

PIERCE'S HOPE DASTARD BY ELECTION

Result of Yesterday's Election Looked Upon as Finish of County's Ambition to Name United States Senator.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 3.—Reports received this morning at the Republican headquarters show that Judge McCredie, for congress, carried every county in the district except Pierce by good majorities, taking into consideration the vote cast, which was light, with the exception of his home county, Clarke.

Wahkiakum gives McCredie 100 majority, according to report received today. The reports show, however, that in all except the Columbia counties the vote for Lister was proportionately larger than the vote for the Democratic candidate at the last election, when Cushman was elected.

The result in Pierce county is looked upon as the finish of Pierce county's ambitions to name the next United States senator, the vote for Lister showing that the Republicans of the county believe the nomination of Judge McCredie and a consequence the county cannot ask for the support of its man for the senate at the close of the term of Senator Pierce.

Tacoma Goes to Lister.
At the Lister headquarters, the returns show that Lister carried every ward in Tacoma and nearly every precinct and carried the county by about 700 majority, against a majority of 4798 for Cushman at the last election, when the full vote was polled, whereas the present vote was less than one third of that cast two years ago.

Against this they point out that Judge McCredie, whose friends claim that he carries Clarke county by 2000 with a full vote, gave Cushman 1345. Frank Lamborn of the Lister campaign committee, says the fight has been largely a personal one, and the friends of Lister believe that with one daily newspaper to the aid of McCredie could have been overcome. They point out that but a few weekly papers and not one daily paper in the district supported the Lister campaign.

CLARKE GIVES BIG
MAJORITY TO JUDGE
McCREDIE; DRY'S WIN

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 3.—The major forces in Vancouver yesterday won the fight that has been waged for several months on the question of license or no license. All the other precincts in Clarke outside of Vancouver went dry. The wet majority in Vancouver was 130.

WETS WIN CLOSELY
CONTESTED BALLOT
BATTLE IN COLUMBIA

Rainier, Or., Nov. 3.—Columbia county yesterday went wet by a majority of 44. It was the most closely contested election ever held in the county. The heaviest wet majorities were polled in Rainier and St. Helens. In Rainier the drys cast 110 votes, the wets 205; in St. Helens the drys cast 177 votes, the wets 209. Following are the results in the different precincts:

Big Majority in Kelso.
Kelso, Wash., Nov. 3.—Kelso and suburbs gave W. W. McCredie a majority of 360 in the election held yesterday. A severe rainstorm raged all day and this, together with a lack of interest, caused a very light vote. The precinct vote in this city was as follows:

FEET AND HEADS FURNISH CLUE

Woman Accuses Neighbor of Stealing and Killing Chickens.

Mrs. Samuel Blake, 554 East Thirty-sixth street, has a fondness for chicken, according to Mrs. Leah Nudelman, a neighbor who charges her with killing and eating 15 of her choice birds the past two weeks. A complaint was filed and warrant issued this morning in municipal court, in which Mrs. Blake is charged with destroying personal property.

Mrs. Nudelman states she has raised a number of fancy chickens the past season, and they are her only support. To this chicken raising, Mrs. Blake has objected, and threatened to kill the chickens as soon as they were large enough, states the complaint.

The complaint first missed her fowls two weeks ago, and from the heads and feet by the side of a block in the woods of Mrs. Blake, she decided her chickens had been taken by the woman.

Further investigation showed that eight chickens met the same fate last week, and Mrs. Nudelman states she has witnesses to show her neighbor took them.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 3.—The arrival of Eugene V. Debs from Girard, Kan., is expected here this afternoon to help the Industrial Workers of the World and the Socialists in their revolt against Spokane's prohibition of street speaking.

Three hundred men are coming from Seattle and 100 from Missoula. Mont. Thirty-five more came from Kallispell this morning.

The local I. W. W. received a telegram from the Portland revolutionists saying that as a result of a mass meeting called there nearly 300 more recruits would be sent from there. Two hundred arrived from Portland early this morning.

Assistance of the state militia will likely be needed to enable the police to cope with the situation. The city jail is crowded to capacity, with nearly 200 arrested, yet the fight is being waged with greater determination than it was yesterday.

Some authorities say they believe if the courts do not annul the ordinance in the cases now on trial bloodshed may result.

