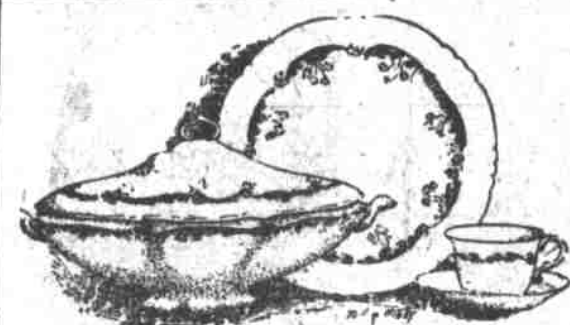

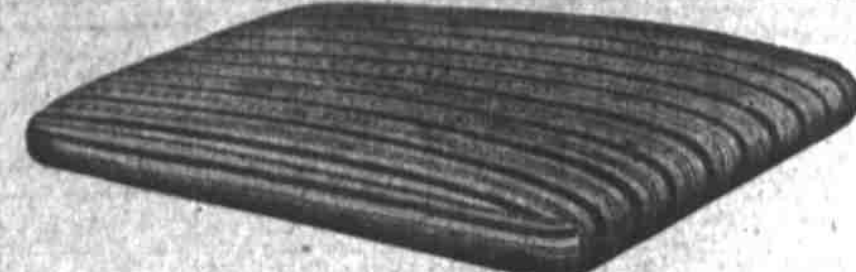

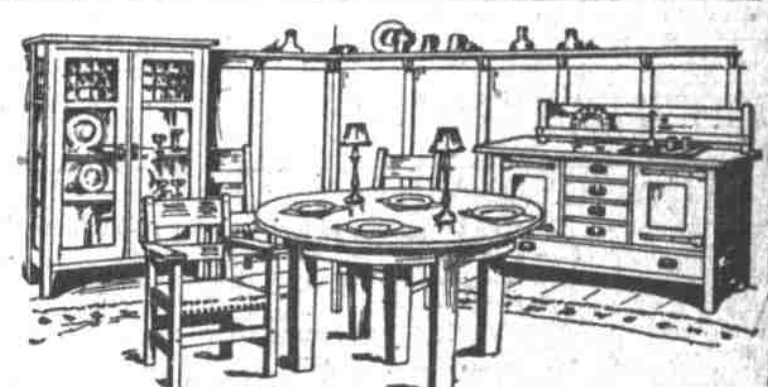

COMPETING FOR LIGHT CONTRACT

Gas and Electric Companies Anxious for Business on East Side.

Both lighting corporations of this city want the contract for illuminating the business streets of the east side. Following a petition to the mayor asking that a former petition to veto an ordinance be disregarded because the petition that competition was given to the taxpayers, but after the Portland Railway, Light & Power company had agreed to furnish the service for \$1 a month per pole, another petition was circulated to compel the first to be considered. It was believed that no cheaper rate could be had.

CHAUFFEUR CONSCIOUS FOR A FEW MINUTES

Albert E. Mitchell, the chauffeur who has been in an unconscious state ever since being hurt in an accident on the Base Line road a week ago yesterday, in which his machine struck a buggy turning it completely over, regained consciousness for a short time yesterday and today was much better. This is the first change yet noted in the injured chauffeur's condition.

Within the next few days, however, Dr. A. W. Moore, who is attending him, hopes to have him transferred to his home. He was conscious for some time this morning, yet was unable to

remember anything concerning the accident a week ago. His mind seems a blank concerning all the details and it seems probable that the public will have to do without his version of the accident. The details furnished by the two young women in the machine and by the occupants of the buggy while conflicting at times furnish a fairly straight account of the accident. The grand jury will, however, in all probability, try to find out whether or not the party had been drinking previous to the accident.
