Held Examinations Soon.—On application to E. A. Light at the local post-office information will be furnished to prospective applicants for various positions, examinations for which are to be held shortly. An examination for library cataloguers will be given November 24. One for the purpose of filling junior electrical engineer's vacancy will be held November 25 and 26. On the same date applicants for the position of assistant in the astronomical library of the Smithsonian institution will have a chance to take an examination. A test for zoologists will also be given on the same date. The position to be filled by that of junior zoologist in the department of agriculture.

Court Reverses Vaughn Case.—Circuit Judge Cleland, Gantenbein and Morrow yesterday afternoon heard argument on the contention of John C. Vaughn, attorney for C. C. Vaughn, that the latter was not legally sentenced by Judge Bronaugh to serve four months in jail for an assault on his wife's escort several months ago. Because Vaughn was then released upon his own recognizance upon his promise to leave the state it is now contended that the court lost jurisdiction over him in that case. Deputy District Attorney Page appeared for the state and argued that a habeas corpus writ should not issue. The judges will announce their decision tomorrow morning.

Object to Red Light.—Upon complaint of Sequest Brothers, hardware dealers at 60 Sixth street, the police have served notice upon proprietors at 209 and 218 Pine streets to conduct orderly houses. The merchants state that the general business community objects to the red light district crowding upon the business and resident portion of the city. Upon investigation by Sergeant Goits of the police department he found the complaint to be just, and ordered the places to close. At 209 the place had recently changed hands, and the new proprietor claimed he did not know what kind of place it was. He stated he would dispose of it immediately.

Found Dead in Bed.—Joseph Bloomer, 75 years old, 238 Russell street, was found dead in his bed Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Heart trouble is considered the cause. He had been living alone the past two weeks since his wife is in the hospital, and from all indications the man had been dead since Tuesday. The first suspicion of anything being wrong at the Bloomer home was when Samuel Leopold, his nephew, went to the home and found the doors locked. With Patrolman R. N. Field they forced an entrance and found the man lying in bed. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 1 o'clock from the chapel of Dunning, McIntee & Gilbaugh.

City Barn Contract Let.—Contract for building the new city barn at Powell and Milwaukee streets was yesterday recommended to be awarded to the United Engineering & Construction Co., of Portland. The bid of that company, the lowest received by the street cleaning committee of the executive board, was \$26,987. The contractor agrees to complete the building in 180 days. Competition for the award was keen. Thirteen companies submitted bids. The plans and specifications call for two story structure of reinforced concrete. The building will be electric lighted.

Dr. Wise to Speak.—Dr. Jonah B. Wise will speak this evening at Temple Beth Israel on "Moral Initiative" and will treat of the life and work of Cesare Lombroso. The service begins at 8 o'clock and the Saturday morning service begins at 10:30 o'clock. At the evening service the musical program under the direction of Mrs. Rose Bloch-Bauer will be as follows: "The Lord Is My Light," (Dudley Buck) soprano and tenor duet by Mrs. Bauer and Mr. Boyer; quartet, "Now the Day Is Over," (Tours). All men and women are welcome.

Joy Wheel Bothering Guests.—Owing to the disturbance of guests in the Oregon hotel by the joy wheel located in the Merrill building on Seventh street, that machine of pleasure has been closed, and attached by the builder, W. L. Buckner. The wheel made so much noise that the hotel people complained, and the promoters of the affair left town without paying for the erection. The men who had it constructed are C. A. Martin and H. E. Bohlen. It cost \$30.40, of which only \$12.15 was paid, alleges Buckner.

Could Not Find Timber.—False representation of timber tracts in Douglas county has brought about five suits against W. F. Minard, a real estate dealer in the Worcester building. Elvina Gray, Fred W. Patt, Martha Kilgill, Olive M. Pratt and Precilla Rawlinson charge him with selling land from a tract of timber for \$150. Upon investigation it is found that no such timber exists. The suits have been started in the justice courts.

