REFERS TO DANCE HALLS AND RINKS

Rev. W. T. Euster Speaks of "Institution of Death" in Sermon.

Rev. W. T. Euster preached his third sermon on "The Institutions of Death" last night to a large congregation at the Sunnyside M. E. church. He read from a Chicago report to the effect that the saloons there had promised they would not allow gambling, nor encourage the social evil, nor sell to minors, if the city government would give them another chance. This was simply acknowledging that they had been guilty of all these things and when the saloon

promises to reform you may know what is coming.

The dance hall and skating rink were taken up. The speaker appealed to parents, to fathers and mothers. He said: "If you go to the Crittenton rescue home any day you will find a large number of girls, some of them hardly 15 years of age, and you will be told that one minister one day baptized seven babies there, all of whom were illegitimate, the oldest mother was 17, the youngest was 18 years of age.

"If you want to know the actual work done in the dance halls and skating rinks, you talk with the matron or with a good physician and you will find out. The betrayers of virtue and the ruin of homes, both men and women hold the territory of the dance halls and the skating rinks as their very own. Drugged candy and liquor play a leading part there.

"What hope has a poor innocent girl, perhaps not 15 years of age, when she gets into the tolls of these professional seducers, both men and women. You talk about abolishing the white slave traffic, but you never will abolish that until you annihilate the source. You can purify the water which is dirty in

the creek, but if you are wise you will go up to where the hogs are making it muddy all the time and drive them out, then the water will be pure right along.

"One of the most assuring things found anywhere is the fact that where the saloon is driven out the dance halls and skating rinks soon follow, and the social evil diminishes. How many young people do you think have disappeared within the past 10 years right from Sunnyside? They have gone from the church, the Sunday school, and from really healthy social circles. Where are they? What are they?

"Do you think 500 is too large an estimate in 10 years? You say: 'Well, they may be ruined for eternity.' Yes, but they are ruined for time also. They have gone, one by one, silently and without anyone noticing it very much. How many young men and young women do you think I have noticed go out of the influence of this church alone in one year?

"Where are they now? Well, one of them fills a suicide's grave, another of them is in the realm of sin, one of them is an aristocratic sinner but committing crime right along, and so on, and I know that in 10 years, from this entire community, at least 500 must have gone from the kingdom of virtue, and of religion."

FEARS FOR STUDENTS.

Highland Pastor Touches on Question of Religious Teaching.

Building his sermon on a conflict between a teacher of the state university and pastors of Eugene, Rev. E. S. Bolinger of the Highland Congregational

church last night addressed his audience on the theme, "Are the Young People Safe at the State University?" His text was, "Is It Well With My Son Abolom?"

Touching on the question of religious teaching in the schools, the minister declared that it is the duty of religious parents to protect their children by withdrawing them from the schools where the teachers remained silent on religious questions which came up in the course of study. He said in part:

"From press reports we learn that there is a conflict in Eugene. Several pastors of the city and a teacher in the State university are the principals. Students and church people have been on the firing line. It is a religious warfare. And the only comparison with the warfare in the wilderness of Mahanah is the query: Are the young people safe?"

"What God hath joined together state authorities with their constitutional powers can not separate. Try as we may, hedge our systems as we may, we can not educate a being innately religious and ignore the religious. As the mysteries of the unconscious into which are impacted the things of the past are unlocked by the processes of education, the religious will appear; and the questions and discussions that arose in the professor's class will arise as naturally as the birds sing mating in June. If such discussions did not arise in classes of history and literature, as well as other departments, it would be evidence conclusive that the teacher has no sunlight and is therefore incapable of teaching in a university.

"While this tremendous problem is forced upon the thinking public, never-
