Circuit Judge Gatens this afternoon took up the trial of the case of C. F. Adams and A. L. Mills against F. W. Carey & Co. of San Francisco.

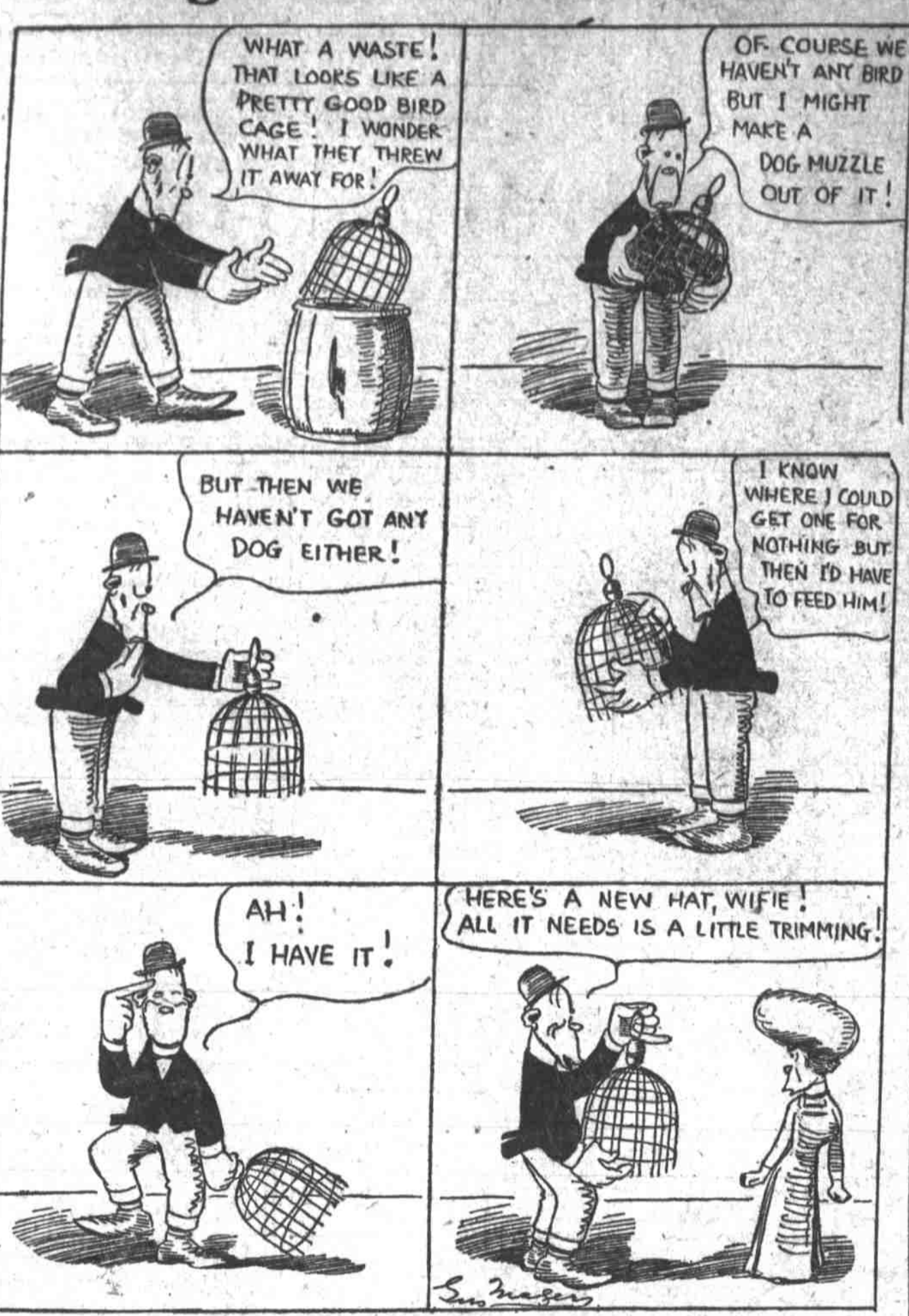
MRS. BARTS IS FOUND GUILTY OF SWINDLING
