Fall on Harkness for Three Runs and Do Unusual Stunt.

Los Angeles, Oct. 30.—For the third successive day the Los Angeles ball players grabbed the game away from Portland in the eighth inning yesterday, 4 to 1. The oldest baseball hands say they never heard of such an occurrence in the history of the Coast league. Angel fans are beginning to think that the eighth inning is their lucky inning. Portland led off with a run in the fourth inning, their only score of the matinee. Granev whanged out a single and took second on McCredie's sacrifice. Fisher's single into center scored Granev.

Los Angeles tied up the score in the seventh frame. Smith rapped a double to left and Delmas sacrificed him to third. He scored on Ort's bad throw to catch him overrunning the bag.

In the eighth inning Daley walked and reached second. Godwin's single scored Pete. Godwin and Ross were safe when Harkness fielded the latter's bunt too late to third to catch Godwin. Beall scored Godwin on a single to right and Wheeler's double registered Ross.

SAM LANGFORD, REAL PUG, GOES HOT ON TRAIL OF JACK JOHNSON

New York, Oct. 30.—"Begger" Sam Langford, a real scrapper, is on the warpath again. This time he is on the trail of Champion Jack Johnson, who yesterday signed final articles for a finish fight with James J. Jeffries, which is to be pulled off some time before July 5, 1910. Accompanied by his manager, Joe Woodman, "Begger" Sam arrived in New York this morning with a certified check for \$1000.

"You see this check?" said the Boston demon to a United Press representative.

"Well, it's all for Jack Johnson. I am willing to meet that negro any

old time at any old place and for any old amount. I shall keep on Johnson's trail until he signs or admits that he is afraid to meet me.

"Isn't it strange that when I am away up in Boston one hears all sorts of fight noises, but just as soon as I appear on the scene all of the pugs mysteriously vanish? What do you suppose is the matter with them all?"

I guess I must have somebody's goat," George Little, manager of Johnson, declared that he would not pay any attention to Langford until his man had cleaned up Jeffries.

LOS ANGELES WILL BID HIGH FOR WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP FIGHT

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 30.—When the bids of the Jeffries-Johnson battle for the world's heavyweight championship are opened, December 1, Los Angeles will be a contender for the pugilistic plum of the century.

Tom McCarey, the local fight promoter, is going after the attraction, and, according to his belief, he has more than an even chance to win out.

"I want this fight," said McCarey today when told that the heavyweights had affixed their signatures to articles assuring the match, "and when the bids are opened, don't anyone be surprised

if the top offer comes from Los Angeles. I've never yet been outbid for a fight, and I don't intend that I shall in this case. My plans are laid; I won't tip them off by announcing what amount will be offered. The fact that the men have agreed to fight before the club offering the largest purse suits me to a nicety. Los Angeles stands an excellent chance to land the battle."

POWELL KNOCKS AGGIES SHATTER FRAYNE TO MAT WHITMAN HOPES

Low Staggers Johnny With Short Uppercut and the Bout Is Stopped.

Expected Much From Best Team in History but Touchdowns Count.

San Francisco, Oct. 30.—Local fight followers today are trying to figure out the cause for the reversal of form manifested by "Rapid Fire" Johnny Frayne, who last night practically was knocked out by Lew Powell in the eighth round of what was to have been a 20-round bout. The blow which started Johnny to going was a short right uppercut, delivered just as the men were going out of a clinch.

When the blow, which only traveled a few inches at best, landed on the point of Johnny's chin his knees sagged and, dropping to the floor, he turned a complete somersault.

To those at the ring-side the blow did not appear to have enough steam behind it to even distress a man that was in fair condition. When Johnny arose he apparently was in a bad way and reeled all around the ring.

Powell's Blows Man.

Frayne had not been on his feet hardly a second before Powell rushed his man and again sent Johnny to the mat with another left tap to the jaw. This time Johnny sprawled out on the floor and it looked as though he were done for. At the count of eight, however, Frayne was again on his feet and staggering about the ring.

Again Powell closed in on his man and sent Frayne to the floor for the third time with a succession of choppy rights to the jaw. For the third time the Frayne had staggered to his feet, and before Powell could send over the sleep producing punch a police lieutenant ordered Referee Eddie Smith to stop the fight.

Previous to the final round neither had landed a solid punch. The preceding rounds were a series of feints and clinches, with neither man having an advantage. The crowd, tired of the wrestling exhibition, voiced its disgust by yelling "Fight! Fight!"

No Class Apparent.

At this both men perked up a little, but at no time during the exhibition did either of them show the class which they undoubtedly possessed.

When Frayne entered the ring it was evident that he was nervous. Some one in the bleachers yelled "You've got his goat already, Lew."

