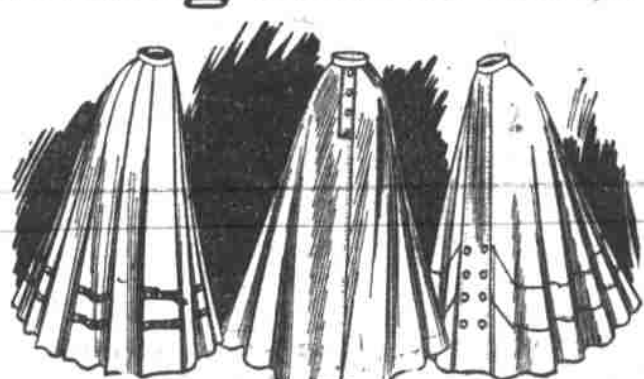

MANY REFORMS DUE IN RUSSIA

Douma Convenes to Take Up School, Industrial and Religious Measures.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 28.—The session of the douma which convened today promises to be marked by legislation of a highly important character. The session, in fact, will be the most important since the creation of the parliamentary body in 1905. Though a number of eagerly desired reforms, such as the law on inviolability of person and the reform of the local self-administration, have been deferred for tactical reasons, the program prepared for the session comprises a number of measures of high importance, headed by the consolidation of rural holdings bill, the creation of local law courts, the responsibility of officials before the ordinary courts, the inheritance and

come tax measures and the bill for universal primary education.

One of the first resolutions the douma will be asked to take is the extension of Russia's military administration to Finland, bringing its nearest province, Viborg, under direct control of St. Petersburg. Other measures that will receive early attention include one for the reorganization of fishery rights on interior lakes and rivers and the measure for normal hours of labor for hand workers, providing for a 12 hour day, with two hours deducted for meals and three hours for school attendance for employees of school age.

Religious Bill in Upper House.

The upper house will be busy with the all important agrarian law for the dissolution of peasant communes, which passed the douma at the spring session, the several measures on religious toleration, and the bill reducing the long list of civil and religious holidays. The agrarian law, it is expected, will be adopted without trouble. The toleration bills will probably be passed in a modified form, but the proposal for the reduction of holidays seems doomed to failure, as the whole weight of the orthodox hierarchy is being thrown against it.

To Consolidate Small Areas.

The consolidation of rural holdings bill, which is next on the program, will be pushed through as quickly as possible. The bill is regarded as one of the most important on the agenda. The peasant holdings are at present often split up and scattered in small areas over the lands belonging to private owners or the state, preventing economical working. The bill authorizes the consolidation of these areas by exchange with owners of adjacent lands.

Financial measures, including the inheritance and income tax bills, and the measure for the reform of the local courts will round out the big work of the session. In addition there are several hundred minor bills awaiting discussion.

FUNNELLESS CRUISER LAUNCHED IN ENGLAND

London, Oct. 28.—The armored cruiser Indefatigable, which is officially described as "the world's largest cruiser," was successfully launched today at Devonport, where her keel was laid down only last February. The launching was attended by the customary ceremonies and was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators.

The Indefatigable is the first of the type of funnelless cruisers built for the British navy. In some respects she is similar to the Invincible class, in that her armament and speed will be the same, but there the similarity practically ends. The Indefatigable is 579 feet long, 86 feet beam and of 18,000 tons displacement. She will possess two tripod masts, more than twice the height of the

but apart from her gun turrets and bridges, her upper deck will be perfectly clear. The most remarkable innovation in her construction and the one which will enable her to be built without funnels, is the introduction of internal combustion engines as the propelling power. There is some talk of 13.5 inch guns, but there is no official confirmation of any departure from the armament of the Invincible, which carries eight 13 inch guns.

GOMPERS REBUKES ELIOT; OLD FOGY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Oct. 28.—Referring to a statement of Dr. Charles W. Eliot, former president of Harvard university, that the government should prohibit labor unions on the ground that they have monopolistic tendencies and are opposed to democracy, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, said: "Since his retirement as president of Harvard, Dr. Eliot has nothing to do but talk. He now lives in an age which he cannot understand. Since the times when he was mentally capable of appreciating industrial and commercial conditions, great changes and development have taken place."

