City Has Some Wire Cables—City Attorney Kavanagh called upon Mayor Simon this morning to confer with him as to what the city intends to do with the stock of underground wire cables in the hands of the fire department. The city electrician has written a letter to the city attorney, offering to sell the stock of wire cables at a price of \$100,000. The cables were purchased during the Lane administration. Under the franchise granted by the city to the telephone company in 1904, the city was required to furnish all the cables needed by the city. The former administration had sanctioned the buying of the cables, and had already laid a great part of them before official cognizance in the form of the aforementioned clause in the franchise.

Recommended to Mercy—Thomas O'Rourke, who was charged with assault with a knife, being armed with a dangerous weapon, was convicted on a compromise verdict by a jury in Judge Cleland's department of the circuit court yesterday afternoon. O'Rourke was accused of being the accomplice of John Womaldorf, who pleaded guilty recently to the charge of holding up Ed Campbell at Oakley Green last August. O'Rourke was found guilty of helping to perform the holdup, but the jury found that he was not armed and recommended him to the extreme leniency of the court. The penalty is from 3 to 15 years.

Ex-Senator in the Pulpit—Ex-Senator Robert A. Booth will occupy the pulpit of Centenary Methodist Episcopal church Sunday morning at 10:30. It is the senator's first appearance in the pulpit of the churches of Portland. He has been for some years the president of the Layman's association of the Oregon conference, and has delivered eloquent addresses in many of the churches of the state. He brings out some startling things on what change the laymen would make in running the church if they had the power.

At the Museum of Art—The galleries of the Museum of Art are open each day from 9 until 5 o'clock. On Sunday and Saturday afternoons and also Sundays from 2 to 5. In addition to the galleries, the studios of the art school will be open to visitors on Sunday afternoon this week. On the walls will be displayed some of the best work of the school, including studies by students in the design, color and drawing classes. The school closes its first month with an enrollment of over 70 students.

Attendance on Trade Schools—The great interest taken in the Trades school is shown by the registration rolls of the night school department of the trades which has been opened, but a short time. Almost 90 students are enrolled. The attendance at the day school is 118 and Principal Hamilton expects to see it reach 125 before the first of the year. The girls' cooking and sewing classes will be conducted in conjunction with the other departments will be opened Monday next.

Blind Pig Raided—Under the sign "Nash Brothers, Contractors," in a shack at the University Park station, a full grown "blind pig" was found last night and raided by Sergeant E. P. Smith and Patrolman Wellbrook. They confiscated 22 bottles of beer and a gallon of whiskey. John and "Doc" Nash are charged with running the place and the latter was arrested this morning by Sergeant Smith. "Doc" Nash was in the place when the officers made the raid, but escaped.

Charged with Horse Stealing—Martin Everson, a woodchopper from Newberg, Or., was arrested yesterday afternoon by Constable Wagner on a charge of stealing a horse and buggy October 28. The rig belonged to S. B. Graham, president of the Portland Dairy association, who left his horse tied to the street. Everson drove the animal to the Columbia stables, sold the buggy and was attempting to dispose of the horse. The value of the horse and buggy is \$400. Everson is held in the county jail upon default of \$2000 bonds.

Woodstock Needs School—Ben Rieland, president of the Woodstock Ward Development League, says the Woodstock district needs a new schoolhouse of 12 rooms, so rapidly has the school population grown out in that district during the past year. Mr. Rieland asked the school board yesterday to include the new school building in the annual budget to be submitted to the taxpayers at the annual meeting.

County Teachers' Institute—The annual institute of Multnomah county teachers will be held from Tuesday, November 24, to and including Saturday, November 27. All the city schools will be closed during the session of the institute as the teachers are compelled by law to attend the institute, which will be convened in the Washington high school building.

Rain or Shine—Free autos will meet you at East Twenty-second and Thompson streets, Sunday, November 7, between the hours of 1:30 p. m. and 5 p. m., and take you to Alameda Park, the "Tuxedo" of Portland, and back to the carline. Take Broadway car. Last Sunday you did not go because weather was threatening, but your friends did. Better go this time.

