

KING EDWARD'S BIRTHDAY PARTY

Celebrating the sixty-eighth anniversary of the birth of King Edward of England, members of the British Benevolent society gave a banquet last night at the Commercial club.

W. A. MacRae, president of the society, presided at the feast and gave a brilliant toast to the British monarch, referring to him as "the father of his country."

James Laidlaw, H. R. M., consul, related to respond to a toast to President W. H. Taft, eulogized the national executive and spoke of the harmony between the president and the king of England.

W. D. Wheelwright spoke of "The British Navy." Walter Burns and George Barbur paid tributes to Judge George H. Williams, named as being present when possible at all affairs of the British Benevolent society.

T. A. McMaster of Portland told of the work being done by the British Benevolent society. Mayor Joseph Simon talked on "The City of Portland." J. B. Kerr and John McIntyre made short talks. Addresses and responses to toasts were made by several others, among them being A. H. Hirsch and Alice Gavin.

Enthusiasm and good fellowship marked the banquet, which was attended by a large number. Brightening the entertainment were songs and musical selections interspersed toasts and addresses.

NO CHANCE TO SAVE THEIR LIVES

here at 6 o'clock, was crowded with workmen on their way to Central Park and New Westminster, where they were employed, and most of those killed are of the working class.

The bodies were badly mangled, and almost unrecognizable but up to noon 13 had been identified.

According to officials of British Columbia Electric Railway company, the freight car which caused the awful disaster, had evidently broken away from a freight train which was switching at the top of the hill. It came crashing down the slope without warning and ran into the fast approaching passenger train on a curve near Elsworth station.

One injured passenger who was brought to the city on the relief train stated that Motorman Thorburn gave one agonized shout to those penned in the car and then came the awful crash. Work trains were immediately rushed to the scene of the wreck and an hour later the line was open to traffic again.

Story of a Rescuer.

A. Johnson, who assisted in extricating the dead and injured from the wreck, was returning home from his work at the time of the accident. He had got off the car that was in the wreck and was proceeding to his home, when he heard a terrible crash.

"All was still for a moment," said Johnson, "and then I heard cries and moans and at once knew that a collision had taken place. I hastened to the scene as quickly as possible. It was still almost dark, but the sight that met my eyes was indescribable and for a moment I stood paralyzed. Afterwards I with others who began arriving at the scene, commenced lifting the timbers and wreckage off those whom we saw pinned down. There were

so many cries for help all at the same time we hardly knew where to start first. The heavy 12 by 12 timbers were piled and scattered all over the injured, which took the many willing workers what seemed like hours to clear away. We took out 12 bodies up to the time I was forced to abandon the rescue work through exhaustion. I think every thing was done by the company officials that was possible."

Others who arrived immediately after the wreck tell much the same story. Rev. Madill and family live directly opposite the place where the accident occurred. His daughters heard the crash, which shook their house, and on looking out of the windows saw what had taken place. They all hurriedly dressed and assisted in the work of rescue.

Pinned as by a Compress.

George Scott, who lives opposite the scene of the accident, was just sitting down to breakfast when the accident occurred.

"I heard a crash, and lighting a lantern, hurried to the wrecked car, which was finally outlined near. The top of the car had been torn off by the lumber, which had forced the mass of men into a very small space, only it seemed about a couple of yards square. Moans and cries and, an occasional shriek added to the horror of the catastrophe. It must have taken us quite 20 minutes before we could get enough of the lumber off to liberate any of the poor wretches. I shall never forget the ghastliness of the scene. One man badly hurt was lying, unable to stir. A dead man was across his neck and another across his chest. The eyes of another poor fellow were full of clotting blood—not his own—so that he could not see. They had all been jammed into one solid mass, where dead and dying and injured lay helpless."

KLAMATH WATER USERS TO INCREASE STOCK

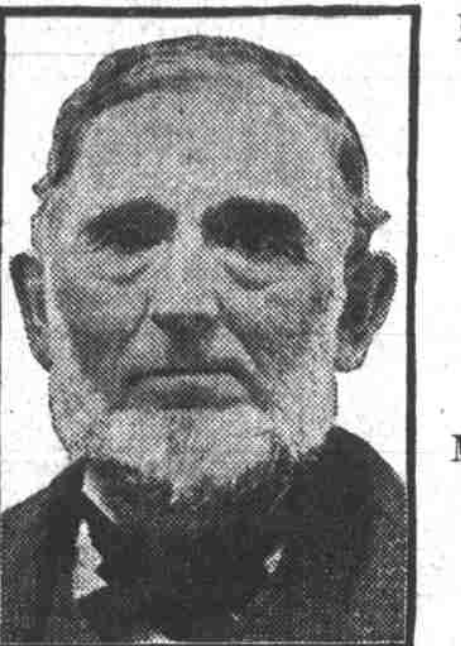

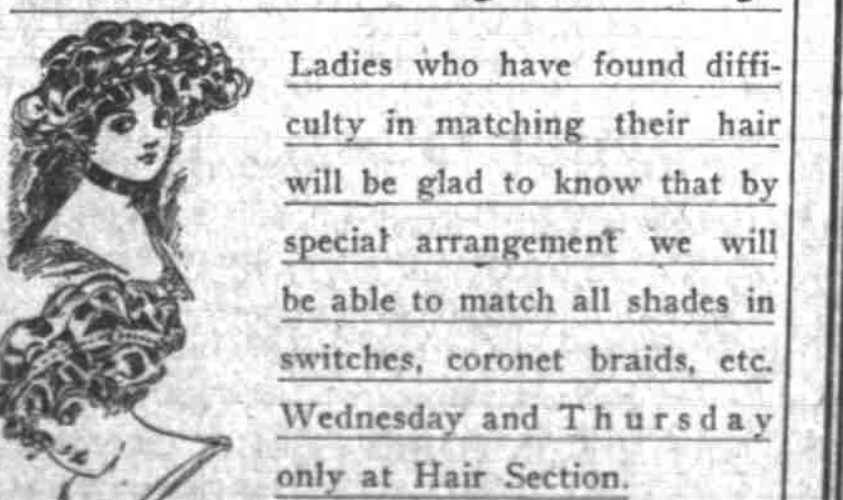