Says Husband Seeks Her Life.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 28.—Asserting that she is afraid her husband will kill her, Mrs. Bonnie E. Edgar, wife of Arthur R. Edgar, one of the best known druggists in the state, has applied to the superior court for a writ restraining her husband from entering her home. She alleges that he put poisonous drugs into her food and that while she was suffering from the effects of the poison he gave her water with strychnine in it to drink.

Logger Hit by Rolling Timber.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 28.—Ed Standish, a rigging rigger of the Hare logging camp, located near Buxton, this county, was taken to Portland Tuesday with painful injuries about his head. Standish was engaged in work on a hillside and a rolling log struck him with terrific force. Dr. Guy F. Via, was called and ordered the injured man sent to a Portland hospital.

\$10,000 FOR A RAILWAY TICKET

Lumberman Will Pay That Sum to Ride on Proposed Oakland-Coos Bay Road.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Oct. 28.—"I have offered the promoters of the Oakland and Tidewater railway \$10,000 for a railway ticket from Oakland, Or., to Coos Bay, provided I can use the ticket within 18 months," said C. A. Smith, the Minneapolis lumberman yesterday. Mr. Smith is here looking over his extensive milling properties on the bay. "Mr. Purdy, who is here promoting the road," said "Mr. Smith, tells me it will be built within 18 months and I told him if such was done I would give him \$10,000 for a ticket. And I wrote the same proposition to Mr. Dregua of Oakland, who is the vice president. I do not know anything of the inside plans of the railroad further than what I am told, but I would be willing to give that amount to see a railroad come into Coos Bay within the next 18 months."

STATE LIBRARIAN TO TAKE YEAR'S VACATION

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Oct. 28.—Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, has been granted a leave of absence by the state library board and will leave for Europe next month. She will be absent one year. Miss Ruth Wright will have charge of the state circulating library during the time Miss Marvin is away from her duties. At a meeting of the board Tuesday steps were taken to increase the usefulness of the library by adding 35 new traveling libraries, containing 50 books each. A purchase of \$15,000 worth of books is almost ready for delivery. A teachers' library is among the most valuable of the additions.

RUBY CASSELMAN APPLIES FOR PARDON

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 27.—Ruby Casselman, the "girl enigma," who was sentenced to San Quentin in August, 1906, after being convicted of forgery, will petition the state board of pardons for release on parole, according to a letter received by Judge Curtis Wilbur of this city. According to this letter, Miss Casselman

TWO SAN FRANCISCO BLOCKS TO ESPEE

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 28.—Probably in the southern part of this city valued at \$2,275,000 has been ordered condemned and sold to the Southern Pacific railroad by Superior Judge Murasky. The company has intentions of erecting train sheds and station buildings on the condemned sites. The land, which is owned by the Cogswell Polytechnic school, consists of one block on Townsend street, and another on Berry street, both between Sixth and Seventh.

P. L. LARSON, LOGGER, KILLED ON COOS RIVER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Oct. 28.—P. L. Larson, one of the owners of the Larson Hoek Logging camp at Smith's basin on Coos river, is dead as a result of an accident at the camp. A log struck him and his leg was crushed and he was injured internally. He was put in a boat and a start made for the hospital at North Bend but Mr. Larson died before he got there. The shock of the accident killed him. Mr. Larson was about 56 years old, had a wife and three children and was a brother-in-law of Henry Hoek, his logging partner. He was also a brother-in-law of the proprietor of the Brix Lumber concern of Portland.

For many years he logged on the Columbia river and was well known to the lumbermen of that district.

Catholic Priest Honored.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 28.—An event of interest in Catholic church circles took place in St. Mary's church today, when Rev. R. A. McAndrew was invested with the purple robe of a monsignor. The ceremony was performed by Bishop Hoban in the presence of a large gathering of clergy and laity.

French Battleship Launched.

Paris, Oct. 28.—The battleship Mirabeau, which is designed to be a most formidable addition to the new French navy, was launched today at Lorient. She is a vessel of 18,027 tons and will be armed with four 12 inch and 12 9.4 inch guns, giving her a greater weight of gunfire than the British battleship Dreadnought. The Mirabeau is one of a class of six, of which she is the fifth to be launched. It is planned to have all of them completed within the next 18 months.

Will Play Sunday School Team. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 28.—The Forest Grove Grays will play their first game of football next Saturday when they meet the Third Presbyterians of Portland, on the local grounds.
