CORNERSTONE OF HOSPITAL LAID

Impressive Ceremonies at the New St. Joseph's at Vancouver, Wash.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 8.—The cornerstone of the new St. Joseph's hospital which is being erected by the Sisters of Charity of the House of Providence, was laid at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon by Right Rev. Bishop J. O'Dea, of Seattle, in accordance with the rites of the Catholic church. The assembly then adjourned to Convent hall, House of Providence, where the following program was carried out. Rev. Father Verwiltgen acting as chairman.

Chorus, "My Country," by pupils of Providence academy; remarks by Rev. Felix Verwiltgen; address, Honorable J. P. Higgins, mayor of Vancouver; address, Dr. R. D. Whittell, chorist, "My Own U. S.," address, Honorable W. W.

McCredie; address, Right Rev. Edward J. O'Dea, D. D., bishop of Seattle; chorus, "Hail God We Praise Thy Name."

The crowd used for the ceremony is now doubly dear to the Sisters, as it was the one having been used in 1873 to lay the cornerstone of the convent building.

Many Articles in Cornerstone.

In the cornerstone were placed the following articles in a sealed bottle: Several medals of saints; medal bearing the effigy of Leo XIII; medal bearing the effigy of Leo XIII; medal bearing the effigy of Pius X, reigning pontiff; medallion bearing the seal of Seattle and the seal of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition; a 1909 issue of the Lincoln penny; photographs of Right Rev. J. O'Dea, bishop of Seattle; Right Rev. A. M. A. Blanchet, Right Rev. Aegidius Junger, Very Rev. Louis Bourgeois, Right Rev. Ignatius Bourgeois, founder of the community; Rev. Mother Gamella, foundress of the community; Rev. Mother M. Antonette, present superressa of the community; Mother Joseph of the Sacred Heart, Vincent de Paul, Sister Mary of the Precious Blood, Sister Blanche of Holy Angels, foundress of the western mission; Dr. David Wall, Rev. Felix Verwiltgen; address, Honorable J. P. Higgins, mayor of Vancouver; address, Dr. R. D. Whittell, chorist, "My Own U. S.," address, Honorable W. W.

The bottle also contained the following historical notes: "A. M. G. D. This stone was laid in the year of grace, 1909, on the 7th day of November, in the seventh year of the pontificate of his holiness Pius X, the first of the thirteenth of William H. Taft, and the thirteenth of the episcopacy of Right Rev. Edward J. O'Dea, third bishop of Seattle; Honorable E. M. Hay, governor of the state of Washington; Honorable J. P. Higgins, mayor of Vancouver.

First Hospital in 1868.

The community of the Daughters of Charity, Servants of the Poor, was founded in Montreal in 1847 by Mother Camille and Bishop Bourget. St. Joseph's hospital was founded in Vancouver, April 9, 1868, at the request of Rev. J. B. A. Brouillet and with the approval of Right Rev. A. M. A. Blanchet, provincial superior of the province of the Daughters of Charity in the Pacific Northwest. The first sister who devoted herself to works of charity in the hospital were Mother Joseph of the Sacred Heart and Sister of John of God. On July 25, 1868, the foundation of the new St. Joseph's hospital was commenced. The building is to be constructed of brick, to be five stories high, 187 feet front and 47 feet deep. Messrs. Berndt and Tegan are the architects and the work of construction is supervised by J. B. Blanchet, Moore & Handall contractors.

Personal of Hospital Members.

The actual religious personnel of the hospital are: Sister M. Conrad, superior; Sister Emory, Sister M. Higgins, Sister M. Genesieve, Sister Mary of the Bunshtier, Sister Joseph of the Sacred Heart and Sister Pius. The present members of the general council are: Mother Mary Antonette, superior general; Mother Mary Ardis, assistant general; Mother Mary Cathbert, assistant general; Mother

Mary Emerentienne, assistant general; Mother Mary Wilfrid, assistant general; Mother Benedict, secretary general; Mother Anaclet, procurator general.

The present members of the provincial council are: Mother James Kinsal, provincial superior; Sister John of Jesus, provincial assistant; Sister Macarius, provincial councillor; Sister Mary James, provincial councillor; Sister Mary Mildred, provincial councillor; Sister Mary Jacob, provincial secretary; Sister Edwin, provincial procurator.

Many Interesting Addresses.

Mayor Higgins spoke in behalf of the city of Vancouver and Dr. R. D. Whittell for the medical fraternity. Congressman McCredie, in his address, gave a brief history of Vancouver and of the time when Lewis and Clark came down the Columbia river and landed at the old tree at the foot of Main street which is now a thing of history. He said that Vancouver had been lagging. That the state capital was at one time within the grasp of Vancouver and that the state penitentiary might have been located here. However, the people were awakening and the new industries and new buildings were a sign of better times. Right Rev. Bishop O'Dea told of the early history of hospitals and along charity lines in connection with his address was instructive and thoroughly enjoyed.

Barnes Awaits Death Calmly.

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 8.—Doomed to hang Friday for the murder of Mrs. Anna Aldrich, April 26, 1894, Fred Barnes is in the penitentiary waiting for death with unflinching courage. He will be hanged, after a stubborn fight through the supreme court, unless the governor intervenes. Such a move would be unpopular here, as the people are bitterly opposed to any clemency in his case.

MANUEL SEEKS BRIDE IN BRITAIN

London, Nov. 8.—Great preparations have been made for the reception of King Manuel of Portugal, who is now on his way to England to pay the first state visit he has made since he ascended the throne. The royal yacht Victoria and Albert is to convey the king from Cherbourg, escorted by several British cruisers and torpedo-boat destroyers. The Prince and Princess of Wales will welcome his majesty at Portsmouth. The guard of honor at the jetty will consist of bluejackets and a detachment of the royal marine artillery. The king of Portugal and the prince and princess of Wales will travel by royal train to Windsor, where there is to be an elaborate program of festivities, including a gala banquet and a great hunt. Afterward King Manuel is to come to London, where he is to reside at Buckingham palace for four days. Interest in the visit of the young Portuguese monarch has been heightened by the rumor that during his stay formal announcement may be made of his engagement to marry the Princess Alexandra of Hesse, niece of King Edward.

Logger Injured by Fall.

Castrook, Wash., Nov. 8.—Clay Barclay was badly injured Friday while working at a logging camp near this city. He was working on the railway and jumped onto a log to get out of the way of another, which was rolling toward him. The log gave way under his feet and he fell to the track below, his head striking a rail or some other hard object with such force as to lay the scalp open for several inches.
