"Boosters" Hold Meeting.—The third meeting of the South Portland Boosters which took place last night was an interesting and enthusiastic one. The committee appointed at the previous meeting reported, and the views of the mayor on the Marquam gulch situation were well received. He promised to have the city engineer look up the matters placed before him and prepare estimates. The question of a fill and a bridge from Sheridan to Arthur streets was left in abeyance to the next meeting and the matter will be brought to the attention of the city councilmen by the Boosters. C. B. Pigott, Dr. Cottel and W. Gratch were appointed to act with the Civic Federation. The questions of hard surface streets and sanitation will have the attention of the Boosters.

To Attend Irrigation Meeting.—L. K. Moore of this city leaves tonight via the North Bank road for Prosser, Wash., for the purpose of attending the meeting at that city of the Land Owners' association, of which Mr. Moore is vice president, and W. Gratch, who is president, will be present. The meeting is for the purpose of adjusting any differences which may be found in reference to the irrigation contract, which the irrigation company has presented to the interested land owners. When this adjustment is made, which no doubt will follow, the huge project will be fairly launched, and one of the largest irrigation undertakings of this character will almost be assured.

No More Extensions.—City Engineer Morris stated before the street committee of the executive board yesterday afternoon that hereafter contractors will not be given extensions of time except for certain unavoidable causes of delay. In fixing the time for the completion of contracts the engineering department will make all reasonable allowances and if the contractors do not finish their work in the allotted time they will be required to pay fines provided by the city charter for such delinquencies.

At Temple Beth Israel.—Dr. Jonah E. Wise will preach this evening on "Religion of the New Covenant," under which subject he will present the Jewish faith in comparison with recent liberal "agitation." The choir under the direction of Mrs. Rose Blocher, will sing "I Will Give Unto Him," by Stainer, and a new arrangement of a traditional anthem, the "Ode Olom," or "Master Universal." Strangers are welcome. The Altar guild will meet Sunday at 11 a. m.

For Young People.—Evangelist Rev. Charles F. Weigle, who is now conducting a successful revival meeting in the Friends' church on the corner of Main and East Third streets, will deliver a sermon on "Traps for Young People," this evening at 7:30. This is a special young people's service, and in this sermon the harmful influence of some of the popular amusements of the day will be exposed. Rev. Weigle has wide experience and observation on these questions.

Belmont Needs Fixing.—The city engineer yesterday afternoon asked the street committee of the executive board to hurry the work of paving Belmont street between East Thirty-sixth and East Thirty-ninth streets. He declared that this street is the worst in the city and that traffic conditions are unspeakable. The three blocks are to be paved with bitulith to connect the pavement on both ends of the unsurfaced portion.

Logger Is Wounded.—While Daniel Cork, a logger, was sleeping in the saloon at Second and Davis yesterday afternoon, some one struck him a blow upon the head. The man was conveyed to the police station and seven stitches required to close the wound. He states a man has been following him for three months, in which he makes threats to kill him. The man disappeared.

and street, which at first threatened to destroy the plant. Three streams of water were turned on, and the blaze was soon under control. Fully \$10,000 worth of patterns are stored in this room. The origin of the fire is not known.

Death of Old Pioneer.—Dr. J. P. Powell died last Saturday at Gresham and thus was brought to a close the life history of one of the oldest and best known of the Multnomah county pioneers. He was born in North Carolina in 1822, crossed the plains in 1853 and in 1855 took up a donation land claim, part of which is now included in Gresham. He was a practicing physician and in the early days was one of the pioneer teachers of the county. He was the first teacher in the Columbia Slough school district. Later he helped organize district No. 4, now the seat of the Gresham high school. For several years he was coroner of this county and has always been active in county affairs. He is survived by his wife, who is 82 years old, and five of his 10 children are still living. Mrs. Sarah Wishard and Mrs. Jennie Salls of Portland, Mrs. Mary McCormick of Salem, Dr. J. N. Powell of San Francisco and Mrs. Minnie Clananah of Gresham.

Old Gun Disappears.—An old flint lock shotgun, 200 years old, has been reported stolen from John Plamondon, a logger, who left the gun at 60 North Sixth street. He is employed with the Peninsula Logging camp, and placed the weapon with some other goods in storage. The gun is highly prized as it is now a rare instrument. It was made in London.

WIRELESS BETWEEN TEXAS AND OREGON
Aerograms Sent Successfully from Houston to Chicago Overland
Port Arthur, Texas, Nov. 1.—Wireless communication direct overland between the Gulf of Mexico and the Great Lakes of the north was established last night, when a message was flashed from the Port Arthur station to the Record-Herald in Chicago. The weather conditions were ideal. The first message was as follows:
From Houston, Texas, via Port Arthur, Texas, November 1, sent at 9:55 p. m.:
Record-Herald, Chicago—This is the first wireless message from Texas direct to Chicago. Compliments from the Houston Post.
Twenty minutes later from the Record-Herald came the following:
From Chicago to the Houston Post, Houston, Texas, via Port Arthur—Aerogram received. Congratulations on new method of communication, which defies sleep, storm and washouts.—Record-Herald.—From Portland Telegram, Nov. 1, 1909.
