Case of Schuylerman Set.—The case of John L. Schuylerman in the justice court has been set for next week, when a hearing of the charges made by United Wireless representatives will be held. Schuylerman is charged with having received mail belonging to the rival concern, which offense, if proved is a simple misdemeanor under the Oregon law. Mr. Schuylerman arrived from eastern Oregon yesterday to look after his defense. It is alleged by Mr. Schuylerman that the mail received was sent in response to his paid advertisements and that he will be able to clear himself easily at the hearing. The case is the outcome of bitter rivalry between representatives of the Clark Wireless company and the United Wireless agents for business in the northwest. The published statement that he was arrested on a charge of libel was an error.

Womelsdorf Sentenced.—Because he assisted the officers in recovering the plunder and testified against his confederate in crime, John Womelsdorf was permitted to plead guilty to a charge of grand larceny yesterday afternoon and was sentenced to 18 months in the penitentiary by Presiding Judge Bronaugh in the circuit court. He had previously pleaded guilty to highway robbery, for which the penalty is from 10 years to life. But Thomas O'Rourke, against whom Womelsdorf testified, was found guilty of the reduced charge of robbery not being armed and sentenced to three years. Deputy District Attorney Page told the court that it would be unjust under these circumstances to sentence Womelsdorf under his original plea when his unrepentant partner in crime was given such a light sentence.

Lectures on Judea.—Rev. E. Nelson, pastor of the Hawthorne park Presbyterian church, will begin his second series of Sunday evening stereopticon lectures next Sunday at 7:30. The title of this series is "Among the Judean Hills," and the first lecture will be "A Journey to the Little Town of Bethlehem." The other lectures are, November 28, "Visiting Hebron and the Cave of Machpelah"; December 5, "Going Down to Modern Jericho"; December 12, "By the Jordan, the Dead sea and Back to Jerusalem." Dr. Allen recently spent five months in the Orient, and most of the views used were secured on his tour. He visited Egypt, Syria, Palestine, the Holy Land and returned through Europe. Still another series of lectures will follow this one after a short interval.

Cough Brings Suicide.—Harry A. Horn, laborer 35 years, blew out his own brains yesterday in a rooming house at 414 Third street. Despondency over sickness is considered the cause. He came from the State of Kansas, where his sister, Mrs. Nevada Forgeson, lives. The man left a note, book, showing he was gradually becoming weaker, and the day before his suicide wrote that he kept continually coughing, and if he did not feel better the next day, he would take his life. A pistol was found beside the man's body. In his pocket was found \$7 and the notebook. This book showed he caught cold, and the next day, the notation stated, it was worse. The following day found it still worse with a cough, which increased each day.

Makes Many Charges.—Kicked, her hair pulled, dishes thrown at her, choked, shot at and beaten, Mrs. Ivy M. Pepe has decided that married life is too strenuous. A complaint alleging all these things has been filed in the circuit court against Joseph H. Pepe, from whom she desires a divorce. She recites a long list of abuse and says her husband has spent his own and her earnings for liquor. She asks for the custody of the four children and for \$30 a month alimony. They were married in Los Angeles in November, 1902. Desertion is the allegation on which Georgia Allen is seeking release from Fred Allen, to whom she was married at Gray's River, Wash., in 1904. She says he left her in May, 1906.

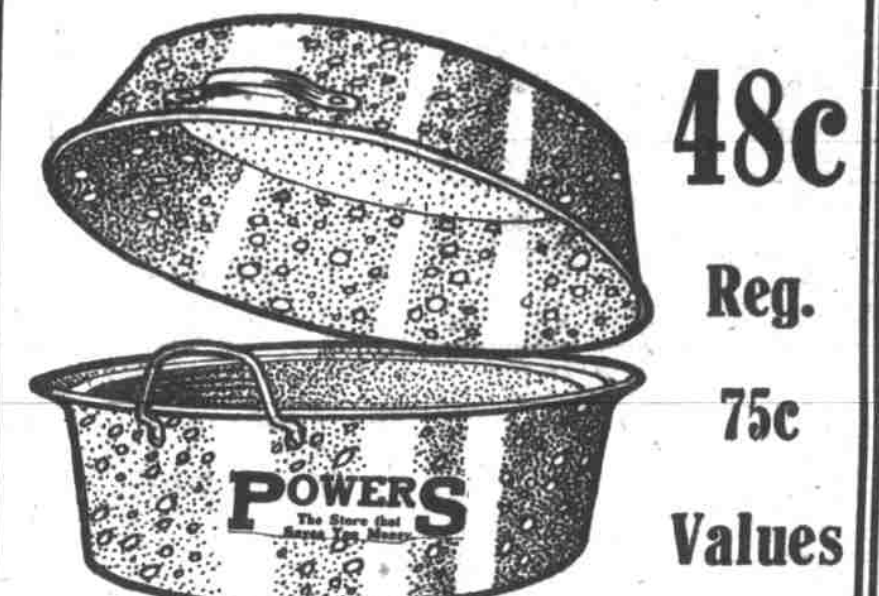