Powell was the aggressor at all times and had Frayne backing continually.

The real fight of the night was a preliminary furnished by Tommy McCarthy and Frankie Smith. The men went at each other at the top of the gong, and there was not an idle moment during the aggressive, and kept the crowd on its feet during the entire contest. A Referee Baker's decision of a draw was well received.

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 30.—O. A. C. 10, Whitman 6.

This tells the story of the blasting of the brightest football hopes Whitman ever had. Stories have been sent out that Whitman did not expect much, and Captain Borleske had publicly said that they had no chance at the championship ship. But this was not their real belief. They did not think that Whitman was weak. The real idea that the missionaries had the best team and the best coach in the history of the college, and that the championship would be landed. The defeat was a bitter surprise.

O. A. C. has a better football team than Whitman. That is all there is to it, and anyone who saw the game cannot but admit it. At times the missionaries played great ball, and the goal of the Aggies was sometimes in danger, but the visitors always braced, and had not Borleske got away for an 80 yard run after catching a punt the missionaries would have had a goose egg.

Beef Helps Some.

On the forward passes, inside kicks and modern football, Whitman far surpassed the farmers, but with beef and brawn the latter forced the whitman line for two long marches down the field, gaining a game that was all theirs from start to finish. The visitors tried no new football, their beef was their strength, and on it they won, although Reynolds, their quarterback, got away for some pretty runs.

In the first half the ball saw-sawed for some 15 minutes, the farmers running it down to Whitman's 10 yard line, where they were held. Borleske punted and Wallace of the O. A. C. recovered the ball in the middle of the field. Then began a march, straight down the field. At the three yard line the pigskin was given to Keck, the big fullback for the Aggies, who plunged through the center of the line for a touchdown, which he failed to convert into a goal.

After the second kickoff, the game turned in Whitman's favor, and Borleske narrowly missed a try for a field goal from placement, but failed. The first half ended with the ball in Whitman's possession on the 20 yard line.

Sudden Touchdown.

In the second half Whitman kicked off, and the Aggies started things at once, and before the missionaries were aware of it, had placed it between the goal posts. They sent the ball down by short gains, then Reynolds got away for a 25 yard run, three bucks added nine and then he made another 15 yards, from which Bergman took it over. The try for a goal was failed.

The rest of the game was a see-saw. Whitman several times threatened the Aggies goal, and Borleske once caught a punt on the 80 yard line, from where he scored, straightarming and dodging in a pretty manner, so did O. A. C. field. With no interference he got away and made good. This was Whitman's only score.

From the time Belt converted the touchdown into a goal there was nothing doing. Whitman came dangerously near several times, so did O. A. C., and the game ended with the ball in O. A. C.'s possession in the middle of the field.

The Philadelphia and the National league All-Stars arrived in Portland last night and will play their first game on the Vaughn street grounds this afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. Come Mac's delegates Big Chief Bender to pitch the first game, and Frank Bancroft, who is managing the Nationals, will use Curtis on the mound.

Tomorrow the local fans will get a glimpse of Morgan's pitching and Bender's catching for the Athletics.

The famous Walter Johnson of Washington, the greatest sensation of the day, will twirl for the Nationals tomorrow, and he will be caught by Jack Bliss, who used to receive for Oakland in the Coast league.

A big crowd was on hand to greet the players when they came in from Tacoma last night. The ex-coasters were given a rousing welcome. Mike Mitchell and Pat Donahue were given an unusual welcome being former members of the Portland championship club of 1904.

The field is fairly dry and the diamond was burnt over with gasoline this morning to further the drying process. Unless it pours this afternoon, the two

big league clubs will play their scheduled game. The game tomorrow will also take place at 2:30 o'clock.

The players are telling interesting stories of Seattle's famous ball park. In the game over there Thursday the Athletics made four home runs over the fence. Coombs, the pitcher, lifted one over with the bases full. Oldring, Collins and Heine Helmsmiller each secured a homer. The case with which the ball was clouted out of the lot led Connie Mack to suggest that a ball over the fence there ought not to go for more than two bases. Had such a rule been in effect the Seattle players would not have been credited with 53 home runs for the season just closed.

Both Mack and Bancroft paid a tribute to the Portland fans in their knowledge and support of baseball. "Back east we were tipped off that Portland was the best baseball town on the Pacific coast," said Connie. "We thought that the reports of big crowds were padded, but we find that it is really so from authoritative sources. From our conversation with prominent fans last night we must admit that they know

more about baseball than a lot of the eastern people."

What promises to be one of the biggest crowds of the year will be at the grounds tomorrow. The crowd today will be a good average, but if it is warm and fair tomorrow the park will be bulging with the curious ones.
