

MURDERER IN OTTO'S WISHES

Otto Schumann, Sr., However, Is Yet to Be Won Over.

Otto Schumann Jr., son of Otto Schumann the well known marble worker of this city, Mrs. George S. Hall of 522 1/2 First street, sweetheart of Otto Jr. and Mrs. Otto Schumann Sr., have again demonstrated the truth of the old adage that the course of true love has many bumps in it.

This demonstration began in Portland last Friday when Otto Jr. and Mrs. Hall missed the steamer Rose City and had to take a train to Astoria to catch up. It continued when Mrs. Schumann boarded the Shasta Limited Saturday afternoon and hastened to San Francisco to intercept the youthful elopement.

Tragedy entered when the son refused and the mother had the pair locked up by the police. The live-happily-ever-after stage came yesterday, when Mrs. Schumann took a second look at the girl in the April and corridor light of the jail, saw the love light gleaming in her eyes, transferred her hug from the son to the prospective daughter-in-law and kissed her on both cheeks. Then the prison gates swung outward and the sun began to shine again on Cupid's drooping wings.

Up in Portland, however, it is still stormy. Otto Schumann Sr. has not relented and threatens to deny his home to the youthful Romeo when he hits the home trail again.

Young Schumann, who is 25 years of age, and Mrs. Hall, who is 24, have been sweethearts for the past seven years. Mrs. Hall is well known in Portland, her name being Pearl Webster before her marriage. She was married to George S. Hall, who came from Denver, in February, 1907. In March of that year Hall paid a visit to Denver, leaving his bride behind. He returned in April and lived with her until July of that same year, when he left and has not since been heard of directly. It is said that during the time he lived with Mrs. Hall he failed to support her, leaving his departure to her mother at 522 1/2 First street. Mrs. Hall has not secured a divorce from her husband, but says that Hall, who is an ad writer in Denver, has agreed to secure a divorce.

Young Schumann apparently has been much bothered with love affairs. He was in the United States navy for a time and deserted to follow a woman with whom he became infatuated.

Through the efforts of his father he was gotten out of this scrape and came home to reside. Since that time he has been employed as a machinist in the city, and is rated as one of the best workmen in the business.

NORWEGIAN POET NEAR DEATH'S DOOR

Paris, Dec. 8.—Bjornstjerne Bjornson, the famous Norwegian poet, playwright and publicist, entered upon his eightieth year today, having been born in Osterdalen, Norway, December 8, 1832. The poet is now in Paris, whither he was brought from his home in Norway, in the hope that an operation might afford relief from the complication of ailments from which he has suffered for several years. His present condition is regarded as critical in the extreme. The physicians, in fact, hold out no hope that he will ever be able to leave his bed, and in view of his age it is not believed that he can long survive.

SULTAN'S PAWN TICKET IS LOST

And the Dear Old Fellow's Jewels Are in an Awful Tangle.

Paris, Dec. 8.—With scores of jewel collectors anxious to bid for the handsome crown of the crown collection of the deposed Sultan Abdul Aziz of Morocco, and Abdul himself greatly concerned as to the safety of his treasures, which he pawned, a peculiar tangle has resulted here following the loss of the pawn ticket issued by the government brokers.

El Mokri, Paris representative of the Moroccan government, yesterday attended the auction at which the unredeemed royal jewels were to be sold. Many diamond merchants of Paris, Berlin, Amsterdam and London were present.

When it was discovered that the Moroccan had lost the ticket the merchants demanded that the jewels be auctioned immediately. The judge, however, postponed the sale for one month.

Savage Troops Fight on Review at Los Angeles

Regiments of Two Warring Tribesmen Give Correct Imitation.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, Dec. 8.—Scores of Moroccan soldiers were killed early today during a military review by the sultan, according to a dispatch received from Fez.

Two regiments recruited from warring desert tribes, the message stated, savagely attacked one another directly in front of the sultan's reviewing stand. Religious fanaticism is reported to have caused the fight.

ELECTION RESULTS AT BELLINGHAM

(United Press Leased Wire.) Bellingham, Wash., Dec. 8.—In a neck and neck three-cornered race here yesterday, J. P. DeMatto, Republican, was reelected to the office of mayor over S. E. Mullin, Democrat, and W. A. Martin, candidate of the Citizens' Independent league, which stood for the commission form of government.

