**LACEY WORKED PORTLAND, TOO**

Many Residents Remember Smooth Talker From Australia.

E. W. Lacey, who recently disappeared from Oakland, Cal., after working a number of prominent residents of

that city for various sums of money on the strength of an alleged \$500,000 inheritance from Australia, played a star engagement of the character in Portland two years ago, the difference being that he cut a much wider swath here than he seems to have done in Oakland.

Lacey came to Portland with all kinds of letters of recommendation and endorsement, which he lost no time in presenting to anybody from whom he thought a small loan might be secured. And before he decamped, six weeks later, he succeeded in gathering in various sums from \$1 to \$29 amounting in all to about \$1000.

Among the Portland victims of the oily tongued Mr. Lacey was Captain Patrick Bruhn, who was at that time

captain of detectives in the police department, and who it is said lost a considerable sum. J. Hennessy Murphy was among his first victims in Portland, the lawyer being out numerous small loans. Another of Lacey's victims was a well known hotel proprietor who lost more than \$100 on the strength of promised large returns to be paid when the first installment of the legacy arrived from Australia. Some of Lacey's Portland victims say that he put up a talk that it was almost impossible to get away from and that his smooth ways, together with the fine letters of introduction and endorsement that he carried, aided him in fleeing men that were believed to be proof against almost any kind of a bunko game.

Letter From Consul.

When Lacey first appeared in Portland he showed what purported to be a letter from the American consul at Adelaide, Australia, saying that an uncle of Lacey's had just died there leaving a fortune of nearly \$1,000,000, one half of which was willed to his American nephew. Next he presented a letter from the British vice consul at Tacoma identifying him as the E. W. Lacey who had fallen heir to the Australian fortune. The fellow also had strong letters of recommendation purporting to have been written by Calisto

the priests in Montana and Idaho. A peculiar feature of the fellow's methods was the fact that all of his letters of recommendation as well as those from the American consul at Adelaide and the British vice consul at Tacoma, were written on the letter heads of those from whom they were supposed to have come.

One Friend Charmed.

One of Lacey's Portland victims was so charmed with the prospect of a trip to Europe which was promised him when the legacy was received that he supplied his new found friend and prospective benefactor with money up to the very day of his disappearance. "Lacey was one of the brightest fellows I ever met," said J. Hennessy Murphy, "and won his way into the hearts and pocket books of scores of Portland people. In fact a good portion of the town was in holiday attire in expectation of the arrival of the first installment of Lacey's legacy. He promised everybody big returns on the loans he secured, and strange to say he had everybody believing in him."

THOMAS D. SMITH WELL KNOWN HERE

Thomas D. Smith, who was reported in the dispatches yesterday from Washington, as having perfected a valveless pump, which to a great extent would revolutionize irrigation methods, is well known here, where he lived up to two years ago, when he went to Washington city to perfect his pump and secure a patent on it.

"I have no doubt Smith has a valuable patent," said Alex. Sweek, who has acted as his attorney in the matter, "and I am confident that he will succeed in building a factory in Portland for the manufacture of valveless pumps. That was his intention and backing to put it through."

Mr. Sweek also says that Smith has interested holders of large bodies of land in southern Oregon which he proposes to reclaim by irrigation, using his valveless pump in the project.

DAKOTA BLIZZARD REPORTED ABATING

NOCHOCHOOSON DESCHUTES ROAD

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Laidlaw, Or., Dec. 6.—For several days past a representative of the O. R. & N. company has been at Clatsop Falls, a small town about eight miles north of here, looking over the power site at the falls there. It is understood the O. R. & N. company is looking over this proposition with a view to acquiring ownership of the property and falls.

Clatsop Falls is one of the great water powers of the upper Deschutes. Because of negotiations that have been carried on relative to other water power on the Deschutes river, the opinion that the Deschutes railroad into central Oregon will be electrified, gains ground.