School Teacher Arrested.—W. C. McKee, formerly professor in the schools at Oregon City, was arrested today on a charge of larceny by bailer. He has been in the offices of the Portland Gas company, at which place he was apprehended. He is charged with defrauding Dr. A. L. Beattie and will be taken to Oregon City.

Police Investigate Mystery.—The investigation is still on in the case of Mrs. Jeanette Osborne, who was found dead Sunday in the bathroom of the Swartz hotel. The coroner's jury directed that the police department take

up the case and Police Detectives Mallet and Craddock have been placed on the matter. J. I. Smith who was found in the room with Mrs. Osborne, has recovered from being overcome by the gas.

Wife Wants Support.—Suit for maintenance has been begun in the circuit court by Annie E. Coote against Orville W. Coote. The absentee husband, who is said to be in San Francisco, is accused of leaving his wife in 1928 and of providing nothing for her support, although he owns property in Portland as well as in California. Mrs. Coote asks for \$50 per month, and has attached his Multnomah county property.

Automobile Wrecks Fire Plug.—In trying to get out of the way of another wagon yesterday afternoon the automobile belonging to W. F. Stine, 511 Corbett building, backed into the fire plug at Eleventh and Everett streets, and wrecked the rear of the machine. The fire plug was torn off, and the department was called to stop the flow of water.

Funeral of Edmund Crosby.—The funeral of Edmund Crosby, 85 years old, was held this morning at 10 o'clock from his late residence, 335 Clackamas street. He died Thursday suddenly from an attack of heart trouble. The deceased came to Portland in 1901 from New England.

Dies on Way to Hospital.—Ralph Paganucci, an Italian laborer, died yesterday afternoon while being taken to the hospital. He became ill while working on the Madison street bridge. Heart trouble was the cause.

Alleged to Be Gambler.—Upon a charge of maintaining a gambling place, Jack Ellkamp has been arrested and will be tried in municipal court November 2. He was arrested last evening by Sergeant Goits. The place he conducts

is at Third and Ankeny streets, which place was raided Tuesday evening.

Dr. Hugh Francis Dies.—Dr. Hugh Francis, for three years mayor of Warrenton, Idaho, and formerly prominent in Idaho politics, died Wednesday morning at 7:45 in Seattle. He had been suffering with liver trouble for several months and had gone to Seattle for treatment. In 1898 Dr. Francis married Miss Harriet B. Johnson of Portland. The funeral will take place in Seattle Saturday evening, after which the body will be brought to Portland for interment. Dr. Francis is survived by his widow, a brother, Harry Francis, of Warrenton; a sister, Mrs. Sanford Belmeyer of Seattle and relatives residing in Nebraska.

Frauds Cripple Will Break Back.—Harry Smith, alias Joe White, picked up on the street for begging and claiming to have a crippled arm and hand, was given 90 days on the rock pile today in municipal court. The crippled arm and hand are fictitious.

1300 MILES NEW WIRELESS RECORD

MILITARY POST IN ALASKA IN COMMUNICATION WITH STEAMER

FAR AT SEA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—More evidence of the successful working of the military wireless telegraph station in Alaska is shown in a report from First Lieutenant E. J. JEANET, Fifteenth Infantry, at FORT GIBSON.

On the night of September 23d, the station at FORT GIBSON worked well BOTH WAYS WITH THE STEAMER "MINNESOTA" en route to JAPAN, about 200 miles south of MIKAP PASS AND ABOUT 100 MILES FROM THE WIRELESS STATION.

The "MINNESOTA" also reported hearing messages from FORT GIBSON, STONG AND LOUD, MORE THAN 500 MILES OF THE DISTANCE TRAVELED BY THE MESSAGES FROM FORT GIBSON WAS OVERLAND, AND THE STATION AT THAT PLACE ALSO PICKED UP MESSAGES FROM THE STEAMER "MINNESOTA" en route to JAPAN.
