Sues Bloch for Damages.—Following up two court victories, Mrs. Elizabeth McFarland has begun suit in the circuit court for \$20,000 damages against M. M. Bloch for causing her arrest on a larceny charge. Mrs. McFarland found Bloch's wallet in the courthouse corridor last summer and held it until Bloch offered a reward of \$100 for its return. When Bloch learned who had the wallet he caused her arrest on a larceny charge. She was acquitted and then, returning the wallet, sued Bloch for the \$100 reward. Judge Morrow heard the case and gave judgment for the plaintiff. This case is now pending on appeal.

Death of Miss Turner.—Miss Tilley Turner, a recent arrival from Cleveland, Ohio, died at her home at 720 E. 10th, about 7 o'clock last night after a week's illness from pneumonia. Accompanied by her mother and a younger sister, she came here from Cleveland five weeks ago and immediately entered the employ of Marshall-Wells hardware company. She contracted a bad cold last Monday, which soon turned into pneumonia and she passed away last night. Miss Turner had made an unusually large number of friends during the short time in the city. Funeral announcement will be made later.

Liquor Measure Laid Over.—Councilman Cellars proposed ordinance, which is designed to govern the liquor traffic absolutely, was again laid over for two weeks by the liquor license committee, which met yesterday afternoon in the city hall. Cellars is fighting hard for his ordinance. He has brought it up every time he has had a chance to get it discussed. Councilman Belding is fighting the ordinance, which not only prohibits women in saloons, but is aimed to do away with the alleged restaurants where liquor is served.

Republican Club Smokes.—The Union Republican club has issued invitations to a smoker to be held tomorrow evening in the Bell-Hirsch hall at 3 o'clock. The purpose of the smoker is to boost the "assembly plan," it being announced on the invitations sent out that "there is going to be a Republican Assembly in Oregon." The invitations were sent out by Max G. Cohen, secretary of the club, who is to be investigated by the grievance committee of the Oregon Bar association for possible disbarment.

Memorial Services Held.—Memorial services in honor of the Manchester martyrs, Allen, Larkin and O'Brien, were held last night under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians at the Woodmen of the World hall. The hall was crowded and many were compelled to stand. The readings and music were all Irish in their character. The meeting was presided over by B. H. Deery and the address was given by Frank J. Collier. An informal meeting followed the regular program.

Divorce Case Postponed.—The divorce case of Luella C. Parrish against Edward B. Parrish, which was continued from yesterday because a brother of Judge Gantenbein, to whom the case was assigned for trial, was a witness in the case, has again been continued, this time until January 13. Judge Bronaugh took this action after ruling out certain depositions filed in behalf of Mrs. Parrish. The continuance will give time in which to file new depositions.

Sellwood Commercial Club.—January 1 has been set as the tentative date for the opening of the Sellwood Commercial club. The building on Umstilla near Thirteenth street is rapidly nearing completion, and it is believed will be ready for occupancy a few weeks prior to that date. This will leave time for the furnishing of the building and a grand opening with a banquet for all the members of the club will likely be held on New Year's day.

Permanents at Sellwood.—Sellwood may be the next center to petition for a hard surface paving district, according to the views of a number of prominent citizens of that suburb. Now that the water, gas and sewer pipes have all been laid the people feel that they are ready for cement sidewalks and hard surface pavements, and a number of them will likely be petitioned for next summer.
