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NORTH COAST'S TROUBLES ENDED

Get Together With Kennebec's Council and Work Is to Be Rushed.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Kennebec, Wash., Oct. 26.—The North Coast railroad, after several months of surveying, buying of options and negotiating with the city and property owners, is now practically free to build its line through this city along its original survey.

Mr. Woods, agreed to build a concrete, brick or stone depot, with cement platform, and to maintain a private crossing near the depot and electric lights at all crossings in the city.

MRS. PANKHURST ON THE USE OF ACID

(Dated From Leadville, Oct. 26.—Mrs. Julia Pankhurst, head of the suffrage movement in England, in discussing the act of Mrs. Chapman, a British suffragette, in attempting with acid to destroy ballot cans at the Berrymead bye-election yesterday, said:

"I would not say that I am delighted with the methods adopted by Mrs. Chapman, but I cannot say that her action was not justified."

When asked if she believed any woman was justified in burning election officers to gain the ends of the suffragette movement, Mrs. Pankhurst said:

"I cannot say as to that but I am positive that she did not do any more than the men would have done had they been in her place and found the polls closed" against them.