Approves Boxing Game—Chief of Police Cox received a communication this morning from P. R. Rogers, a prominent Boston physician, in which he expressed his pleasure in knowing that boxing and wrestling had been resumed here. The eastern physician stated that the best move any city made in handling such athletic exhibitions was to place a 10 round limit without a referee's decision.

Question Still Open—Nothing definite was decided on at the meeting of the aeroplane tournament enthusiasts at the Oregon hotel yesterday with Richard Kloeber of Paris, and another meeting will probably be held in a few days. The proposition is one of such magnitude that those interested are going slowly before entering into a contract with the Europeans.

Woman Had Bolt of Cloth—Mrs. Jane Nyhusen was arrested this morning by Constable Wagner upon a complaint that she had stolen eight yards of cravette from Helen Kierbeck, a woman's tailor. The woman is alleged to have entered the shop, picked up a bolt of the goods, and walked out. The cloth was found in her possession. It is valued at \$18.

Justice to the Jews—Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher, pastor of the White Temple, seems to have aroused the ire of the

Jewish Tribune in this city by some remarks of his in a recent sermon. He says the editor of the Tribune so misrepresented him that he proposes to preach next Sunday night, November 7, on "Justice to the Jew." There will be special music for the occasion and Dr. Brougher extends a cordial invitation to the Jews of the city to attend the service.

Plans for New Bridge—Plans for the new bridge across Sullivan's gulch at East Twelfth street have been prepared by Engineer E. E. Howard of the firm of Waddell & Harrington, and they will be submitted to the executive board for approval, probably at its next meeting. The structure will be of reinforced concrete, and will be similar to the bridge across Sullivan's gulch at Grand and Union avenues.

Must Pay Licenses—Deputy City Auditor Joseph Hutchinson is preparing a statement of all delinquent license holders, and as soon as warrants can be gotten ready these will be served upon all who still owe for their licenses. The second hand men and pawn brokers will be the first class of fee payers who will be arrested.

Pawnshop Is Robbed—The pawnshop of Henry Benjamin, 88 North Third street, was entered last evening by burglars and goods to the value of \$200 were stolen. Entrance was gained through a rear window. The stolen goods consisted largely of coats and gold watches. A Spanish coin case 150 years old was also taken.

HIGH SCHOOL
TEACHER IS
AFFINITY

Arthur J. Schureman and Miss Vivian Groves Are in County Jail, Arrested on Charges Made by Wife He Deserted.

It is a story of wife desertion for one more attractive in which the affinity feature figures prominently that comes out of the arrest last midnight of Arthur J. Schureman, sales manager for a lumber company in the Worcester building, and Miss Vivian Groves, an attractive high school teacher. It is charged by Mrs. Schureman that fully \$100,000 has been spent on the teacher by her husband in the past three years. The man and his affinity are in the county jail under bail of \$1000.

According to Mrs. Schureman, who caused the apprehension of the couple, she and her husband lived in Dallas, Texas, when he became acquainted with Miss Groves, who was then teaching in the high school. The acquaintance between the husband and teacher ripened into something more serious, and when the school year was closed in June, she and Schureman unceremoniously left the city.

Deserts Wife and Children. The wife and two children were deserted. After a short investigation, she discovered the two people she had suspected had left the city together, and they were traced throughout the east, and one year later came to Portland. The wife and children taking up their residence here the past year.

After several attempts of Mrs. Schureman to have her husband return to her, in which case he positively refused, saying that he cared more for the high school teacher, the wife made complaint against the two that they were living together. They have been living at the St. Francis hotel in connecting rooms.

Find Man's Clothing. When Constable Lou Wagner and Deputy William Klerman went to the hotel last night, admittance was denied, but later the door was opened, and both people found in the respective rooms. In the room of Miss Groves was found several pieces of Schureman's clothing and an itemized expense account of the two people. On the purse of Miss Groves was an engraved name plate bearing her name as Mrs. Schureman. The father of Schureman is a prominent merchant in Chicago, conducting an electrical supply house, and is a millionaire. Miss Groves is tall, hunched and is a member of a prominent family in the south.

gress) shall nominate all its candidates for public office under the provisions of this law, and not in any other manner, and it is further declared in the preamble of said law that 'all qualified electors who wish to serve the people in an elective public office are rightfully entitled to equal opportunities under the law'; and