Quiet at Kalama.
Kalama, Wash., Nov. 3.—The vote in yesterday's election was the least cast in the county during the past 15 years. One precinct that usually casts 350 votes polled only 20. The precincts that polled more than 1500 votes last November in the election yesterday gave McCredie 44, Lister 117, the socialist 27 and Prohibition 13. Following is the vote:

Martins Bluff—McCredie 11, Kalama, McCredie 74, Lister 23; Castlerock, McCredie 58, Lister 23; Skamokawa, McCredie 56 votes and 48 of that number were for McCredie.

Below Normal at South Bend.
South Bend, Ind., Nov. 3.—The vote at the congressional election yesterday was much below the normal, partly owing to a heavy rainstorm. The returns in Pacific county, including the major precincts, give Judge McCredie (Rep.), 303 votes; Lister (Dem.), 175. McCredie's majority in the county will probably be from 250 to 300 votes.

Fraud Alleged at Washougal.
Washougal, Wash., Nov. 3.—Inspector Ladavasson of the dry-wet election at Washougal contests the election. He claims that the drys took seven men into a room where they had ballots and instructed them how to vote.

Result at Yacolt.
Yacolt, Wash., Nov. 3.—Yacolt remains wet. The result was: Wets, 56; drys, 43. Great interest was taken and although only 75 per cent of the legal voters registered nearly all of those registered voted. There are four saloons in Yacolt. The population is 350.

Oswego Goes Dry.
Oswego, Ore., Nov. 3.—A special prohibition election held at Oswego yesterday the town voted dry by a vote of 90 to 70. There was only one saloon in the place.

Lewis Goes to McCredie.
Chehalis, Wash., Nov. 3.—Twenty-five Lewis county precincts out of a total of 56 give Judge McCredie 483 and Lister 357. The vote was very light. The above includes all the principal cities, which have near 3000 voting strength.

"BOSS COX" WINS
IN CINCINNATI
Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 3.—The Republican machine here under "Boss" Cox was triumphant in yesterday's election. Dr. Schwab, the Cox nominee for mayor, was elected by an increased plurality, and the machine forces won all along the line. Dr. Schwab is the man against whom President Taft said he would like to vote.

MEDICAL MEN TO
EXAMINE PLAINTIFF
Judge Bronough in the circuit court has authorized a medical commission to examine into the injuries suffered by Meritt C. Lewis, who is suing the Portland Light & Power company for \$15,000 damages. She was hurt in a street car collision in Monticello. Upon the statements of Dr. A. E. Rockey the court directed that the commission be organized to make the examination.

RAINS CAUSE WATERS CARRY FALSE- WORK FOR NEW STRUCTURE ACROSS THE KALAMA.

Kelso, Wash., Nov. 3.—Damage to property in this vicinity by floods will be extensive if the rain continues. The recent warm rains caused a rise in the Cowlitz of about 12 1/2 feet and the stream is still rising at the rate of two inches an hour. The rain abated this morning and unless another hard down-pour comes within a short time there is little danger of a recurrence of the flood of November 1898.

Considerable driftwood is running in the Cowlitz but not enough to cause serious loss or damage unless it is allowed to pile up on the center pier of the Kelso bridge. In that case there is great danger of the destruction of the bridge. The steamer Colwell is now removing the drift from the pier.

Kalama River Rises.
Kalama, Wash., Nov. 3.—A sudden rise in the Kalama river last night caused the steel bridge to be raised a foot and a half. The steel for the new steel bridge, the loss to the contractors will be about \$1000. New false work will have to be put in and the steel flamed from the river and taken to the shop for repairs. The bridge is on the main road north and south road and will be greatly missed until the new steel bridge is completed.

No Anxiety at Castlerock.
Castlerock, Wash., Nov. 3.—The Cowlitz river at this place has risen a foot over nine feet and is still rising. It checked up somewhat yesterday afternoon and evening but the heavy rains during the night quickened it a little.

A few bolts were lost from a boom here and the boom is expected to come loose and none is anticipated. It is expected the rise will be checked by night, as the rain had almost ceased at 11:30 a. m. The absence of snow in the mountains causes a feeling of security. On account of the driftwood both ferries have stopped running.

Rancher Can't Milk Cows.
Aberdeen, Wash., Nov. 3.—The heavy norwester prevailing all day yesterday and most of the night has filled all of the streams to overflowing, causing much trouble to farmers and stockmen. Mr. Hullett, a rancher, living several miles up the Wishkah river, who has a milk route in Aberdeen, was 40 gallons short of his usual supply this morning, as the river had overflowed and he could not get to his cows. The country along the river is covered with mud, water and debris and Mr. Hullett was obliged to remove two trees that had fallen across the road.

