

WINDJAMMER HAS LUMBER ABOARD

British Bark Jordanhill Ready to Sail for London Friday.

CAPTAIN KENNEALY TO RETURN HERET TO LIVE

Owens Property in Portland and Will Probably Go Into Business Here— Likes Rose City Best of All Pacific Coast Ports.

Vessel Found to Be Uninjured



The British bark Gulf Stream, which went on the drydock Friday for a survey after going aground November 25 at the old Villard dock. She was found to be uninjured and will begin to load a cargo of lumber for Cape Town in a few days.

When the British bark Jordanhill sails for London at the end of this week she will carry 1,850,000 feet of Oregon fir to the British port, dispatched by the Pacific Export Lumber company. She finished loading at the Iman-Poulsen mills Saturday afternoon and will probably move down into the lower harbor this afternoon. She will remain in the lower harbor until about Friday before going to sea, as she will have to pick up a crew and her sails will have to be bent. Captain Kennealy does not apprehend any difficulty in securing a crew at the present time. Twenty sailors, a sailmaker and a carpenter will have to be secured for her, as all of the old crew have left the ship since she has been in port, with the exception of the six apprentices and the carpenter, who was paid off by Captain Kennealy on account of sickness. Captain Kennealy says that he and Mrs. Kennealy, who is accompanying him on this voyage, will return to Portland as soon as possible. He says that of all the ports on the Pacific coast he likes Portland the best and he is thinking of returning here to make the Rose City his home. The captain has invested in property here on his last two trips and he expects to come back and go into business. During his many trips to this port he has made many friends and that as well as the bright future which he believes is in store for Portland are the reasons that induce him to make it his home. The Jordanhill has been in port since October 7, arriving in ballast from Guaymas. She was the first of the spot ships to be taken for a lumber cargo this season.

CLEARING HARBOR OF SNAGS

Snagboat Mathioma Working Today at Request of Harbormaster.

Upon the request of Harbormaster Speyer, the United States engineering boat, Mathioma, was sent out this morning to remove some snags that were brought down into the harbor by the recent freshet. Two extremely large ones, which were a decided menace to navigation were taken out of the river between the Burnside and Morrison street bridges and others will be removed in different parts of the harbor during the day. By night Captain Speyer says the harbor will be well cleared of snags. The Mathioma will return to the government moorings as soon as the work is done.

FALCON CARRIES PRUNES

American-Hawaiian Steamer Sails With New York Cargo Tonight.

When she sails for San Francisco tonight, the American-Hawaiian steamer Falcon, Captain Schage, will take out a cargo of 500 tons of freight for New York, made up principally of oranges. A cargo of prunes is destined for Europe. She will also carry a cargo of flour for Honolulu. This is her second cargo made up almost entirely of prunes, as that was her freight on her last trip out.

STEAMER MASCOOT LEASED

Will Run in Place of Sunken Steamer Oregon.

On her first run in the service of the Oregon City Transportation company the steamer Mascot, in command of Captain Raabe, left the dock at the foot of Taylor street this morning at 6:45 o'clock, for Corvallis and upper river points. She has been leased from the Vancouver Transportation company to take the place of the Oregon, which was sunk by striking a snag in the upper river at Coffee Shute on the night

of December 8, until the latter is ready to go on the run again. The Mascot has been on the Lewis river until she was leased by the Oregon City Transportation company, and the steamer Undine has been put on the run in her place, having left for Lewis river points Saturday afternoon. She is in command of Captain McNeill, formerly master on the steamer Mascot. Barges have been placed on each side of the steamer Oregon and the work of raising her has commenced. As soon as she is floated she will be brought down to the Portland shipyards where she will be repaired preparatory to going on her run again.

M'LINDEN HELD TO GRAND JURY

Must Answer to Charge of Murdering His Brother.

Owne McLinden, 398 Constance street, charged in municipal court with murder of the first degree, was held to the grand jury this morning after a preliminary hearing. He is accused of striking his brother, James McLinden, over the head with a picket. The brother died several hours after the fight. The original report was given out that he had died from heart trouble, superinduced by excitement in the fight. This was the physician's statement. District Attorney Cameron filed the charge against McLinden, after the grand jury had sent two officers to investigate the case, and who reported that no evidence could be obtained directly connecting Owne with the cause of death. Fred Scheldeman, the closest neighbor of the McLindens, testified this morning that he saw the two brothers fight. Owne is held without bail.

BANK RECORD IS VERY HEALTHY

State Bank Examiner Steel Compiles Figures Showing Great Increase in Money.

According to the condensed abstract prepared by State Bank Examiner James Steel comparing the condition of

all the banks in Oregon, both state and national, at the close of business, November 15, 1909, with that of November 27, 1908, an increase of 21 per cent in loans and discounts and individual deposits, the two most important items, is noted for 1909. The total loans and discounts of all the banks in the state at the present time are \$62,127,946.78, and one year ago the total was \$51,492,253.72, showing an increase of \$10,635,693.06. In the item of individual deposits the gain this year over last reaches the enormous total of \$16,102,510.01, the total deposits now in the banks being \$90,948,745.72, as against \$74,846,235.71. In the matter of cash on hand there is an increase of \$466,787.77; added to this is an increase of \$4,759,095.04 in the amount due from reserve banks,

which is usually regarded by bankers as a part of their cash assets. In the total resources of all the banks in the state there is shown an increase of \$11,374,598.47, the total resources for 1909, being \$137,638,348.28 compared with \$126,263,749.81 in 1908. Without exception the decreases noted in the report of the bank examiner are evidences of healthier financial conditions and relate to such items as state and United States deposits, bonds to secure circulation, bills payable and expense account. FARMERS USE PHONE: ROUNDUP BLACK BEAR Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Dec. 13.—By using

the telephone farmers of Asylum township, near here, were able to kill a 300-pound black bear, one of several which had been raiding the farms of late. The bear was seen in the lower part of the township and as he moved away the news was sent miles around to the farmers by the phone. Past as he fled, he could not beat the telephone. As he made for the hills he found scores of farmers, boys and dogs hunting for him. He made for the river, but was overtaken and surrounded close to the ferry and killed. The farmers will use the telephone to give warning of other bears and expect to exterminate all in that section this season. Several large land sales have been made lately near Ashland.
