SOUTHERN OREGON'S PIONEER HOP HOUSE



(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., Nov. 20.—The first hop drying kiln in Josephine county was built on Rogue river, six miles below Grants Pass, in 1883. The house has been owned since 1883 by the Ransan

family. Standing on the roof of this pioneer house, one can count 10 large hop houses, all well filled. The picture reproduced above was taken in 1883, during the first season the house was used. On the platform stand Henry Schleigh, foreman of the hop yard, and Samuel Bond; on the stairway Mrs. Schleigh and her sister are seen. The original hopyard in southern Oregon consisted of only a few acres. Now hundreds of acres of the choicest hop lands surround the place.
