

BLANK BALLOTS AT PRIMARIES

No Nominations for Salem Municipal Election Filed, but Contest Is Expected.

Salem, Or., Oct. 29.—As the time for filing nominations for the city primaries which occur Saturday, November 6, has passed, Recorder W. H. Moore is preparing a ballot for the primaries that will be entirely blank. The city election will be held Monday, December 6. Voters at the primaries will have a wide latitude for they may write in the name of any person in the city eligible to hold office, from mayor down to dog catcher.

It is believed that the contest for councilman in some of the wards will be closely fought out. In other wards there will be no contest at all. There is to be elected one ward councilman from each of the seven wards in the city, aside from a vacancy to be filled in the first ward, making it necessary to elect two councilmen from that ward. Each ward is represented in the city council by two councilmen, elected at a term and a similar convention city election takes place every year so that there is always one hold over.

There have been some indications by ward organizations but generally the voters will be perfectly free to choose whom their wish next Saturday.

FOREST SERVICE MEN MEET AT EUGENE

NUMBER 13 IS NOT MILLIONAIRE'S HOODOO

Juneau, Oct. 29.—That 13 is not always an unlucky number is conclusively proved by the story of Jack Horne, perhaps the largest individual operator in the Klondike, who has just passed through Juneau en route to Seattle.

Jack Horne is a sour-dough of the vintage of 1894. When the first big strike was made by Carmack, Horne was mining at Circle City. He at once started for the scene of the strike, and located No. 13 below on Bonanza. It was a money maker from the start, and now Horne is the owner of 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 below.

Horne worked 15 below with a double shift crew of about 60 men. His operations were very successful, and he took out about \$40,000 in dust. Notwithstanding these riches, Horne slept on a table in the saloon on his trip to Seattle, and forgot to have a state room reserved.

It is in this that the millionaires of the northland differ from the millionaires of the effete east. A New York millionaire would have chartered a ship rather than endure the hardship of a berthless voyage.

C. & E. IS ASKED TO OPERATE TWO TRAINS

Salem, Or., Oct. 29.—In response to the petitions of the patrons of the road, the railroad commissioner has asked the Corvallis and Eastern to install separate passenger and freight trains between Albany and Yakima. A mixed train is now operated and passengers feel they should not be compelled to endure the delays caused by such service.

The commission has recommended that a new freight train be put on, leaving the present train for passenger business. It is only a suggestion that the demand of the railroad commission is not in the shape of an order, but simply request, which if not complied with may be the cause of the issuance of an order later.

The commission has also asked for the installation of better facilities for handling stock at Echo on the Oregon Railway and Navigation company's line.

A complaint of car shortage was received this morning from the Fisher flouring mills at Silverton. The company asserts that it is impossible to get cars from within ten days to two weeks after the orders are submitted.

MCAREN'S ESTATE BUT FIFTY THOUSAND

New York, Oct. 29.—It is reported that the estate of the late Patrick H. McCarron will not exceed \$50,000. This is a great surprise, as McCarron was credited with being a millionaire. At various times statements were made that he was "in" on deals from which he was supposed to have received large profits.

The fact that he held the political power in Brooklyn and was always a prominent factor in the political situation in this city and in the state, led to the belief that he had grown wealthy. This belief was strengthened by the fact that McCarron was almost always found on the side of the corporations.

He spent a large amount of money, having owned strings of race horses, and having plunged from time to time at the track and in Wall street.

The fact that McCarron was silent and no one was very deep in his confidence resulted in actual knowledge of his financial affairs being confined almost entirely to himself.

La Grande to Hold Bond Election.

PORTLAND MAN HAS BEST APPLE

"Perfect" Is Only Word That Fits the Hood River Apple Show.

Hood River, Or., Oct. 29.—Perfect, perfect, perfect are the words falling from the lips of all who have attended the apple show and viewed the thousand boxes of peerless apples as they are arranged on the stand in their ever-green settings.

When Hood River growers, who are keen to perceive the lines of demarcation that separate the perfect from the imperfect, and who are experts to detect the slightest deviation from the rules that obtain in the packing and display of apples, volunteer to state that a display of apples is "perfect," the unskilled apple artist may take it for granted that the fruit in question scales up the standard.

