Designation Is Accepted—The resignation of Frank Butz, the rural free delivery carrier on the Cornell and Barnes roads, which was turned into the postoffice authorities about a month ago, was accepted this morning. Gregory McGregor, son of the sexton of Mount Calvary cemetery, has been secured to fill the place. Mr. Butz was an efficient and very well known carrier both along his route and about the city. For years he was motorman of the Thirteenth street line when but one car ran back and forth. Butz acted in the capacity of motorman and also collected the fares, there being no conductor on the line those days. His resignation is regarded as a loss to the force of carriers. McGregor's route begins on the Cornell road, runs out as far as Cedar Mills and returns by way of the Barnes road down the Washington street canyon.

Will Speak at Eugene—In response to several requests that have come to him from Eugene, Rev. James D. Corby, pastor of the First Universalist church of this city, has consented to give two addresses in the university town Monday and Tuesday evenings, November 1 and 2. His topics will be appropriate to the recent questions that have been in the public mind. "The New Understanding Between God and Man" and "The Contributions of Liberal Christianity to the World's Faith." Rev. E. A. McAllister, the pioneer preacher of Universalism in Oregon, makes his residence in Eugene, though now retired from active work.

Evidence Circumstantial—The action of R. N. Bierce, who came here last week, in applying for his trunk at the depot yesterday caused his arrest last night by Postoffice Inspector Clement, assisted by Detectives Coleman and Snow. Bierce is suspected of complicity in looting a postoffice at Winters, California, last Tuesday, and his arrest resulted when he claimed a trunk which the federal detective has been "trailing." The accused man persistently denies any knowledge of the robbery and maintains that he will prove an alibi. The evidence against him is only circumstantial, according to Inspector Clement.

The mother of the child is an Indian woman, and the Hansens have both been in the toils of the local police.

SALOONMEN PAY HEAVY FINES

Three Attempt to Make Money Breaking Sunday Closing Law.

Three saloonkeepers were arrested Sunday for having their places open and selling liquor.

Harney Eschbacher, Sixth and Hoyt streets, was found by Patrolman J. L. Gould in his place and disposing of liquor. A secret entrance through a cigar store at 131 Sixth street was the method he used in keeping the place open. Money would enter through this, and liquor was handed out in the rear. Philip Fields was a patron of the place, and purchased a bottle of whiskey. The proprietor was fined \$25 in the municipal court.

Patrolman Gould also was told by the janitor at 187 1/2 Second street that he could get whiskey from the landlady at that number. He went to the first floor and asked for something to drink. He states she went to the storeroom and got the liquor for him. Minnie Puhback was arrested. The case will come up Tuesday.

J. Lucas, a saloonkeeper at 36 Russell street, was arrested by Patrolman Benjamin Peterson, and charged with having his place open. The patrolman knocked on the rear door, and five men went out the side door. When he gained entrance several empty glasses of liquor were found on the bar which the men had failed to hide. Lucas stated he was sick, and had gone to the saloon to get a drink. He was fined \$25.

United Wireless Telegraph Co., City—Dear Sir: The steamer 'MACKINAW' sailed from Seattle for St. Michael on June 18th last with a cargo of general merchandise. On the evening of June 29th, the steamer ran aground on the Yukon flats, and the wireless operator was instructed to communicate with our Mr. Hamilton at St. Michael, which he did, and as a result of this communication lighters were sent to the vessel to remove a portion of her cargo, after which she was floated and arrived safely at destination.

The steamer being equipped with wireless telegraphy no doubt saved us considerable expense in handling her cargo, and it is quite possible that she might have come to serious harm had she not been able to communicate with our representative at St. Michael by means of the wireless telegraphy.
