

NEW TOWN TO BE NAMED HILLMAN

Rich Section to Have New Town on Oregon Trunk and Deschutes Roads.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Prineville, Or., Nov. 1.—F. E. Cooper, T. W. Taylor and Judge E. V. Littlefield, who have incorporated a company for the purpose of building a town at Trail Crossing, with a capital stock of \$100,000, are rushing the surveyors on the platting of a 400 acre farm into town lots and hope to have the plat filed with the county clerk here within a week.

The new town will be christened "Hillman," and is located on the final survey of the Oregon Trunk, about three miles south of the great bridge at Trail Crossing on Crooked river. This bridge will be 560 feet in length and the center of the span will be almost an equal distance from the surface of the water below. Much construction work has already been done on both sides of the river and in the immediate vicinity of the new town. The topography of the entire country make this the only feasible crossing from the highlands of the Hay Stack country to the table lands of the D. I. & P. segregation, and while the Hill road is practically already built through the town, the permanent surveys of the Harriman line runs through the site also, thus the blending of the two names into what will no doubt be a typical Oregon boom town.

President Cooper of the townsite company says the surveying work was delayed a little by getting the stakes from the Prineville Blasting Mills of this place, but work will be rushed with all speed and that contractors will soon begin the construction of buildings for the accommodation of the townsite people.

The place is the theological junction of a branch road from Prineville and the rich stock country tributary, with the main line and no doubt one of the best cities in the new empire will be located in that vicinity.

destruction of a registered article in transit is increased from \$45 to \$50, went into effect today. The increase of the registration fee was ordered by Postmaster General Hitchcock upon the recommendation of the committee which has made an investigation of the registration service and has found that this division has been conducted at a considerable loss to the government. It is expected that other important modifications of the registry system that should lessen, considerably the cost of its operation, will be made in the near future.

HUSBAND ALIENATED; WIFE SUES PARENTS

North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 1.—Annie Mullins has filed a suit in the superior court here against Pat Mullins and wife, asking to be awarded \$30,000 as damages for the alienation of the affections of her husband, John Mullins, son of the defendants.

Pat Mullins was mayor of Butte, Mont., in the boom days. John Mullins married a clerk in a store there and they lived happily until they moved to North Yakima six months later. About two years ago Annie Mullins secured a divorce here on the ground of cruelty. She now says the affections of her husband were alienated by his parents.

MENELIK'S EARLY DEATH IS FEARED

Berlin, Nov. 1.—A dispatch to the Tageblatt from Addis Ababa reports that King Menelik's condition has suddenly become worse and his death is considered possible. The king was stricken with apoplexy last Thursday. The patriarch has appointed Prince Lidj Jeassus, grandson of the king and heir apparent to the throne, in the presence of the ministers, in order to be prepared for any eventuality. Ras Tasma, the viceroy, has been appointed guardian of the prince, and regent.

KLIKITAT FARMERS FINISH SOWING

Husum, Wash., Nov. 1.—Farmers in the wheat belt in the central and eastern portions of Klickitat county have finished sowing their fall grain. The early wheat now makes a good showing. The acreage is about the same as last year. Copious rains all over the county insure a big yield of fall wheat.

Evangelist Comes to Athens.

JOHN D'S OFFER INSULTS SOUTH

Declared "Hook Worm" Reform Is Not Needed—May Not Accept Coin.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 1.—Declaring that it is an insult to the south, Bishop Warren Candler of the Methodist Episcopal church south, is agitating against the acceptance of John D. Rockefeller's gift of \$1,000,000 tendered to wage a fight for the extermination of the hook worm. Bishop Candler said:

"It is to be hoped that our people will not be taken in by Mr. Rockefeller's vermiform fund and hook-worm commission. This habit of singling out the south for all sorts of reforms, remedies and enlightenments is not for our benefit, and the too ready acceptance of these things on the part of some of our people is not to our credit."

