STRANDED "KORSA" SHOWS UTILITY OF WIRELESS

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 28, 1908.—The big Pacific Mail liner "Korsika" last night communicated by wireless with Honolulu while 1800 miles away, and also exchanged messages with the steamship "Albatross" 1110 miles distant. Later, the operator on the "Korsika" communicated with the steamship "Manitoba" when it was 187 miles out from Honolulu. This is the first trip of the "Korsika" since the wireless instruments were installed by the United Wireless Telegraph Company. The big liner is fitted with one of the most powerful sets on the Pacific and it is expected that many long distance records will be smashed before the return trip to the Orient is completed.

1500 MILES
On August 25, Mr. Schwertner, the Vice President and General Manager of the Pacific Mail S. S. Co., said: "When steamers can communicate with the wireless a 1500 mile line I will have our Oriental steamers fitted with it, but not before." On October 8 he gave the order for the equipment of the "Korsika" and Wireless makes good on the first trip.
