Judge Denies Non-Suit—Circuit Judge Morrow this morning refused to grant a non-suit in the case of Mrs. Louetta J. Jackson against the Oregon Electric Railway company for \$5000 damages because she was injured by a car on a trip from Portland to Chemeketa. She was one of a party who were to travel on a 25-party ticket under certain conditions, and her receipt for fare was refused by the conductor. The company sought for a non-suit on the ground that the conditions of the 25-party ticket were not observed and that the plaintiff did not offer valid transportation to the conductor. The defendant's case is being presented this afternoon.

George Tempier, who was recently held to the grand jury on a statutory charge made by Miss Alta Gilliland, 19 years old, was returned back into municipal court yesterday afternoon and fined \$300. One half of this amount will be given to the unfortunate girl. Tempier is a married man with two children. He works for the Rose City shingle mill, and met Miss Gilliland at Kelo, Wash., from which place he induced her to come to Portland to live with him as his wife. He supported her and his wife while living here, and neither woman knew of the other until the girl pressed Tempier to marry her.

The Alumni association of the Christian Brothers Business college has in the lead by 250 votes at the close of the voting last night to see which was the most popular society and incidentally which society is to get possession of the handsome United States flag which President William H. Taft gave to the college for that purpose. The Elks' lodge was second, while the other contestants follow closely upon the two leaders. Tonight's program will be in charge of the members of St. Joseph's, St. Stephen's, Assumption, Sacred Heart, St. Joseph, St. Michael and St. James of Vancouver, Wash. A number of interesting features have been prepared.

Miss E. E. Bender, national corresponding secretary of the Needlework Guild of America, will give an address in the interest of the work in Portland at the Y. W. C. A. Thursday at 8 o'clock. Addresses will also be made by Rev. Father McDevitt, Mrs. Millie C. Trumbull, who will speak on visiting nurses and similar societies, and W. T. Gardner, who will speak on aids for boys and girls. The guild is organized for charitable purposes and is not denominational. A cordial invitation is extended to the meeting, and it is hoped that a large number will be present.

Fedders' License Fanned—The ordinance prohibiting peddling in the business district of Portland was finally passed by the city council this morning, after months of argument and marked opposition by a minority of the council. The ordinance becomes effective as soon as it is approved by Mayor Simon. After that time itinerant vendors must pay a license fee of \$600 a year for the privilege of operating within a district bounded by Park street, Burnside street, Taylor street and the Willamette river.

EXHIBITION OF RESORT PICTURES

Change in Recreation Demands Shown by Paintings in Eilers Windows.

Five paintings of important buildings at a resort, now being constructed at Tillamook bay were placed on exhibition in the Washington street windows of Eilers Piano House, Park and Washington streets, today, and are attracting much attention.

The pictures, it is stated, were prepared from the architects' plans for the hotel, the two bath houses and the two other buildings. The natural surroundings on the peninsula at Tillamook bay were followed as faithfully as the plans of the architects, and the effect of the whole is a fairly adequate conception of the appearance of part of the resort when the improvements are complete. These paintings emphasize the fact that the desire of Portland people for recreation has outgrown the accommodations and amusements that formerly satisfied them, and that the new resort at Tillamook bay is being perfected to meet this newly apparent demand.
