

SALEM TRES OF IMPURE MILK

Mayor to Draft Ordinance to Provide for Municipal Inspection of Dairies—Bailley's Inspection Insufficient, Says Mayor.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Dec. 8.—After an inspection of the dairies in and about Salem, Mayor Rodgers has concluded that the state inspection under State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey is insufficient and that the city should inspect its own milk supply if it is to be assured that the residents of Salem are to have a pure supply. An ordinance will be drafted by the mayor and introduced at once providing for municipal inspection of all dairies selling milk in the capital city.

In company with Stock Inspector Dr. Keeler an inspection of the dairies was made yesterday by the mayor. The dairies were found to be in a fair condition, still the mayor thinks there is plenty of ground for improvement.

Each of the state institutions at Salem maintains its own dairy. These are carefully inspected by the state, not by the state food and dairy inspector, however. The superintendent of the asylum inspects his own dairy and sees that it is kept in a sanitary condition as also do the superintendents at the feeble minded institute, reformatory school, penitentiary and other institutions. The danger of infection to the milk supply of the state's 2000 wards is thereby greatly minimized.

The people of Salem have no such safeguards and the mayor says that if the milk supply of Salem is to be kept pure the city must inspect its dairies just as the state institutions do, independently of the state dairy and food commissioner's office.

The situation at Greytown is reported to be little changed today. General Toledo's Zelayan forces retired into the city after a fight in which they were reported to have been worsted yesterday.

General Chamorro's blockade of the Zelayans is generally effective, and the rebel leader is reported to be in command of the situation.

Mexico City, Dec. 8.—An unconfirmed dispatch from Managua, Nicaragua, says General Vasquez was tried by court-martial today and condemned to death because he was defeated by the insurgents in yesterday's battle near Rama. The news of Vasquez's defeat, the dispatch stated, precipitated a demonstration against Zelaya in Managua.

CITY ELECTIONS IN NORTHWEST

Sheridan, Or., Dec. 8.—With four tickets in the field in the municipal election held here yesterday, that headed by H. H. Winslow for mayor and J. R. Mendenhall for recorder was elected by a large plurality. The balance of the ticket elected was O. D. Hamstreet, treasurer; J. C. Ellis, marshal; C. T. Dougherty, councilman First ward; Dr. S. A. Mulky and C. O. Shumway, councilmen Second ward.

This is the third term for Mayor Winslow. It was under his administration that the new \$50,000 water system was undertaken and completed, the new sewer system given to the city and the substantial street improvements made, and the progressive voters showed their appreciation of his efforts by giving him a large majority over all.

Mixed Ticket at Prosser.

Prosser, Wash., Dec. 8.—At the municipal election held here today the following were elected: Mayor, E. W. R. Taylor, Democrat, by 5 majority; councilmen First ward, A. J. Merrifield and E. C. Houston, Republican; councilmen Second ward, E. J. Miller and T. E. Brockhausen, Republican; councilmen Third ward, D. C. Hanson, Democrat, Morris Henry, Republican; councilman at large, Willis Mercer, Republican, by 19 majority; city treasurer, Earl Harper, Democrat; city clerk, E. A. Coffman, Republican; city attorney, Miriam Dustin, Democrat. The principal fight centered on Mayor Taylor, Democrat, defeating Jenkins, Republican, by only five votes.

Three Tickets at Junction City.

Junction City, Or., Dec. 8.—At the city election held here Monday there were three tickets in the field. The citizens' ticket, headed by C. F. Hurlburt for mayor, was successful in electing their entire ticket.

The vote for mayor stood: C. F. Hurlburt, 43; Dr. W. W. Hicks, 21; C. Scheidt, 14.

The following councilmen were elected: J. R. Hill, J. M. Cook, Dr. L. H. Lehrbach and J. W. Kirk. Dr. D. E. Ruff for recorder, and F. W. Moorhead for city treasurer.

Voters Lax at Hillsboro.

Hillsboro, Or., Dec. 8.—The city election here Monday was allowed to go almost by default, but 79 votes being cast out of a possible 300. A charter amendment was adopted allowing an additional issue of \$50,000 to take up the water indebtedness of the city. But one ticket was in the field, headed by Dr. A. B. Bailey for mayor. C. Heim, Robert Harriman and W. W. Boscow were elected councilmen, Benton Bowman recorder and F. J. Sewell treasurer.

Light Vote at Oakland.

Oakland, Or., Dec. 8.—A light vote was cast at the annual municipal election here Monday, the only contests being for mayor and one councilman. The following were elected: Mayor, Dr. R. E. Hunt; councilmen, Phil Beckley, J. H. Grubbe, W. O. Bridges, George Stevens; for treasurer, C. H. Medley; recorder, E. M. Brooks; marshal, E. W. Wallace. This is the straight citizen ticket which was nominated by the business men last week.

South Bend "Progressives" Win.

