

TO HILLS
SHERIFF AND POSSE
PASCO MURDERER INTO
WALLA COUNTRY—MAN HUNTING
DOGS ARE ORDERED
FROM SPOKANE.

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.)
Pasco, Wash., Nov. 6.—Patrick Cavanaugh lies in the city morgue with his throat cut from ear to ear and James McDoyle is being pursued across the sand hills near Walla by a posse of men appointed as the result of a search for the murderer of the late Mrs. Cavanaugh. The search for the murderer of the late Mrs. Cavanaugh is being conducted by Sheriff T. V. DuVal, accompanied by Deputy Sheriffs Edward Carter, Harry Gray and Marshal Alf Buchanan left for the river, where, according to reports from two train crews, the fugitive had fled. At noon nothing had been heard from the posse, although fresh tracks had been discovered near the Snake river at Alinworth. Shortly after 6 o'clock a man was seen traveling rapidly in the direction of Walla. Nothing is known of the murderer although several men here say that he was recently discharged from a western military garrison and had been in the service several years. Yesterday he made the assertion that he owned a small ranch near The Dalles.

Cavanaugh had been employed in Pasco for the past two years as a common laborer. McDoyle's bloody overalls have been discovered by Special Agent Banick. The bounds of Harry Draper of Spokane have been ordered.

Dr. H. M. Patton is plaintiff in a suit in the circuit court against E. R. Charles for \$11,275 alleged to be due under a contract whereby a corporation was organized to exploit and sell a patent electro-thermal garment. He says that this is a good thing, but the patent was finally granted to him in capital in and finally came to him last January and asked him to help place it on the market, offering to pay him well if the right people were interested.

Dr. Patton says he devoted some time to the work and finally persuaded Arthur C. Strubling and the latter's father to finance the company, which filed articles of incorporation with \$150,000 capital, under the name of the United Electric Garment company. All of the stock was issued in the name of Charles, except one share each to Dr. Patton, Strubling and Claud E. Hicks. Dr. Patton says he was promised a compensation for his work of 10 per cent of all the money received from Strubling and 10 per cent, either in cash or in shares, of all the stock held by Charles, except the share set aside in escrow for Strubling. He asserts that under this agreement he is entitled to at least \$11,275, as Charles holds at least \$100,000 worth of stock in addition to the escrow shares.

Two men entombed when shaft caves.
Carlin, Nev., Nov. 6.—Rescuers are working desperately this afternoon in an effort to reach Charles Moody and William Anderson, the two miners entombed at the bottom of the Cooper King mine, 12 miles north of Carlin. It is not known whether or not they are alive. The rescuers have no means of communicating with the imprisoned men, who were working at the bottom of the main shaft when the cavern started, precipitating 200 tons of earth to the floor of the mine. The cavern, which occurs yesterday, started 50 feet from the surface of the main shaft, which is 155 feet deep. Following the cavern a rescue party was organized and the work of clearing away the debris started.

Famous "Countess" dies of tuberculosis.
San Francisco, Nov. 6.—"Countess" Leona Brooks, famous for her beauty and for her romance with Edward J. Smith, who accompanied with thousands of dollars while tax collector for San Francisco, died early today at the French hospital, of tuberculosis.

SEA POWER OF HONDURAS ANNIHILATED—NAVAL HEROES GET DRUNK ON SMUGGLER.
DIRECTORS FEEL DEEPLY GRATEFUL FOR TAG DAY RESULTS.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 6.—The gunboat Tumbala, constituting the entire Honduran navy, was sunk near Puerto Cortes after a desperate fight with smugglers, according to passengers arriving today on the steamer Panama from Beta Honduras. The story of the destruction of the Honduran navy, as told here, is a new chapter in sea history. It is as follows: Captain Zleita, commanding the Tumbala, encountered a strange coasting steamship and, upon being convinced that it was operated by smugglers, demanded its surrender. The smugglers offered little resistance and the captain with nearly all his crew then boarded the captured vessel and took possession of it.

The victory was accomplished so easily that a celebration was held and dinner was served on the smugglers' boat. There were good things to eat and no lack of wine. After dinner the wily smugglers captured their captors, one and all, and the captain included in their blinding net, set them adrift in small boats. Then the smugglers boarded the man of war and scuttled her. The Tumbala was encountered by the fruit steamer Harold, which towed her toward shore, but she sank before shallow water could be reached. The crew of the gunboat nearly all succeeded in reaching shore, it is said, in the small boats.

Little interest in Salem Electric.
Salem, Nov. 6.—Polls opened at 12 o'clock today for the nomination by direct primary of candidates for the city council for the term beginning December 5. There will be one councilman nominated from each of the seven wards and an extra councilman in the event of a tie. The total registration for the primaries is 92, against 1452 a year ago, which shows that little interest is being taken in today's elections.

Baron Uchida to be ambassador.

He will succeed Baron Kogoro Takahira, who at present is in Tokio. News of Uchida's appointment was contained in a telegram received at the state department today from United States Ambassador Ogden at Tokio.

W. T. SHANAHAN PASSES AWAY
FOUNDER OF OREGON HUMANE SOCIETY EXPRESSES DEEPLY.

William Thomas Shanahan, founder and corresponding secretary of the Oregon Humane society, who has been ill for some weeks, died at his home in Spokane, Idaho, at 10 o'clock this morning. He was 74 years old. He was born in Cassopolis, Mich., in 1835. He married Miss Harriet Taggart in 1852. He came to Oregon in 1862 and for many years had lived at 409 Sixteenth street. It is thought that grief caused by the death of his wife a few months ago hastened his own death.

Mr. Shanahan is survived by three children: Mrs. Agnes Skinner, Ewahu Station; Mrs. Carolyn Mayes, wife of George Mayes, living at the same address; and Frederick Shanahan, living on Vashon Island, Puget sound. No definite funeral arrangements have been made, but it is thought that the body will be cremated tomorrow.
