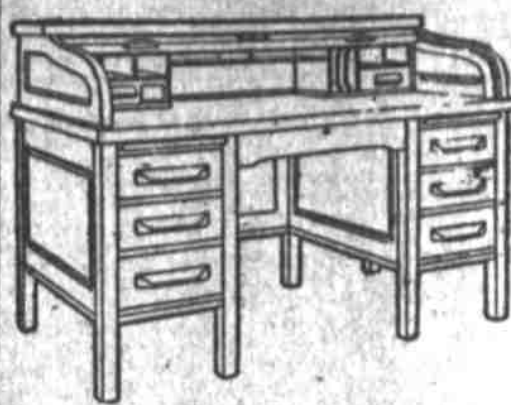

CITY BEAUTIFUL PLANS MATURING

A meeting of the city beautiful committee has been announced for tomorrow afternoon. At this time the contract with E. H. Bennett for one year's services in formulating a definite plan for the construction of Greater Portland will be closed.

By the terms of a tentative agreement already entered into Mr. Bennett, who is of E. H. Burnham & Co., Chicago municipal architect, will begin his work in Portland during February and will reside here 12 months considering plans of practical city construction as related to Portland. At the same time Mr. Bennett will have made available for his use here all the data and working force of the Chicago office. The establishment of the \$25,000 fund necessary to secure Mr. Bennett's services was announced yesterday.

Negotiations which have been under way for some time seeking the signing of a contract between the Portland Rose Festival association and the Clatsop County Scottish pipe band of Toronto, Can., will undoubtedly be closed within the next few days. Should this contract be signed it will bring to Portland during festival week one of the most famous bands in America.

The signing of the Clatsop County Scottish pipe band is expected to bring a great deal of pleasure to Portland people. The band was heard at the Seattle A-Y-P exposition this summer and gave great delight at each entertainment. The band consisted then of 25 pieces, and will be augmented further before coming to Portland.

The signing of the contract with this eminent band is a part of the general plan of the Rose Festival association for the entertaining of the visitors in the city during festival week. It is estimated that several bands are to be stationed in different parts of the city during the

times that the parades are not in progress, so that every section of the city will receive benefit from the festival. Concerts are to be made a feature of the festival, and it will require the services of a great number of musicians, both professional and amateur, to attend to this feature.
