

MAYOR WILL APPROVE AT ONCE

New Milk Ordinance Assured and Inspectors Will Be Appointed at Meeting in December—Veterinary Tests.

Mayor Simon announced this morning that his approval of the pure milk ordinance adopted by the council yesterday, will be immediate. A meeting of the city board of health on the first of December will result in the appointment of three milk inspectors provided for by the ordinance. The council, at its next meeting, will be called upon to set aside a fund to pay the salaries of these inspectors.

The auditor's office will be provided with blank license applications which the dairymen must fill out and sign before he will receive his license. The satisfactory filling out of this blank with his signature attached will be evidence that the dairymen has complied with all the provisions of the new ordinance.

These acts performed at once are the first entailed by the operation of the ordinance. The provisions of the ordinance for recognizing and utilizing the benefits derived from the operation of state law multiplies the power of the city to regulate its milk supply some 12 times more than under the old law. At the same time the scheme for a reasonable division of work between city and state and federal agencies, makes it essential that each agency should perform to the full its particular duty.

The city is afforded the protection given it by three inspectors working under the city board of health and the health officer. These will be qualified veterinarians who will be employed for periods of four months. At the end of four months' work, if their service is satisfactory, they will be reemployed for another four months, and so continued as long as their services are satisfactory and necessary to the board of health.

In addition, the city will be given the protection of inspectors from the bureau of animal industry, who, working under the state board of health, will make the tests for tuberculosis which the new ordinance makes necessary. Dr. S. W. McClure, head of the bureau in Oregon, has announced in recent letters to Dr. Robert C. Yenney, state health officer, that he can put half a dozen men into the field at once, and that tests can nearly all be made by July 1, 1910.

Not least among the protective agencies will be the office of dairy commissioner in whom is vested authority for dairy regulation beyond the city limits. This office has attached to it three inspectors in addition to the commissioner.

If the Consumers' league speedily carries out its plans for certifying to milk from dairies considered worthy of certification as determined by a veterinarian and clerical supervisor, to be appointed through an arrangement between the league and the dairymen, it will mean that where Portland had one milk inspector there will be a dozen and all supervisory organizations will at the same time be more active than ever before.

NEW BROGAN BANK IS INCORPORATED

cut and internal injuries were apparent. Mrs. Billings was carried into a millinery store on the corner and later placed in the taxicab and taken to her home, where she has been attended by Drs. Rockey, McKay and Sabin. Upon examination it was found that at least two of her ribs had been broken and that severe sprains had been sustained. The doctors have not yet been able to tell whether any other serious internal injuries were inflicted, but the condition of the aged victim is serious. While hope is held out for her recovery, it has been announced that the injuries may prove fatal. Mrs. Billings is suffering in

tense agony this morning, and it is thought not unlikely that complications may arise from the broken rib which has pierced her lungs.

George W. Billings, husband of the injured woman, is greatly agitated over the accident. Mrs. Billings' age is against a complete recovery. The doctors in attendance have not yet informed Billings of their opinion.

Mysterious "Doctor" Appears.
"We have had considerable trouble with the doctors," said Mr. Billings this morning. "After the accident a physician came here with a man who, I think, was Jack Manning, manager of the Portland Textile company. The physician examined Mrs. Billings and said he would come back in the morning, but he did not. We waited and grew impatient, but the doctor did not come. Finally, we called up the number he gave us and it was a harness shop or saddlery establishment of some kind."

"I asked the man, who I have been told was Manning, for the name of the driver of the machine. He refused to give it to me, saying he did not know. I was told that he had the names of several eye-witnesses to the accident, but he refused to give them to me. 'People who have talked with some of the witnesses told me that night that there was no excuse for the accident, but I was too excited at the time to ask who the witnesses were.'"

"They said Mrs. Billings was crossing the street when, without warning, she was suddenly struck by the auto and thrown to the pavement."

"The cab ran completely over her, and then the chauffeur seemed to lose his head, for he backed the car over her body. Mrs. Billings is bruised from head to foot, and she has been moaning in her suffering ever since the accident."