The growers who have made an exhibit of fruit, 180 in number, have lived with each other for the large prizes. The Mosier valley, where they raise "just as good as Hood River," is in evidence with a display of 36 boxes of perfect apples. Up to date there are 150 exhibitors listed in the Hood River section.

J. A. Wuest of Portland, who has an orchard in Hood River, will in all probability take the sweepstakes prize for the largest apple. He has just surprised the exhibitors in his class by bringing out a Gloria Mundi that weighs 88 ounces, which is one half ounce above the Wolf River exhibited by Noah Bone, which had everything beat until today.

Professor H. E. Van Deman of Washington, D. C., who is the sole judge at the fruit fair, has been on the ground making careful comparisons. When interviewed he said:

"This is the toughest job that I have come up against in the apple show business. I expected this, however. This is the finest thing I have ever seen of its kind. I have not yet found an apple that shows imperfection. It is a tough job, indeed, and I will be splitting hairs before I am through with judging this fruit. However, I think I'll get through with the job all right, and after all it's a most delightful task."

Large crowds are attending the fair, despite the fact that it set in to rain early last evening. The prizes will be awarded tomorrow and the car to be sent to Chicago will be selected.

BRUTAL HORSE BEATER GIVEN SOME OF SAME

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 29.—Any man who knocks down a horse beater in Tacoma by virtue of that act becomes a member of the Tacoma Humane society. If he can produce evidence that he flogged his man, Humane Officer Van Voris will see that he is included in the membership of the society without cost.

This afternoon a dispute came about through a freak incident on Sixth avenue. Van Voris, while riding in a Sixth avenue car, saw a man beating a horse over the head with the butt end of his whip. A muscular pedestrian saw what was going forward and without hesitating a moment or saying a word to the driver stepped up and knocked him down, just as Van Voris reached the spot. The driver was dazed by the blow.

"You're a member of the Tacoma Humane society," shouted Van Voris to the man, who was rapidly walking away to avoid arrest.

"No, I'm not, but I'm a human being," responded the man. He refused to give his name. "But he's a member of our society just the same," said Van Voris, "with a full vote and voice whenever he chooses to show up."

BOY SMOTHERED UNDER GRAIN

Huge Pile of Wheat Tumbles Over on Him and He Will Probably Die.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 29.—Lloyd Simpson, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Olney Simpson, is hovering between life and death as the result of an accident which occurred yesterday afternoon on the Simpson farm 13 miles northwest of this city. While watching Charles Howdysheer engaged in vitrioliing wheat the pile of grain suddenly toppled over, pinning both man and boy to the ground. The mother of the boy heard the cries of the former and hastened to extricate him, and together they released the child, who was completely buried by snags. Dr. L. U. Temple was summoned and attended him all night, but was unable to restore him to consciousness. It is doubtful whether he will survive. Howdysheer escaped with only a severely injured leg.

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9-YEAR-OLD BOY TOOK WHEELS TO RIDE HOME AND LEFT THEM WHEREVER HE DISMOUNTED.

Walla Walla, Oct. 29.—Discovery has been made of the thief who has been stealing bicycles in the city for the past two months in a nine year old lad named Frankie Meyers. The little fellow's father caught him with a wheel and brought the machine to police headquarters. And in this the police found a clue which has solved their troubles.

For the past eight or 10 weeks bicycles have been disappearing, and after search, about 90 per cent of them have usually been located. Now it appears that young Meyers has simply appropriated the nearest bicycle he could find whenever he wanted to go anywhere and left it near his destination to be picked up.

The Meyers lad lives with his aunt in the suburbs, his father being a resident of Milton. Hence the boy has taken wheels to make his way home shorter.

DEFECT IN PETITION; BROWNFIELD IS LOSER

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 29.—The first nominating petition for the coming municipal election has been filed. It was in behalf of C. W. Brownfield for councilman for "East Pendleton precinct." But councilmen are not elected by precincts and in consequence of the fact it would seem that the petition is ineffective. It was evidently the intention of the petitioners to nominate Mr. Brownfield for councilman from the First ward to fill the vacancy to be left by Councilman Mumm. But they failed to do so. The Brownfield petition is also defective in that it does not set forth the party or political principle for which the candidate stands.