Good Rain at Walls Walla.
Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 3.—The first chinook weather of the season hit town yesterday and a rise in temperature, accompanied by a warm, steady rain, has been experienced. The rain of the season less disagreeable than usual. From Monday night at 5 o'clock, until just 12 hours later, the mercury went up 26 degrees, and stood, with two exceptions, in California and South Carolina, higher than at any weather office in the United States.

The rain was an exceptionally heavy one, .77 of an inch falling over night, and wiping out the deficiency for the year, leaving an excess of one tenth. Since the first of the year there has been a precipitation of 1.49 and there is now an excess from September 1 of last year of .62.

Lewis River Rising.
Woodland, Wash., Nov. 3.—The cool weather of the latter part of last week caused considerable snowfall in the hills above here on the Lewis river, and the warmer weather and heavy rainfall of the past three days has caused a very heavy rise in the Lewis river at this point. The river is rising at the rate of one-foot an hour.

The steamer Mascot of the Lewis River Transportation company reached Woodland last night for the first time this fall, and will doubtless be able to come up for the remainder of the season. Captain Campbell of the upper river has been running the Etna for the past week.

ONE BANDIT
ROBS A BANK
Green Bay, Wis., Nov. 3.—A lone bandit this afternoon held up the Farmers' Exchange bank and escaped with \$4000. A posse is in close pursuit.

MAY BE BODY OF
THE MISSING DENNIS
Long Beach, Cal., Nov. 3.—Floating on the ocean between this city and Catalina Island, the body of an unidentified man, a heavy rope tied about his waist, was picked up yesterday by Captain Paschall of the launch Eagle. The body was clad in a blue serge suit, but there was nothing by which it could be identified. Sea birds had mutilated the face until recognition would have been impossible.

The theory has been advanced that the body is that of William Dennis, candidate for the Los Angeles board of education, who disappeared mysteriously from San Pedro 10 days ago. Dennis' wife recently received letters from Honolulu, purporting to have been written by her husband. The Los Angeles police authorities, notwithstanding these letters, believe Dennis was killed and robbed on the San Pedro waterfront, and his body thrown into the sea.

RAINFALL IS LESS
THAN THE NORMAL
The rain of the last few days, although not over by any means, is not expected to be so violent and the prediction of the weather office is showers and cooler weather tonight, with showers tomorrow. The precipitation for the storm since October 28, when it began, up to 5 o'clock this morning, was 2.28 inches, while that for the season, from September 1, is 47.7 inches, which is a lack of .47 inches of the normal precipitation for that period.

The winds along the Pacific coast, which have been very strong for the past few days, have moderated and the storm warnings have been discontinued.

YOUNG WIFE UNDERGOES DEAL OF CLOSE CROSS-EXAMINATION—HILL ASSERTS HE MERELY KISSED SISTER OF HIS SON-IN-LAW.

Cross-examination of Mrs. Beatrice L. Gadsby developed several dramatic situations this morning in the trial of the case in which she is suing William Gadsby and wife, the parents of her husband, Walter M. Gadsby, for \$300,000 damages for alienating the affections of the husband.

One of these situations arose when the plaintiff was called on to tell what took place at the beach in the summer of 1908, when her father, George H. Hill, was accused of unbecomingly conducting toward Walter's 14-year-old sister, Alice. She displayed an unexpected willingness to tell what term had been applied to her father, but John P. Logan, who was conducting the examination, avoided bringing out the exact word or nature of the charges, although conveying a strong intimation that Hill had been accused of a highly immoral act in the presence of the elder Mrs. Gadsby and Walter Gadsby.

Hill Kissed Girl.
The substance of this incident was that Hill went to the cottage where his daughter was and told her Walter was dying and Mrs. Gadsby senior wanted her to come over. On the way she met Mrs. Gadsby, who told her Walter was crying and to go and see what was the matter.

She found Walter in tears and asked him what was the matter, but he did not immediately reply. Soon after this his mother and Hill entered and there was a stormy scene, in which the ensuing term was thrown in the face of Hill.

Logan asked if Hill did not apologize in the presence of the little company for his conduct, but the witness said he merely declared that if he had done anything wrong he was willing to apologize. Hill asserts that he had merely kissed the girl.