Manager Jack Manning said this morning that he knew nothing of the accident further than that he had heard it occurred. The driver's name was Scheeler, he said, but he did not know his initials. Upon inquiry it was found that a man named Scheeler is employed as a driver by the company, but he could not be found this morning, as he had not yet reported for work, being on the night shift.

KREISLER'S RECITAL ATTRACTS CRITICS

Kreisler has been engaged by Louis Stassen, Yarnum concert, to give a violin concert at the Bangs hall, Thursday, December 2. The sale of seats will open Tuesday, November 26.

FATAL COLLISION IN WASHINGTON

Three Trainmen Killed at Lind—Engineer's Disobedience Alleged.

Spokane, Nov. 25.—Disobedience of orders by Engineer Norvalle of the Northern Pacific, in charge of a helper engine operating between Cunningham and Lind, Wash., is declared by Northern Pacific officials to be responsible for the death of three trainmen and the injury of Mail Clerk H. J. Adams, his own fireman and two passengers, whose names have not yet been learned, at Lind, Wash., late last night.

A collision between Great Northern passenger train No. 4, running from Seattle over the Northern Pacific, and a light helper engine came as the result of Norvalle's alleged disobedience.

The dead are:
Engineer L. Reaman.
Fireman Jacob Spangler.
Engineer Taylor, acting as pilot on the passenger engine.

They were employees of the Great Northern, with the exception of Taylor, who was a pilot for the Northern Pacific but was making the run on the Great Northern train between Seattle and Spokane. Mail Clerk Adams was hurled against the mail sacks and slightly injured.

Chief Clerk Walker of the Northern Pacific declared this morning that Norvalle had orders not to leave the Lind yards until the passenger train arrived, but that despite his orders he pulled out and was on the grade nearly two miles when he collided with the passenger train coming down the grade at good speed.

IMPROVING ROADS OF BAKER AND VICINITY

Baker, Or., Nov. 25.—The county has a number of road overseers at work with men and teams graveling certain sections of the county highways. West of the city Henry Kennison is making a road that is believed when completed will be able to stand any test of moisture. After crowning it with the road grader the gravel is being added, making a surface that will, when packed, give long and valued service without further attention.

In connection with the road department the county court has recently purchased a roller to be operated by gasoline power and this machine will be for use in different parts of the county. The advantage of using a roller is so apparent that the court decided the purchase of one was an addition to the equipment that could not be dispensed with.

The installation of corrugated iron culverts continues and those that have been tested have given such universal satisfaction that in all probability the time is at hand when little else will be used.

BROKER DAVIDOR FACES CHARGES

Portland Real Estate Promoter Being Investigated by the Authorities.

H. V. Davidor, real estate broker with offices in the Wells Fargo building, who for years has been investigated regularly by the state and federal authorities, is again under the spotlight.

Davidor, as head of the Pacific Northwest Realty associates, is now under investigation by the United States federal grand jury, on a charge of swindling hundreds of Montana and Idaho residents. Witnesses from all parts of the two states are testifying against him.

Under the name of the Pacific Northwest Realty Associates, Davidor advertised Oregon farm lands for sale. Another of his corporations was the Pacific Valley Fruit & Land company. Under his contracts purchasers of land, in event of failure to promptly pay installments, suffered forfeiture of contract, and loss of money paid in.

According to the authorities, Davidor, when selling the land, misrepresented its location and value. Many purchasers, learning they had been fooled, withheld payment, suffering loss of money already paid in.

Though investigated innumerable times by the authorities, Davidor has heretofore escaped prosecution. Coincident with the grand jury investigation, Davidor was yesterday made defendant in Multnomah circuit court, in a damage action, being charged with swindling.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL IN EAGLE VALLEY

Richland, Or., Nov. 25.—Within the next year Richland will have a high school with the regular four year course of instruction and operated under the union high school law passed by the last Legislature and the district will be composed of the six public school districts of Eagle valley. While the matter cannot be voted upon until the regular school election next June, there is practically no opposition in the matter and the citizens of Richland have gone so far as to contract for two acres of land for a building site which will be donated to the high school district. Preliminary plans for the building are being made. It will probably be of stone and will cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000. At present the nearest high school to Richland is at Baker City, 20 miles away.