A fourth candidate was William Waynick, Socialist. DeMatto polled only a little more than one third of the total vote. The entire Republican ticket was named, as follows:

Henry J. Korthauer, comptroller; T. L. McFadden, city attorney; reelected; F. L. Oslager, treasurer; reelected; J. A. Martz, councilman at large; George A. Henson, J. F. Miller and C. S. Beard, councilmen. The total was 3074 votes, which was less than the registration by 1000.

Out of six proposed amendments to the charter, all were lost but those providing for the initiative and referendum and for the leasing of water front streets. The citizens decided to purchase for \$12,000 the Whitcomb Falls park site, but voted down three other proposals entailing expenditures of funds.

In the elections in the country towns, Ferndale went wet by the election of John Wilson as mayor. Lynden went dry with George W. Hall as mayor. At Blaine John P. Hyde, dry, Republican, won the mayoralty. In Skagit county the wets won at Burlington and at Sedro-Wholey, where the burning question was whether cows should run at large, the cows won, with C. F. Bingham as mayor.

MILWAUKIE WILL IMPROVE STREETS

In a quiet election, the city of Milwaukee Monday adopted the measures brought before the people through an initiative petition calling for the selling of bonds for the improving of Milwaukee's streets and putting in sewers and also the measure annexing Scott's addition to the city. The measures giving the common council the right to make a special road levy not to exceed 3 of 1 per cent, to amend the charter regarding public notices and changing qualifications of voters from a residence of six months to three, were also carried.

For quietness the city election was in contrast to the stormy mayoralty election held in Milwaukee last year.

In the new city council will be Charles Storkson, John R. Kelso, they having defeated M. Bonficht and R. H. McIntyre. Storkson's victory was the most decisive. He carrying his ward by a majority of 42 votes. Kelso's majority was 18. A. H. Dowling was elected city recorder to succeed himself without opposition. J. Wetzel was elected treasurer under the same circumstances with a vote of 89. Charles Kellogg was elected marshal 50 votes to the good over R. L. Large. The votes on the initiative measures were as follows:

For the bond issue, 85; against the bond issue, 13; for the annexation of Scott's addition, 95; against the proposed annexation, 4.

PENILESS WOMAN WALKS FOR 3 DAYS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., Dec. 8.—After traveling afoot for three days, from Grants Pass to Glendale, Mrs. Helen Slater, an aged lady from Troy, N. Y., was brought to Roseburg today from that city. She is peniless, and was taken charge of by the county until her sister in Cincinnati can be heard from.

Mrs. Slater journeyed from Troy to San Francisco, where she expected to meet her sister, but upon her arrival there she was disappointed, her sister having moved to Cincinnati. With what money she had left, coupled with earnings made while in San Francisco, she started for that city. When she got to Grants Pass her money gave out, and she resorted to the last resource of traveling afoot. After walking for three days she reached Glendale, at which place the authorities intervened, refusing to allow her to travel in that fashion. County Judge Wanscott will care for her until her sister can be heard from.

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SAN FRANCISCO WORKS FOR FAIR

"Pacific Ocean Exposition Company" Has Matters in Charge.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 8.—Backed by practically every business and professional man in the city, aided by every commercial organization and guaranteed the necessary financial support, the promoters of the proposed Panama-Pacific exposition will begin at once to raise the necessary funds for holding the big fair here in 1915, to commemorate the opening of the Panama canal.

The proposition was made by Homer S. King, former president of the Bank of California, and of Pacific Ocean Exposition company, at a meeting of 500 merchants, and in a few minutes the plans were under way.

A committee consisting, in addition to Homer S. King, of James McNab, president of the chamber of commerce; James Rolph, Jr., president of the Merchants exchange; Andrew M. Davis, president of the Merchants association; C. C. Moore, who was the Portola commission to Europe, and R. B. Hale, was appointed to begin the work of organization.

No subscriptions have been taken as yet, although several merchants have volunteered to contribute funds.

Reelected Mayor Stands for High License and the Laws Enforced.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Dec. 8.—All doubt as to the reelection of Mayor George Alexander, the Good Government league candidate for mayor, over George Smith, the Republican organization candidate, was removed today when complete returns from 194 precincts out of a total of 200 gave Alexander a majority of 2723 votes over Smith. With only six precincts to hear from shortly before noon, the count stood: Alexander 18,865, Smith 16,142.