Frail little Mrs. Gadsby, who is in quest of the big damages, was on the stand to answer a series of questions by Logan's rapid fire of questions at the witness, and said Logan was too "impetuous." Judge Morrow at one time rebuked Logan for making comments on the replies of the witness.

A number of photographs taken in California and at other places showing Mrs. Gadsby in company with either the Hills or the Gadsbys were ruled out by the court on the ground that they tended to prove nothing not already admitted.

Mrs. Gadsby was shown a list of wedding presents returned to the elder Mrs. Gadsby, with the latter's receipt therefor. She admitted the giving of these presents, but denied that everything had been returned.

All yesterday afternoon was consumed in leading the witness over the entries she had made in the diary in the early months of her married life. She admitted keeping such a book, but testified that Walter told her he had burned it. Logan produced the book and spent the afternoon reading passages that showed, first, her impatience with her husband's trip to shoot duck, and second, incidents of small kindnesses noted by the witness. Another purpose was to show the frequency of the plaintiff's visits to the home of her parents.

Among the entries admitted to be true was one telling how the elder Mrs. Gadsby took her from her husband when the daughter-in-law expressed a liking for it, and gave it to the witness. Other entries told of small gifts from time to time, including a pumpkin pie. Tears welled up in the eyes of the little wife as she admitted these entries, tending to show affection by the mother-in-law. She said that the cruel plan to win her husband away had not developed until after the time these kindnesses were recorded.

Domestic Giver Testimony.
The only other witness called so far was Mrs. Hovig, who was employed as a domestic in the Gadsby home at the time of the separation. She said she heard loud words and heard Walter say something about "mother" and "go home." The next Monday morning, she said, she was in the kitchen at the Gadsby home when the telephone rang and Beatrice (the plaintiff), asked for her husband. Walter was there, the witness said, but Mrs. Gadsby told her to go home. Walter was not there, and she obeyed instructions.

The defense will attack this testimony by evidence to show that the telephone was disconnected on Monday and that it was not possible for such a message to be received.

A big, gaping crowd came to the courthouse this morning to hear the testimony and filled most of the available standing room. Judge Morrow announced at noon that heretofore until the case ends a ballot will be placed at each door and no spectators admitted after the seats are filled.

It is believed that all day tomorrow will be required to finish the case, and perhaps longer. Mrs. Gadsby will finish her story this afternoon, but there are other witnesses for the plaintiff and some time will be required by the defense to complete its case.

WILL-KNOWN AS REALLY DEALER TO INVOLVE VETO Seems Destined for Defeat.

Mayor Simon has until next Monday in which to veto the bill board ordinance passed at the last council meeting and it is regarded as certain that he will send the measure back to the city lawmakers with his disapproval.

He said today that he had observed in reading the ordinance that it practically gives one local firm a monopoly on the street advertising business.

One of the clauses of the new ordinance provides that a license fee of \$1200 a year shall be paid for the privilege of operating an advertising business of the billboard variety. As Foster & Kleiser are the only large firm of sign writers and bill posters it is pointed out that the proposed law favors them.

Another provision of the ordinance would force labor unions and other organizations which resort to the banner carrying device to boycott merchants declared unclean, to go into court and prove that such banners were not advertisements.

A similar provision was contained in an ordinance introduced some time ago by Councilman Annand. The labor organizations protested against this measure and it was never brought up in the council for final passage. The bill board ordinance was used instead.

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Gave Present to Husband.
The witness admitted that Captain Gadsby gave her \$20 in July, 1908, at the coast. She said she spent \$2 for an Indian basket and Walter kept the remainder. She was led over several social occasions when all the family appeared to be in harmony. At a dance in honor of her sister's engagement Captain Gadsby gave her a diamond ring. A newspaper was introduced in evidence showing an account of the elaborate affair.

There was a trace of emotion in Walter Gadsby's face as his wife testified that he was always kind and affectionate to her and under the influence of his parents. When she told of the scene at the beach, when her father was accused, Walter stepped out of the courtroom and did not return until the incident was passed.

Was Happy With Husband.
The witness said that when she and Walter went to the coast in April, 1908, for two weeks, she was supremely happy. Many times she reiterated that she was happy with her husband when the elders were away. But she said she was not so happy when her mother-in-law was visiting, because her mother-in-law was writing letters seeking to influence Walter away from her.
