EAST SIDERS ARE VICTORS IN GAME

Big Crowd Watches Two High Schools in Annual Struggle.

One of the largest crowds ever assembled at an interscholastic football game in Portland saw Lincoln High school's husky braves go down to a muddy defeat before the Washington high aggregation yesterday afternoon, 9 to 0.

School spirit and enthusiasm was at its height. Rooters from both schools took their positions in the grandstand early and cheered lustily long before either eleven was on the field. A noticeable feature was the fact that few students decorated the sidelines. They were all in the grandstand howling for their respective heroes.

Washington high kicked off and after an exchange of punts, both teams settled down to straight line backs which netted them nothing. The first half was nip and tuck from start to finish. Both teams seemed unable to make yardage against their opponents, and it began to look like a scoreless game after the first half had been played without a score.

The east side boys came back strong in the second half determined to do or die. It was an awful roar which greeted them up in the dressing rooms and it showed as soon as they came on the field. Cornell, Leader and Munly rushed the pigskin down the field and the Lincoln bunch was helpless against the human avalanche. Ed Leader carried the ball over from the one yard line on a straight buck.

Del Stander, Washington's right end, who has it on all of them this year when it comes to booting the ball between the goal posts, easily kicked the spheroid over from a rather difficult angle.

Lincoln came to the front again, however, when Day fell on a fumbled ball and carried it to Washington's 16-yard line. They attempted to kick a field goal, fumbled and Washington booted it out of danger.

The only other scoring came not long after this when the east siders secured 15 yards on a successful forward pass, and 55 yards more on runs by Cornell, Jackson and Fraser. Stander kicked a pretty field goal from the six-yard line and the game was over.

The headwork shown by Washington high's little quarterback, Anson Cornell, who made all-star quarter and captain of a picked interscholastic team last year, was one of the features of the game. Cornell picked the weak spots in Lincoln's lines for constant gains besides playing a spectacular game at safety. To Cornell, Munly and Stander must go the greater part of the credit of yesterday's victory, though every man was in the game from the kickoff to the last whistle.

Jack Day, for Lincoln, and the Indian sign on the east side bunch when it came to punting and Lincoln gained on practically every exchange of punts. Cochran, Lincoln's right tackle, broke his collar bone early in the game and was taken out.

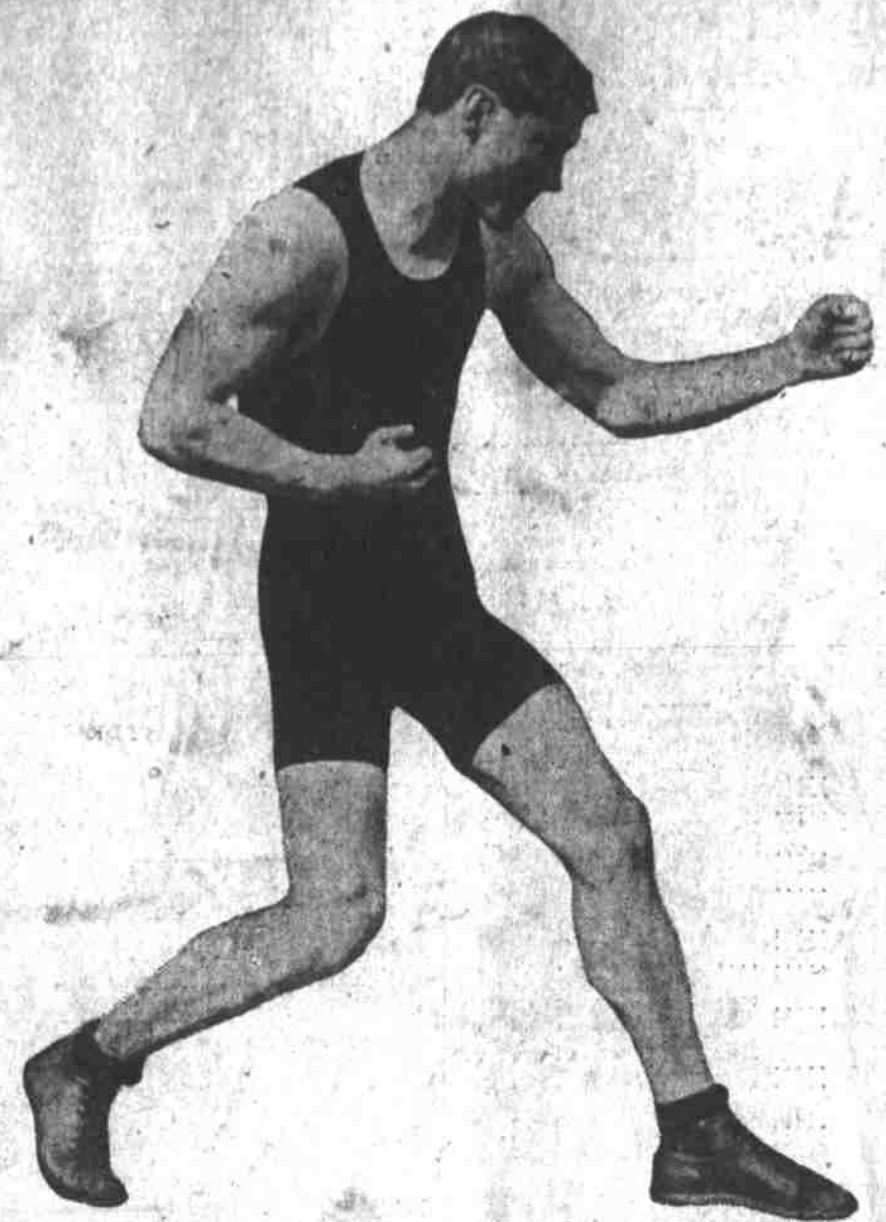

TEN AUTOS WILL START BIG RACE

Expect Time to Be Bettered From Los Angeles to Phoenix.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 6.—At intervals of 15 minutes 10 automobiles will speed out of this city tonight on the annual Los Angeles-to-Phoenix road race for possession of the Mariposa club challenge cup and a cash prize of \$1500. The first car will leave the corner of Second and Spring streets at 10 o'clock on its 419 mile journey that will end at the territorial fair grounds at Phoenix.

Last year's race was won by N. D. Ryan and F. C. Fenner, who covered the course in 29 hours, 30 minutes. All the contestants this year have gone over the route and prepared running schedules. Basing estimates on the time made in these trials, automobile men are of the opinion that last year's record will be beaten by several cars.

Much of the course over which the racers will have to travel lies through arid desert sections. At Blythe, Cal., the Colorado river will be ferried and the cars will halt at the control station before starting on the final lap the next morning in the order of their arrival.
