

MADRAS TO BE GIVEN IMPETUS

Oregon Trunk Stockholders Plan Extensive Improvements—Buy Big Ranch.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Madrax, Or., Oct. 22.—Since the purchase of a half interest in the Madras townsite by heavy stockholders of the Oregon Trunk Line, it is learned that extensive improvements are planned for the town. The first of these will be a large brick hotel, plans and specifications of which are now being drawn. A commodious hotel is very much needed here.

A company has already started an extensive plant for manufacturing brick for building purposes, and it is stated that the first kiln to be fired will contain 500,000 brick.

V. D. Williamson, one of the stockholders of the Oregon Trunk, has purchased the 100 acre ranch of A. S. Phillips, adjoining Madras on the north-east. Part of this land is under irrigation. A large storage dam is contemplated at the mouth of Willow creek canyon, along this tract, which it is expected will furnish water for irrigate 480 acres of this land, as well as leaving a surplus to water lawns in Madras.

COWLITZ COUNTY WINS MEDALS FOR PRODUCE

Woodland, Wash., Oct. 22.—John B. Hart of Woodland has just returned from his labors as one of the representatives of Cowlitz county in the booth at the A.-Y.-P. exposition and brought with him the statement from the exposition officials that Cowlitz county had won four gold medals, four silver medals and six bronze medals for displays at the exposition, besides honorable mention in another exhibit. Of the above Woodland secured one gold, two silver and four bronze medals; Castlerock secured three gold, one silver and two bronze, and Kelso, one silver medal. The following were the awards: Peter McIntosh, Woodland, gold medal on cheese; Woodland Commercial club, silver medal, for general exhibit; also the following from Woodland: H. L. Higgins, silver medal on potatoes; Henry Lamb, bronze medal on apples; Mr. Woodbridge, bronze medal on squash. Castlerock secured the following: Castlerock Commercial club, gold medal on fruit; Johnson brothers, gold medal on pears; Stephens and Kelso, gold medal on fruit; S. W. Carson, silver medal on cherries; F. G. Brewer, bronze medal on fruit; John Robin, bronze medal on plums, and John Leavall, honorable mention on plums. Kelso secured a silver medal through C. N. Hogan for fruit and vegetables.

He Will Serve Five Years in the Washington Penitentiary.

Frederick Ward, formerly pastor of the Baptist church at Brewster, Or., will probably be taken today to the Washington state penitentiary to begin a five years' sentence. He admitted that he had wives living in Tennessee, Kentucky, and North Carolina in addition to the woman he married in Oregon. Ward is well known in eastern Oregon, and until it was discovered that he was a bigamist he stood high in the various communities. He was a hard religious worker and conducted a number of revivals.

GEN. MIER SUCCEEDS REYES AS GOVERNOR

HOWARD'S DEATH RECALLS STORY

Col. A. W. Miller Tells How Deceased General Won Love of Soldiers.

According to a Portland man, who served under him and who in later life became one of his close friends, Major General O. Q. Howard, who died at Burlington, Vt., Monday night, won the respect of the soldiers of his command, the Fourth army corps, at the battle of New Hope church, Ga., May 27, 1864. Colonel A. W. Miller, superintendent of the permanent exhibit of the chamber of commerce tells the story:

"We were all western men and prejudiced against General Howard when he took command. We regarded him as a feather-bed soldier; which was our term for the eastern man. He proved to be nothing of the kind, however. In the battle of New Hope church, Ga., we were drawn into a trap which the Confederates had laid for us and which proved to be about the hottest place that we had ever been in. In the thickest of it one of the men standing near General Howard fell down, mortally wounded. The general took off his hat, got down on his knees beside the dying man, and while the fighting went on all around him, prayed with him there."

Respect Turned to Love.
"Those of the corps who did not see the incident soon heard of it, and General Howard soon became the idol of his soldiers. It took just that much to turn their hearts. Later on we became very friendly with him and he was always willing to stop and talk with the private soldiers of his command."

"In another engagement, after General Howard had lost his arm, and when a rout seemed imminent, he gathered up the colors of the regiment, which had been shot from the color bearer, held the colors with his whole arm, took his horse's reins in his teeth and led the charge that saved the battle."

Colonel Miller has seen General Howard at somewhat frequent intervals since the close of the Civil war. The last time that the latter was here was in 1892 or 1893, when he was in Portland lecturing on the battle of Mission Ridge.

WOODLAND GRANGERS HOLD 3 DAYS' SESSION

3 SURVEYING CREWS LOCATED AT MADRAS

Stacey are engaged in making permanent locations. The latter two gentlemen were for over two years employed on engineering work on the North Bank road down the Columbia.
