FIGHT OF I. W. W. TO BE RENEWED

Prisoners at Spokane Issue Manifesto—Reinforcements on the Way.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, Nov. 16.—Two hundred and thirty-seven industrialists now in prison in Spokane issued a statement today declaring the fight would be continued until every schoolhouse in the city was filled with prisoners.

The habeas corpus case of Joe Duddy, who was arrested for disorderly conduct, will be tried Thursday. This case may decide the legality of the arrests on charges of disorderly conduct which have been made as a result of the free speech fight.

It is reported today that several national committeemen of the Industrial Workers of the World are on their way from Chicago to assist in the fight being made by that organization against the ordinance prohibiting street speaking.

Charles Darrow, who acted as attorney for Meyer and Haywood two years ago when they were tried in Idaho for complicity in the alleged killing of ex-Governor Steunenberg, is enroute here from Chicago to prosecute the habeas corpus cases brought by the imprisoned industrialists. Several arrests were made today.

Large reinforcements are expected to arrive tomorrow.

TALK DRYDOCK AT MEETINGS

Two meetings will be held this afternoon in regard to the leasing of the Port of Portland drydock. Members of the committee appointed by the Port of Portland commission to consider the advisability of leasing the dock to a private individual or to a corporation will hold their first meeting this afternoon and the legislative committee of the Portland Labor Council will also hold a meeting. The latter meeting will be held for the purpose of hearing the opinion of counsel that they have employed as to the legal right of the Port of Portland to lease the dock.

The Labor Council is very much opposed to the leasing of the dock, as they say that if it gets into the hands of a corporation it may be unfair to the unions and reduce wages.

HARRIMAN LINES TO HAVE LECTURER

Preparing for a lecture tour over Canada for the Harriman lines, Fred W. Prince is in Portland today conferring with William McKinnay, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific and O. R. & N., and E. W. Rowe, one of the members of the Oregon A. T. U. committee.

Mr. Prince expects to leave with his party tomorrow night, going directly to British Columbia by way of Seattle, Tacoma and Bellingham. Lectures will be given in all the principal Canadian cities as far east as Winnipeg, Ont.

Harriman lines from Portland south, and east as far as Omaha, Neb., will be described in detail by the lecturer, and moving pictures and slides showing scenes along the lines will be shown. Oregon will come in for its full share. Portland will be the first city described in each lecture by Mr. Prince.

MASS MEETING THIS EVENING

Irrington Residents Will Talk Streetcar Service in Earnest.

Off with the bird cages, the pneumonia cars, and the schedule of 17 years ago and on with the adequate service that the section is entitled to, is the cry that will go up at a mass meeting to be held at the Irvington club tonight. At this meeting the people of the Irvington district will take decided action in an effort to secure satisfactory street car service, commensurate with the traffic furnished by that part of the city.

The Irvington people are asking for a seven and one half minute service during the day, and a five minute service between the hours of 5 and 6:30 in the afternoon. They also want an express service on both the Broadway and the Irvington lines during the early evening. They ask that this service begin at 6 o'clock and run until 6:30, making the first stop at Broadway and Union avenue on the Broadway line and at Grand avenue and Holladay avenue on the Irvington line.

It is pointed out by the Irvington people that there are three cars running on the line, which is the same number placed there 17 years ago when the line was opened. During that time the traffic has increased more than 300 fold. The people therefore want some increase in the service furnished by the company.

At the meeting tonight resolutions will be adopted protesting against the service furnished, and committees will be appointed to take up negotiations with the officials of the street car company in an effort to secure a better service for the east side section.

MRS. WILLIE COLLIER DIES AT NEW YORK

John Allen of 418 Grant street, this city, received word yesterday from New York that his sister, Mrs. Louise Allen Collier, wife of "Willie" Collier, the actor, had died there November 9 at her home, 162 West Ninety-sixth street. Her death was sudden.

Louise Allen Collier was well known to the stage. She was born in San Francisco and had a host of friends there and in other cities of California. In 1885 she began her theatrical career at Niblo's Garden, playing the role of Bessie in "Around the World in Eighty Days." She later appeared in many successful plays, and with her husband formed part of the later Weber-Felds company. The last appearance of Mr. Collier and his wife together on the stage was in 1905, when Mr. Collier was the star of "The Dictator." Since then Mrs. Collier appeared with the Lew Fields company in "About Town" and then entered vaudeville.

The brother residing here is a well known musician. Mrs. Collier was also a sister of Miss Ricca Allen, who was here a few weeks ago with the Schubert attraction, "The Girls."

PLENTY OF ROOM FOR POLICE WORK

New Headquarters in County Building Will Be Commodious.

Quarters to be provided for the municipal court, police headquarters and city hall in the new courthouse, as agreed on yesterday by Judge Webster, the county commissioners, and Mayor Simon, will be equal to a four story building 100 feet square, according to an estimate made by the architects.

The first floor of the new courthouse will be occupied by the offices of the sheriff and the police department, half and half. Included in the sheriff's half will be the tax collection department, which requires large space. On this floor will be the office of the chief of police, the offices of the detectives and captains, and two assembly and lounge rooms.

On the fifth floor will be two municipal courtrooms, the offices of the clerks and judges, jury rooms and other necessary quarters. On the sixth floor will be the emergency hospital, with rooms for the doctors and attendants. The jail will be at the top.

In return for this space the city will pay a small rental, the amount not yet determined. Judge Webster regards this as a matter of small importance, as the city pays 99 per cent of the taxes, and the payment of rent to the county amounts to changing the money from one pocket to another. But as long as the city and county governments are distinct, this charge will be made, so that the county ownership may appear in the bookkeeping be kept in order.

The east wing of the courthouse, now under way, will be only sufficient for county needs, and the city will not have the use of the building until at least one of the wings on the Main or Salmon street sides is completed. This will be provided for in the new tax levy, and its construction can be begun next year. This will mean a year and a half or more until the city can move into the courthouse.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 16.—Harsh words directed at him by his wife during the eight years of their married life caused Louis Erbach, a cobbler, to lose on an average nearly six pounds in weight each year. If the data supplied in his complaint for divorce, which was granted today, is correct.

Erbach alleged that Mrs. Erbach began to threaten him with death soon after their marriage at Rochester, N. Y. According to his statement, she threatened daily to kill him and with that threat he grew thinner. As proof he offered his body as "exhibit A." When the case came to trial today he weighed just 113 pounds. He asserted that he formerly balanced the scales at 145 pounds but that constant worry over her threats caused the great reduction in his weight.