With the exception of Richmond Plant, candidate for the council, the entire Good Government ticket has apparently been elected. Henry Lyons, for the council, was the only Republican organization man elected, according to indications. The total vote cast was close to 40,000. It was the heaviest vote ever polled in a municipal election here.

The silent vote of the city is considered to be responsible for the defeat of Smith.

High License; Law Enforced.

Early today Mayor Alexander expressed himself as satisfied with the outcome of the election, and he pledged himself to carry out a policy of economy in municipal affairs.

The election of Alexander and the Good Government league council indicates that the citizens are in favor of a closed town policy, which is favored by the mayor.

Mayor Alexander made a statement today in connection with the license policy which he intends to follow. He said:

"This talk of a wide open town is a mean piece of business. The present administration has shown that Los Angeles was not a closed town. This city five years ago voted in favor of the license system, a well regulated license system, and that is what I shall attempt to carry out."

"I believe the better class of men in the liquor traffic will abide by this method, and only the low dives and places that sell contrary to law need have any fears."

HOOD RIVER WILL TRY STREET PAVING

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Dec. 8.—The city council at a meeting last night awarded G. W. Aldred a contract to macadamize one half mile of the city street, beginning at State street and running south on the main traveled road that leads out into the country. It is understood that the county will begin where the city ends and finish several miles of road with a uniform finish as soon as spring opens up. The contract price was \$10,000.

Split Ticket Chosen at Chehalis.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Dec. 8.—The annual city election in Chehalis attracted a large vote. There were two complete tickets in the field, the Citizens and the Republican. The Citizens' ticket running for city attorney on the Democratic ticket. The Citizens' ticket candidates for mayor, William West, treasurer, T. J. Allen, clerk, C. E. Frewitt, and councilman-at-large, Charles Walker, were elected. The Republican ticket candidates for councilmen, Charles Diekmann, W. C. Green and C. E. Corwin, for two years, and C. A. Studebaker, for attorney, were elected.

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NOBEL PRIZE FOR SIGNOR MARCONI

Professor Braun, Who Improved Wireless Telegraph, to Share Equally in Prize.

Stockholm, Dec. 8.—It is learned from a reliable source that the next Nobel prize for physics will be divided between Signor Marconi and Professor Ferdinand Karl Braun of Strasburg university. Official announcement of the awards for the year will be made by the Norwegian storting day after tomorrow. The honor will come to Signor Marconi, who is equally well known on both sides of the Atlantic, in recognition of his achievements with wireless telegraphy. Professor Braun is to share the honor, it is said, because of his invention of various improvements in the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy. No authoritative intimation has been given as to who is to receive the peace prize or the annual awards for literature, medicine or chemistry.

The Nobel prizes, numbering five, of the average value of \$100,000 each, are given annually to those who have done the most useful work during the year in literature, physical science, chemistry, physiology or medicine, and for the propaganda of peace.

The Nobel foundation, which has the awards in charge, was established by the inventor of dynamite, the Swedish scientist, Alfred Bernhard Nobel, in a will which he made in 1895. The inventor's fortune of \$9,000,000 was devoted to capitalizing the prizes, and the administration of the foundation and awards of prizes are in the hands of the Swedish learned academies and, for the peace prize a committee of the Norwegian storting. The prizes were first awarded in 1901, the distribution taking place annually on December 10, the anniversary of Nobel's death.

The prizes may be divided and may be given to women. Mme. Curie being a former winner of the chemistry prize. In 1906 President Roosevelt was awarded the prize for the propaganda of peace in recognition of his efforts in bringing to a close the war between Russia and Japan.

ALLEGED BOOTLEGGERS ARRESTED AT EUGENE

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Dec. 8.—Harry Jackson, Harvey Jones and three other men designated as Richard Roe, John Doe and John Dick, their true names being unknown, were arrested yesterday charged with bootlegging. They were arraigned before Judge Bryson of the justice court, and each entered a plea of not guilty and their trial was set for Thursday forenoon at 9:30 o'clock. Their bail was fixed at \$250 each, but none of them is able to furnish it.

All of the men are laborers, and the three whose names are not given are transients, having recently come here. Jones has figured a number of times in police and justice court circles on various charges. The men are accused of selling liquor by the bottle on the streets, and they have no regular place of business.

These are the first arrests for liquor selling for several months, the practice having been pretty well stamped out by the vigorous prosecutions in the past.
