Tuesday night is German night, Wednesday night is children's night, Thursday night will be turned over to the Irish while Friday, the last night, will be turned into a grand social. A silver mounted gavel is to be contested for by fraternal societies of the city.

Support Free Speech Fight—A mass meeting was held at Merrill's hall Sunday afternoon at which Colonel C. E. Wood was the principal speaker. The following resolution was adopted by acclamation: "We, the people of Portland, in mass meeting assembled, demand that the men now being persecuted in Spokane be set free and that constitutional provision providing for free speech be observed in Spokane the same as if it were in the United States instead of in the inland empire." Funds were raised to aid the free speech fight in Spokane.

Witness Must Return—After making complaint to the police that he had been robbed of \$70 by Mrs. C. A. Burns at 204 Washington street, William Johnson, a sawmill worker, disappeared and was not located until yesterday. He is working at Aberdeen and will be requested to return to Portland and appear against the woman, who was apprehended at Tacoma, and is charged with larceny. Johnson alleged he spent several days with the woman in which they drank considerable liquor, and that she took his money October 14.

Bridge Committee Meeting—A meeting of the bridge committee of the North East Side Improvement club will be held in the offices of Judge M. G. Munley at 3 o'clock this afternoon to consider taking up the fight for the Broadway bridge and employing counsel to defend the bond issue. Ways and means for employing attorneys to assist the city attorney in the litigation will be discussed. Presidents of all the push clubs north of Sullivan's gulch have been asked to attend this meeting or send a representative.

Evidence of Robbery Den—While investigating the rooming house at 213 Pine street which recently changed hands, the new proprietor discovered a trap door in the sitting room. Underneath the door was a small tank, and contained a strong chemical which, when released, caused drowsiness. Several playing cards and poker chips were also found, and a card having the name of Frankie Brown printed on the cards.

Killed by Rock Blast—R. S. Warner, whose skull was fractured yesterday afternoon while blasting rock at the Cascade locks, died at midnight at St. Vincent's hospital. He was 21 years old and lived at Stella, Wash., to which place the body will be taken for burial. The man was employed with the Cascade Construction company, and when a heavy blast was discharged, a piece of rock struck him squarely on the head. He did not regain consciousness.

Seriously Cut by Saw—Wallace John, a sawmill worker, employed with the Clatskanie Lumber company, is at the Good Samaritan hospital with a serious cut in his back, received Saturday from a circular saw. He is the son of S. A. Johns, 211 Monroe street of this city, and has a wife and child at Clatskanie.

Faintly Waiting for Car—While waiting for a car at Grand and Hawthorne avenues last evening, Charles Nestle, living at Lents, fainted and fell to the pavement. He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. He is suffering from stomach trouble. Nestle is 56 years old.

Find Skeleton in Box—An old skeleton was found yesterday afternoon in Twenty-sixth and Upshur streets. H. C. Lee, proprietor, said he could not account for its presence. He has only owned the place a short time. The bones were packed in a box.

Steam Heated Gardens.
The market gardeners around Paris do not dream of waiting for spring before they raise spring vegetables. As one man put it, they move the climate of Monte Carlo to the suburbs of Paris. This they do at enormous expense in money and in time. The gardens where possible are placed on land with a slope to the south and are well protected by walls on the north and east, walls built to reflect light as well as to give protection from the northeast winds.

The ground is practically covered with glass, not as in a greenhouse, but in glass frames in the open, three light frames of uniform size, 12 feet by four and a half; and also by glass bells. These, too, are of a uniform size about the shape of a chapel bell, a little less than 17 inches in diameter and from 15 to 16 inches high. The French call them cloches. You may often see over a thousand frames and over ten thousand glass bells in one two-acre plot in the suburbs of Paris.

A more recent innovation, according to Success, is the employment of hot water pipes run under the soil, making of the earth a veritable steam heated hotel, with this essential difference, that the hotel keeper here is desperately eager not to keep his guests, but to persuade them to leave on the earliest possible day.
