

STATE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY TO ASSEMBLE

The Oregon State Horticultural society will hold its twenty-fourth annual meeting from December 6 to 8, inclusive, in the auditorium of the Meier & Frank store. A most interesting program has been prepared for Tuesday and Wednesday, December 7 and 8, in a room adjoining the exhibits and on the same floor.

For the exhibits a number of special prizes have been prepared by the society, while the commercial bodies of different sections of the state have prepared special prizes and trophies for the best showings made in the different districts. This latter arrangement is an innovation, and is meeting with much favor among the fruit men of the state.

Retain Ownership.
Winners of the following premiums will retain ownership of their exhibits:
No. 1—For best exhibit of apples, any variety, from Clackamas county. Donor, Oregon City Commercial club, \$12.50.
No. 2—For second best exhibit of apples, any variety, from Clackamas county. Donor, Oregon City Commercial club, \$7.50.
No. 3—For best box of apples grown in Hood River county. Donor, Hood River Commercial club, \$15.

Information for Exhibitors.
1. All apples and pears must be wrapped, except top layer.
2. All apples entered in box competitions must be exhibited in boxes of the following dimensions (inside measurement): 15x11x20 inches ("Oregon Special" box), or 10x11x21 inches ("Oregon Standard" box), or 10x12x20 inches ("California Special" box).
3. No fruit may be entered for more than one premium.
4. No exhibitor may make more than one entry for the same premium.
5. No names will be allowed on competitive exhibits until after the judging.
6. All exhibits of fruit must be made by the grower thereof, except as stated otherwise.
7. Except as otherwise stated, in above premium list, exhibits winning a premium will become the property of the donor of the premium, unless exhibitor elects to retain ownership and waive right to premium. This election must be announced in writing to chairman of exhibits committee not later than 12 o'clock noon, December 8.
8. No exhibit may be removed from the hall without written permit of chairman of exhibits committee.
9. All entries for a given premium shall be grouped together.
10. Fruit and other products intended for entry must be shipped by prepaid express, or delivered in person, to Oregon State Horticultural society, Meier & Frank building, Portland, Or.
11. In making entries exhibitors must quote number of premium entered for, as shown in above premium list.
12. All entries must be in place in exhibit room by 6 p. m., Monday, December 6. The room will be open to exhibitors after 8 a. m. of that day, but will not be open to general public until 10 a. m., Tuesday, unless the judging

shall be completed before that hour.
13. The exhibit room will be in charge of chairman of exhibits committee.
14. Intending exhibitors are requested to notify E. W. Power, secretary, 214-1 Henry building, Portland, Or., at earliest possible date, stating number of premium for which they intend to compete.
15. A plate of apples on pears shall contain five specimens. Plates will be furnished by the society.
16. Plate exhibits will be judged according to the rules of the American Pomological society.
17. In judging boxes of apples, points will be allowed as follows: Pack, 20 points; color, 20 points; uniformity, 20 points; quality, 20 points; freedom from blemish, 20 points; total, 100 points.
18. All articles entered must be grown in Oregon.
19. All winners of premiums will receive certificate to that effect, attested by the corporate seal of the society.

YOUNG GIRL ABUSES HELPLESS BURGLAR
