

BAILEY MUST SAY COMBINE OWNS ALASKA MILK SAMPLES PLAN TO PUT TO PUNICS

APPEAR AND EXPLAIN

Washington Broker's Comment on Scope of Guggenheim Power.

State Bacteriologist Makes Public Number of Tests Made During Past Few Cool Days—Room for Much Improvement.

Fair Exchange League to Fix Value of Silver Over World.

Grand Jury Sends Dairy and Food Commissioner Word to Call and Answer Serious Charges Preferred by Committee.

J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, was summoned by District Attorney Cameron this morning to appear before the grand jury this afternoon to make answer to charges of negligence and malfeasance filed against him by a committee of citizens.

The complaints filed against the commissioner allege, it is said, that he has been failing to enforce the state law compelling the regulation of dairies, and that the dairies supplying milk to Portland are in an evil condition because for 10 years they have had no regulation that would enforce a general cleaning up.

The allegation also proceeds to state, it is said, that Commissioner Bailey in failing to enforce the state license law compelling every dairyman to have a certificate of inspection before he sells milk in a city of more than 10,000 inhabitants, has made of every dairyman an unwitting law breaker, and that the commissioner because of his failure to enforce this and other legal functions of his office has demonstrated himself either as an incompetent or a wilful violator of the law.

Some time ago a meeting of representatives from the numerous organizations that have been fighting to clean up the milk supply in Portland was held. The local situation was reviewed in all its phases at this meeting. The failure of the dairy commissioner to make his office an agency of protection against bad milk in the only congested area of the state—namely, Portland—was denominated the general cause for the unsanitary condition of the dairies and the fact that more than half the cows in the dairy herds have consumption.

The meeting expressed its convictions that active effort and law enforcement on the part of the commissioner would alone be adequate to correction of conditions which permitted a milk supply responsible in one summer for the death of more than 100 babies in Portland alone.

Sorenson Enters Game.

George Sorenson got into the game in January or February of 1906, according to the story, when he found that Mr. McKinley had possession of the certificate of purchase and of the state land certificates. According to the story, Sorenson went to San Francisco and told Mrs. McKinley that he had authority from McKinley to get the certificates by paying for the keeping charges, which amounted to \$300.

Sorenson paid this charge and brought the certificates back to Portland with him. This was during the summer of 1906, so the story runs, and after returning to Portland Sorenson is charged with having erased the name of F. A. Mueller from the certificates and having inserted the name of Ed H. Fleuck of Seattle, the partner of J. O. Storey

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State Bacteriologist Makes Public Number of Tests Made During Past Few Cool Days—Room for Much Improvement.

The latest reports of milk tests made by Dr. Ralph C. Matson, state bacteriologist, show that the quality of milk furnished in Portland by certain dealers and dairymen is not coming up to the standard as it should. Inspector Hutchinson announced this morning that all of this class would be notified that the milk must be improved or destroyed after it reaches the city. The cool weather prevents such germs from multiplying rapidly; therefore he regards a high bacterial count as inexcusable. Dr. Matson's report follows:

San Francisco, Nov. 17.—A branch of the Fair Exchange league is to be formed in this city in the near future. The organization, which is international in scope, has for its object an adjustment of the monetary values between oriental countries, the new world and Europe.

The movement here is being fostered by Colvin B. Brown, general secretary of the society, who was formerly the New York representative of the California Promotion committee in Europe.

The first meeting will be held November 24, when the purpose of the league will be explained by Moreton Brown, of New York, a well known writer on financial topics.

It is the theory of the members of the league in this country and in Europe that the great fluctuation in the value of silver in Asia is in a large measure responsible for the financial panics which periodically sweep around the world. They purpose to give silver a fixed value. This, they argue, will tend toward stopping the panics.

ESTRADA SEIZES AMERICAN SHIPS

Explains Action Was to Prevent Carrying Supplies to Zelaya.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New Orleans, La., Nov. 17.—Confirmation of the report that American vessels have been captured by revolutionists at Greytown, Nicaragua, was received today in a cable message to Consul General Sequiera, representing the provisional government set up by Estrada at the inception of the outbreak against President Zelaya.

In the cable message all vessels are warned to keep away from the Nicaraguan port, which is now in the hands of Zelaya's forces. A large force of revolutionists under General Chamorro hold a well fortified position on the beach near the city, according to the message.

The cablegram says: "Estrada is taking this action, seizing American ships, to prevent supplies from being taken to Greytown. He regrets such action, but it is necessary."

It is reported that many of the government soldiers are ill and in poor physical condition as a result of the forced marches they have undergone through the swamps.

A dispatch received here from Zelaya declares that Chamorro was beaten in an engagement at Greytown and that his troops are in retreat.
