Notes for Commission.—Because of alleged failure to pay commission and to allow him to collect accrued interest on two promissory notes, Frederick A. Joslin has begun suit in the circuit court against Horatio Jones Green and C. J. Reed for \$391. He says he was employed to secure a purchaser for two notes of \$5000 and a mortgage securing them at the price of \$19750, and was promised the difference between the value of the notes and the sale price. He secured a Mr. McGinn, who says, who purchased the notes and was also willing to pay \$141 accrued interest, but Green and Reed refused to receive more than \$10,000 for the notes. He sues for this interest and for the difference between the face of the notes and the selling price.

Methodist Ministers' Convention.—Between 40 and 50 Methodist ministers will attend the annual district convention of the Portland district of the Methodist Episcopal church in Taylor street church Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. Morning, afternoon and evening sessions will be held, the sessions will be in the nature of a conference with business and educational topics coming before the assembly. In the evening an Epworth league rally will be held. Luncheon is to be served Sunday day by the Ladies' Aid society, of which Mrs. Sam Connell is the president. The program of the meeting will be out Saturday.

Sue to Recover on Bond.—James Dowd and Kate Dowd, executor and executrix of the will of James Barry, have begun suit in the circuit court against the American Surety company of New York to collect \$3425 alleged to be due under a bond given in 1907. During Barry's lifetime the Pence company was suit to condemn a right of way through his land for a flume. Instead of trying the case out in court, arbitration was agreed upon and the arbitrators awarded Barry \$3,425. The American Surety company filed a bond to protect Barry against the suit, and it is alleged that nothing has been paid. Barry died in September, 1907.

President Kerr Honored.—President W. T. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college was last night elected president of the Cornell University Alumni association at a meeting held immediately following the annual banquet of the association at the University club. Vernon Gilbert was elected secretary, and A. B. Blausen the vice president of the association. The members will likely attend the football game today as the guests of President Kerr.

Girl Alleges Mistreatment.—J. J. Whitla, a young man 32 years old, is being held in the city jail upon complaint of Emily Johnson 717 Kerby street, who charges that Monday evening he met her while at a moving picture show and compelled her to accompany him to a place where she was mistreated. The girl is 20 years old, and has been suffering from fever. The matter has been taken up by the district attorney. Whitla denies knowing the girl.

Estate Is Death Claim.—County Judge Webster has appointed Matilda Hohenltnr as administratrix of the estate of her husband, Bernard Hohenltnr. The latter was killed on June 25, while in the employ of the Southern Pacific, and his estate consists of a death claim for \$7500 against the railroad. The widow and her four children live at 1115 East Third street.

Williamson, secretary of the state board of horticulture, will speak at the meeting of the Oregon Apple Growers' association in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium next Saturday evening. SALOONS TO CLOSE AT MIDNIGHT SATURDAY

Chief of Police Cox has given orders to close all saloons at midnight on Saturdays. This is a new move on the part of the police department, as heretofore the saloons have been allowed to remain open until 1 o'clock Sunday morning.

The order is the outcome of a recent conviction in municipal court of L. Della Silva, saloonkeeper at 309 Grand avenue. He was assessed a fine of \$10 for having his place open Sunday morning at 12:15 o'clock. The order from the chief is as follows:

To captains of police: Instruct the officers of your reliefs to notify all saloonkeepers and keepers of other places not exempted by law where liquor is kept for retail, that beginning with Saturday, November 27, 1909, all such places must be closed at 12 o'clock midnight instead of 1 a. m. Sunday, as heretofore. Officers must be diligent and careful in this matter, and see that all parties to whom this order applies are given the instructions set forth herein. A. M.