"Mr. Rockefeller would take charge of both our heads and our stomachs. Rockefeller's gift follows a campaign in sensational magazines to picture the south as cursed by pellagra and hook worm. With a million of money and a sensational press engaged in portraying our section of the union as accursed, we wonder what other slanders is to be flung against it."

SEATTLE IS INVADED BY THE "HOOK WORM"

Seattle, Nov. 1.—Local scientists and physicians are taking deep interest in a case of the "hook worm" disease for the eradication of which John D. Rockefeller has just given \$1,000,000 to be used in the southern states, and which developed at the Seattle city hospital yesterday. The victim of the peculiar disease is John Hoffinger, 23 years old and a laborer. Hoffinger, who recently came here from Texas, wandered into the hospital three days ago and a diagnosis by Dr. Green disclosed the nature of his ailment. This is the only case of the kind ever recorded in this city and lectures on the subject will be held at the hospital training school.

Dr. Green said the malady was not incurable and predicted that it would not take long to restore the patient to health, now that the cause of his illness had been determined by the finding of the parasite.

SIXTEEN WOULD BE FOREST RANGERS

EFFORT TO RECONCILE SOUTHERN REPUBLICS

Buenos Ayres, Nov. 1.—The minister of Chile has solicited a conference with Chancellor Plaza. It is rumored that the object is to treat of renewing relations of Argentina with Bolivia, which by the conduct of Bolivia had been interrupted and that republic naturally looks to Chile as a mediator.

Bolivia has not yet been invited to the next Pan-American congress, which is to be held in this city, and cannot be unless there is a reconciliation between the two countries. The minister of foreign relations says the American foreign office at Washington has not invited Bolivia, knowing the rupture on account of that country's refusal to abide by the arbitration in the Peru-Bolivia case.

RAILROAD'S COMING CREATES NEW TOWN

Prineville, Or., Nov. 1.—A new town, the name of which has not been decided upon, is being planned near Trail Crossing on the Oregon Trunk survey, by A. B. Hammond and V. D. Welford, who are closely associated with the Oregon Trunk company. About 400 acres will be covered by the new town site, which will be on or near the junction of the branch railway that will be built to Prineville with the main line.

Redmond Has "Push Club."

Prineville, Or., Nov. 1.—Redmond business men have affected the organization of a "push club" and will soon line up with Prineville and Bend in the advertising of their immediate vicinity and Crook county.

Willamette Pioneer Dies.

Eugene, Or., Nov. 1.—Joseph Stout Jett, a pioneer of the Willamette valley, but for years a resident of Baker City, died in Eugene, Saturday at the age of 88 years from paralysis. The remains were shipped to Baker City Sunday for burial. He is survived by a wife and six grown children.

St. Louis Ordered to Seattle.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—It is expected that the cruiser St. Louis will sail for Seattle late today or tomorrow. This forenoon the vessel left the port for the Mare Island navy yard and is now taking on coal for her cruise north. According to the orders received by Captain Cleaveland, the vessel's stay at Seattle is indefinite.

SLEUTH ACCUSED OF BURGLARY

Caught Entering Property Which He Had Been Set to Guard.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—James Boynton, a Pinkerton detective, is in jail here charged with robbing the California Neckwear company, whose property he was paid to guard from thieves. He was captured by two sleuths of the Curtin Detective agency who had been employed by the proprietors of the store to watch him.

When captured last night he had removed his hat and coat and had climbed through a window fourteen feet above the floor. He carried a dark lantern, but no weapons.

Several days ago the proprietors discovered that the lock on the front door had been tampered with. They suspected Boynton and commissioned two Curtin men to watch him.

Boynton declares he is innocent of any wrong intent.

STEINHEIL TRIAL WILL BE RESUMED

Paris, Nov. 1.—The case of Madame Steinheil, charged with the murder of her husband and mother, begins next week and promises to be as sensational as anything in recent criminal records. Sixty witnesses will be called, among them being Frederick Burlingham, an American, brought into the case by one of the false identifications made by the prisoner.

All manner of rumors about the trial are current, including a supposed statement from the prisoner that she is about to divulge the name of the real assassin.