South Bend, Or., Dec. 8.—The city election yesterday resulted in the election of the entire progressive ticket, headed by George R. Carter for mayor. There was only one ticket, but an attempt was made to defeat John T. Welsh for city attorney by the use of stickers with the name of H. W. B. Hewen. Welsh won by a substantial majority.

Result at Canby.

Canby, Or., Dec. 8.—The following were elected on the Citizens' ticket at the city election held Monday: Dr. H. A. Dedman, mayor; L. D. Walker, treasurer; Councilmen—W. H. Bair, H. W. Evans, A. H. Knight, O. R. Mack. The question of stock running at large was voted down and out by a good majority and the proposed \$10,000 water bonds were lost by a small vote.

"Drys" Win at Mabton, Wash.

teachers is wrong; its precepts are idiotic. Dr. Chapman related that many of the farmer's troubles arise from a disposition to do no work and his inability to find some one who would work for him. Whether the "saloons make young men lazy or whether the lazy young men make the saloons," he was undecided.

The magnitude of the prune industry was brought home to those who listened to J. T. Brumfield's address on "The Prune Industry From the Packers' Standpoint."

Standpoint. The crop of the northwest last year, said Mr. Brumfield, was 30,000,000 pounds. Twenty-five per cent of the crop was purchased by New Yorkers. These, with the Bostonians and the Philadelphians, are the greatest prune consumers in the world, while in the Dakotas and the south scarcely any prunes are used.

Destroy French Prunes.
Mr. Brumfield advised the fruit growers to destroy from the earth the French prunes, because of its smallness. J. H. Rees recommended that all small prunes be fed to hogs and not sold to packers at all.

The morning session closed with the adoption of new by-laws, under which the society will be governed henceforth in harmony with its recent formal incorporation. Resolutions of gratitude for courtesies shown by Meier & Frank, by contributors, the Portland Commercial club, by the press, by the speakers and by the president were enthusiastically adopted.

The two coming events which attract the interest of the fruit growers are the address of President Kerr of Oregon Agricultural college scheduled for this afternoon, and the reception tendered the fruit growers and dairymen by the Commercial club tomorrow evening.

Science Plays Part.
How science makes apples smooth and luscious, how science makes vegetables sound and productive, how science is coming to rule the agricultural world, was the revelation attending yesterday's sessions of the State Horticultural society. Ferd Groner of Hillsboro and Thomas Prince of Dundee, expressed new ideas in walnut culture in interesting papers. Professor Arthur G. Bouquet of Oregon Agricultural college, made it clear the market gardening is rapidly becoming in this modern day as exact a science as are the rows in which vegetables are planted, straight. Better sales arrangements between producer and purchaser were urged by this speaker. This includes the instrument of modern success, advertising.

The history of the Oregon State Board of Agriculture was briefly detailed by W. K. Newell, president of the board. W. K. Newell organized in 1889 more pests than fruit were found in the majority of the orchards. It became apparent as the address proceeded that Oregon has

no proper right to boast natural immunity from pests, but that hard and careful and scientific work is responsible for progress and improvement. Contrasting eastern orchards with those of the west, it also becomes apparent, Mr. Groner averred, that cultivation of orchards here is a fundamental contribution to the success of the fruit growing industry.

Lecture on Pests.
Dean A. B. Cordley of the Agricultural college lectured to a large audience on "Apple Scab and Its Control." Dean Cordley advocated above all others the use of lime sulphur, 110 pounds of sulphur to 60 of lime, diluted 30 to 1. This should be used first when the blossoms are in bud, and a third time two weeks later. Dean Cordley and Mr. Newell are both strong advocates of rigid law enforcement to prevent spreading of scab.

Shakeup Coming in Ohio State House.

Columbus, Dec. 8.—An investigation of graft alleged to have existed in several departments of the state government which may implicate many former state officials has been instituted by Governor Harmon. The revelations that are promised threaten to shake the entire state.

Attorney General Denman has filed suits to compel the Federal Union Surety company of Indianapolis to "make good" on the state money deposited by State Treasurer W. S. McKinnon in the defunct Euclid Avenue bank of Cleveland. The Indianapolis concern was a surety on the bond of the Euclid Avenue bank, and the attorney general is said to be in possession of evidence to the effect that the former treasurers deposited public funds there and pocketed the interest. Experts are examining the books of the several banks by order of the governor, to ascertain which funds were loaned by former treasurers before the enactment of the depository law of 1904. He proposes to sue to recover payment for all such funds, and it is stated that suits will be filed against living ex-treasurers, the estate of treasurers deceased, and banks said to have profited by the use of state money.

The Cincinnati bank of "Boss" George B. Cox has been inspected. Governor Harmon is trying to gain access to the books of the Union National bank of this city. The bank has refused to permit his experts to examine its records. Treasurer Gramer has withdrawn \$86,000 of state funds on deposit at the Union bank because of the refusal.

County Assessors Assemble at Salem.

Salem, Or., Dec. 8.—All the county assessors in the state are in Salem today submitting themselves to a grilling fire of questions by the state board of equalization as to their methods of assessing the property in their respective counties.