"Whereas, certain former political bosses and machine politicians seek to nullify the above vital provisions of the law by the following methods: They propose to call assembly conventions of delegates to usurp the name and authority of the political parties; these assembly conventions are to recommend a slate of candidates dictated by the bosses, who intend also that there shall be only one of their machine candidates for each nomination against two or more candidates for the same nomination who are opposed to machine rule, and these former bosses boast of their success with this plan in Portland last spring, and privately declare that they will by this method restore government in Oregon by the machine, and repeal the initiative and referendum and all other laws through which the people have gained power in Oregon during the past 10 years; and

"Whereas, the purpose and intent of said assembly is not to come together as citizens to advise and agree to make a recommendation to the voters, but to be and is a convention of delegates asserting the power and right to act with authority for others and to bind them to a course of political conduct, they will by this method restore government in Oregon by the machine, and repeal the initiative and referendum and all other laws through which the people have gained power in Oregon during the past 10 years; and

"Be it resolved, That we hereby ask all law abiding citizens to pledge with us our mutual earnest endeavor, by all honorable means to defeat every candidate for nomination and election who seeks or accepts any recommendation or endorsement by any so called assembly or convention of delegates of any political party which is subject to the direct primary law; and

"Be it further resolved, That in making the above declaration we do hereby reaffirm and emphasize our adherence to and our faith in those provisions of the Magna Charta and of the constitution of the United States, sealed with the blood of our forefathers, which

guarantee to all citizens the right to peaceably assemble as citizens and to advise and agree together and make any recommendation in their own name and by their own authority to their fellow citizens which they may deem wise and patriotic without any attempt to usurp the political rights of the people."

Attend City Council. Several other matters of importance to labor were taken up for discussion and acted upon. Among these most important perhaps was the decision to have Labor council representatives present at all meetings of the city council to see that the interests of the laboring part of the community are safeguarded. For the time being the council will be represented by H. J. Parkinson, secretary of the Building Trades council, and Ed Rosenberg, a prominent member in the ranks of the union forces.

H. L. Fitzgerald, who some time ago was appointed on a committee to investigate the charitable institution known as the Portland Commons, reported last night that the committee had found the institution doing much good for the needy and said it deserved the support and commendation of the people.

Investigate Dock Deal. The proposition to lease the Port of Portland drydock at St. Johns to a private corporation was made the subject of a lengthy discussion and resolved into the appointment of a committee to make a searching investigation. It being intimated that perhaps the deal if pulled through would turn out to be a repetition of the Jefferson street public wharf lease to a railroad company, and that the city had let the city without the use of a piece of water front property for which it now would have good demand.

The proposition is understood to be to the effect that the Oregon Drydock company, which recently built a floating drydock at the works of the Willamette Iron & Steel works, is willing to lease the Port of Portland dock and thus get control of the dry docking facilities of the Port. The Port of Portland dock was built with public money and is being operated by a public fund in a large measure for the benefit of shipping coming here and about the time of the nature of a profit earning proposition.

Mayor Simon's assertion that the labor council would find itself unable to invoke the recall was brought up and a committee was appointed to look

the matter up and, if necessary, take such steps as would make the recall operative.

Free Speech Discussed. Although no official action was taken, the matter of free speech was discussed towards the close of the meeting. It was said informally that the situation now confronting the I. W. W. at Spokane is only a part of a movement in all over the country and that it would likely drift to Portland in time for the next election when effort may possibly be made to prevent labor from voicing its sentiment in regard to public affairs.

A telegram of congratulation was sent to Mayor-elect P. H. McCarthy of San Francisco, who is a prominent labor union man, having been head of the building trades there for some time.

Negotiating Progress. The difficulty between the building trades and the "Trustee company" was turned over to the council, which in the future, will negotiate for a settlement. The company is said to have made many promises to give its employees union conditions and it is believed that eventually these promises will be carried out.

The Musicians' union reported that the National theatre, on Washington street, has accepted union conditions and it was ordered stricken off the unfair list. The meat cutters reported good progress in their campaign for shorter hours.

The building trades reported improved conditions and the waterfront federations' representatives stated that everything was moving along nicely in the harbor. The building trades have moved into their new quarters at the corner of Fourth and Alder streets.
