful to their friends, and Hearst will get the votes he needs."

"Tammany will not steal so many votes this year. The leaders are afraid of prison and the vote will be honestly counted. Bannard will run second and Gaynor third. Tammany has abandoned hope and every day that goes by makes our victory more certain."—Charles K. Gehring, manager of Hearst's Civic Alliance.

"The others are making the claims, but we will get the votes, and it is the votes that count in deciding an election."—Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall.

Odds on Gaynor.

The betting has been at odds of 2 and 2½ to 1 that Gaynor would be elected. Only a few thousand dollars have been placed at these odds, although in former years at a corresponding period of time the money wagered has run into millions. And it is not Governor Hughes' anti-betting laws that have accomplished this. It is the feeling of the men who would rather bet than eat, that no one can forecast the result of this election.

The Real Issue Stated.

While the leaders on all sides are whooping it up for the mayoralty candidates, the men who have the real interest of the city at heart, are trying to influence the voters in the real issue of the campaign. That is the control of the board of estimate, which has the handling of the city's money and which will authorize not less than \$500,000 worth of contracts during the coming four years.

The board is made up as follows: Mayor, three votes; comptroller, three votes; president of the aldermen, three votes; presidents of Manhattan and Brooklyn boroughs, two votes; presidents of Queens, Bronx and Richmond boroughs, each one vote.

That Tammany will go to any length to secure this board is the direct charge of Congressman Parsons and Congressman Bennett, the Republican leaders, and Gehring and Ivins, the Hearst leaders.

WEYERHAEUSERS MAY BE BUILDING ROAD

Husum, Wash., Oct. 26.—The appearance of the railroad surveyors, who are running a line up the White Salmon valley is causing a whirl of excitement in the Trout Lake country. It is stated that a western capitalist is obtaining options on nearly all the best ranches in that locality, several important sales having been made within the past week. The new road, which is being built there and will run supplies out west of Trout Lake for a two months' stay. This is significant that the road to be built up this valley will be in the interest of the Weyerhæusers in taking care of their extensive timber holdings west of Trout Lake.

FRIEND PRESUMED ON HOST'S HOSPITALITY

After inviting a friend home with him at an early hour this morning, Howard Garner, a bartender living at 220½ Laramie street, was awoke this morning by a friend who had come to the friend's lodging and threw him down stairs, causing several severe bruises about the head and face. The report made to the police states that Garner and his wife have only one room and one bed. The friend, who is a stranger, was with the couple, whereupon Garner objected to quarrel followed, and the man was pitched down the stairway. He was taken in charge by an officer and given lodging in a nearby rooming house. No arrests were made.

DUNDON WOULD BURN GARBAGE

Inventor of Refuse Crematory Is in Portland to Sell Plant.

Attending personally to the presentation of bids for the construction of the new garbage incinerator, Mr. F. Dundon, president and owner of the Puget Sound Wood Preserving company, Everett, Wash., and the San Francisco Timber Preserving company, San Francisco, Cal., is in Portland. He is staying at the Portland hotel.

A practical mechanical engineer, Mr. Dundon has patented a style of incinerator of his own invention, which he hopes to build in Portland. He has had 20 years experience in the construction and operation of crematories, and believes his furnace system to be cheaper and better than others.

When garbage is hauled to a crematory built along the lines advocated by Mr. Dundon, it is deposited in a specially constructed chamber. From the chamber a system of fans carries off the odors into a combustion chamber apartment, where a high degree of temperature kills the stench.

Garbage is burned under a temperature between 800 and 1000 degrees, and the gases conveyed to the supplementary and main combustion chamber, where, with a heat of 4000 degrees, they are rekindled and the odor eliminated. Also, a macerator provides for the chopping up and removal of moisture from refractory garbage. Aerial trams carry the ashes and clinkers from the furnace to the dump piles.

Mr. Dundon has guaranteed to the board of health that the furnace system he has designed will incinerate rubbish for an average cost of 60 cents a ton. However, he believes that the cost can be cut down to 35 cents a ton. One hundred and eighty horsepower of steam would be made. Only about 50 horsepower would be used. The remainder, according to Mr. Dundon, could easily be transformed into electric power and sold.

RAILROAD MEN IN UMATILLA

Strahorn Visits Pendleton; Says North Coast Will Be Built to Central Oregon.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 26.—Robert E. Strahorn, railroad builder and man of mystery, who is promoting the North Coast road, was in this city yesterday on a trip from Omaha to Spokane. He made an unsuccessful attempt to get an auto to take him to the site of the proposed bridge across the Columbia near the mouth of the Snake river. He was very anxious to make the trip. He refused to divulge the source of his backing. He said the purpose of the man behind the North Coast was to extend the line into central and southern Oregon at some future time. He admitted that a party of engineers were working in the country east of Milton and Walla Walla.

Strahorn was accompanied by S. P. Pittman, chief engineer of the North Coast.

O. R. & N. SURVEYING CREW AT BIRCH CREEK

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 26.—A crew of engineers and surveyors appeared mysteriously in Pendleton yesterday morning and without waiting for the departure of the train hurriedly collected an outfit and departed by wagon for Pilot Rock Junction. The party was headed by S. C. Martin, who refused to talk concerning the intentions of the party. Their movements were very mysterious and railroad officials in this city know nothing of them. The fact that their supplies were consigned to the O. R. & N. company proves they belong to that road. There were 14 men in the crew, and they have established a camp at the mouth of Birch creek.

There is much speculation regarding their purpose. Some think they intend to straighten the road from the Junction to Echo by tunneling through Horseshoe curve, while others advance the theory that the old proposition of building a line across from Sparks on the Pilot Rock branch is being revived.

Captain Conboy Arraigned.

San Francisco, Oct. 26.—Former Police Captain Joseph Conboy, who shot and killed young Bernard Lagan, was formally accused of murder yesterday and a complaint was sworn to by a sister of the dead boy, Miss Margaret Lagan. Clerk of Court Sharp arraigned the defendant, after which Assistant District Attorney Block moved that the case go over for two weeks, when the preliminary hearing of the case will commence. Judge Conlan granted the motion. No release of the defendant was offered by Attorney Dunne, representing Conboy.

Andes Will Go Back.

Andes is wanted at Sacramento, Cal., for embezzlement. Reese is appointed agent in the instrument to take Andes to Sacramento for trial.
