Elegant Displays Win Much Praise From Many Visitors—\$400 Raised.

Charged by Countrymen of Apathy When American Tariff Bill Was Passed.

Albany, Or., Nov. 12.—The chrysanthemum carnival with all its wonderful and beautiful attractions has been a huge success and the event will be repeated. The chrysanthemums on display were the best ever seen and have been the envy of all the visitors. Rome, Nov. 12.—The alleged apathy of Baron Mayor des Planches, the Italian ambassador at Washington, during the late revision of the American customs tariff by the congress of the United States, is likely to be made a subject for lively debates at the session of the Italian parliament which met today. The charge is made that France, Germany and other countries of Europe, through their respective embassies at Washington derived special advantages from the tariff changes, which were lost to Italy through the so-called lethargy of her diplomatic representative. Chambers of commerce throughout the country, centered in the Union delle Camere di Commercio d'Italia, have joined in a demand for an interpolation of Premier Giolitti upon the floor of the chamber of deputies and it is predicted that the protest may result in the recall of Baron Mayor des Planches.

The opening of parliament was attended by the customary ceremonies. The city was decorated for the occasion, and huge crowds of people assembled to witness the arrival of the senators and deputies. King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena were enthusiastically cheered as they drove through the streets, which were lined with troops.

OLD CHURCH TO HAVE REUNION

The Marshall street Presbyterian church, formerly known as St. John's will celebrate its twenty-fifth anniversary on Sunday next, and also Tuesday evening, November 16. Invitations to the exercises have been sent to all those who have at any time been members of the church so far as their addresses could be ascertained. If any have been omitted, it was not intentional and they are urged to be present. The public generally is most cordially invited to attend all the services.

Rev. S. Holt, D. D. will preach Sunday morning at 11 o'clock; Rev. J. V. Milligan, D. D. for a number of years a pastor of the church, will give the historical address Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Tuesday evening, commencing at 7:30, there will be held a meeting for reminiscences to be addressed by W. M. Ladd, F. N. Stone and J. S. Meek, all connected with the founding of the organization.

There will be special music at each service. The Y. W. C. A. Altirul club will sing Sunday evening, and Miss Ellen Driver will sing a solo at each service. After the exercises Tuesday there will be a social hour.

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE TO MEET IN CINCINNATI

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 12.—A wide variety of problems relating to the government and betterment of American cities will be wrestled with at the sixteenth annual meeting of the National Municipal league, which is to be held in this city next week in conjunction with the regular convention of the American Civic association.

Every important city of the country will be represented among the delegates, who will number at least 500 according to reports received by the committee in charge of the local arrangements. The sessions will be presided over by Charles J. Bonaparte of Baltimore, former attorney general of the United States.

Among the subjects that will be discussed at the three days' session are the commission plan of municipal government, direct nominations, public health, municipal budgets and research, immigration, and the relation of the liquor question to municipal affairs.

STUDENTS MEET TO DISCUSS MISSIONS

Forsyth, Ga., Nov. 12.—Representatives of 22 educational institutions were on hand today at the opening of the fourth annual conference of the Georgia Students' Missionary league. The sessions, which are being held at Besse Tift college, will continue over Saturday and Sunday. Features of the initial session this afternoon were the annual reports of the president and other officers, showing that nearly 1500 Georgia students are now engaged in pursuing mission study courses, many of them as student volunteers preparing for foreign fields.

AVIATORS MEET IN CINCINNATI TODAY

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 12.—Thousands of spectators assembled at the Latonia race track today for the opening of the big aviation meet, preparations for which have been going forward for several months. The program of the exhibition, which extends over two days and calls for biplane, monoplane and dirigible balloon flights in which Glenn H. Curtiss, Roy Knabenshue and other noted aviators are to take part.

Vicksburg Monument Dedicated.

Vicksburg, Miss., Nov. 12.—A handsome monument and a number of markers erected in the National Military park to commemorate the valor of the Mississippi troops who fought and fell in the defense of Vicksburg were formally dedicated today at the crowning feature of the annual state reunion of the United Confederate Veterans. Several thousand veterans were included in the large assemblage present at the ceremonies.

Conspicuous among those taking part in the program were Governor Noel and the members of the monument commission. Congressman Humphreys and Colonel H. M. Street, speaker of the lower house of the Mississippi legislature, delivered the chief addresses of the day. Governor Noel delivered the speech of presentation and the acceptance address was made by Blawett Lee of Chicago, son of the late General Stephen D. Lee.

Appeal in Land Fraud Cases.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—The cases of the Milwaukee men accused of participation in the Colorado land frauds came up for hearing today in the United States circuit court. The hearing is on the appeal of the government from the decision of Judge Quarles, releasing the defendants on habeas corpus proceedings after they had been bound over for trial in Denver.

NURSERYMEN PLEADED WITH INSPECTION LAW

North Yakima, Wash., Nov. 12.—The nurserymen of the valley are much pleased with the workings of the new nursery inspection law. Under this law each individual shipment of stock is given careful inspection by a competent man, while before there was merely a general inspection and general certification. District Inspector Morrison has six assistants in the two counties in his district, and three of these are kept busy inspecting nursery stock. The nursery business of the valley is becoming immense. One of the nurseries makes the claim that it will put out 5,000,000 grafts next spring, and the other nurseries also say they will set out large numbers of grafts. This indicates that the nursery men expect that there will be much planting within the next few years.

EFFORTS MADE TO BRIDGE LEWIS RIVER

Woodland, Wash., Nov. 12.—A rousing meeting of the citizens of both Cowlitz and Clark counties and a banquet was the reception accorded the commissioners of the two counties when they met here yesterday at the invitation of the Woodland Commercial club to discuss roads and a bridge across the Lewis river. The Cowlitz county commissioners are ready to go ahead with their part of the bridge, but as part of the expense must be borne by Clark county, Lewis river being the dividing line, the project cannot be begun until the Clark county side is ready. The Clark county commissioners declare that they are willing to proceed, but at the present time they have not the funds available for their part of the cost. This bridge is a very important link in the Blaine to Vancouver state road and will also greatly increase the population of the section of Clark county tributary to Woodland in the Lewis river valley.

BARRILL OFFERS TO CLIMB MT. M'KINLEY

Missoula, Mont., Nov. 12.—Edwin N. Barrill, who recently made an affidavit to the effect that Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Brooklyn explorer, never reached the summit of Mount McKinley as he claimed to have done, has announced that he has arranged to take a party, including several newspaper men, next spring on a mountain climbing trip. Barrill declares that he will take the party to the exact spot "half way up the mountain," from which he claims Dr. Cook took the photographs which the explorer claims were taken at the mountain's summit.

LITTLE INTEREST IN ALBANY'S ELECTION

Albany, Or., Nov. 12.—Little interest is being taken in the coming city election. There will be only one candidate for the office of mayor, and Mayor Wallace is again urged to run by his friends. The office of city marshal is being sought by Al Munkers and Rele, the present marshal. Both of these men have filed their petition with the city recorder, and a warm contest will be waged. No fight is being waged for councilmen in the different wards, and it is likely that the present regime will be in office another year.

The people of the city will be asked to vote on an ordinance prohibiting the sale of near beer and malt liquors that are not intoxicating.
