MANY LUMBER BOATS BUSY

Eight of Them Now Bound for the Columbia River.

Smaller sailing craft, such as schoon ers and barisentines, of which there were several idle in Astoria at this time last year, are practically all busy now and at the present time there are eight of these craft enroute to the Columbia river for lumber cargoes. The majority of them are engaged in the coastwise trade, which is particularly brisk now. Tonnage of this description now en-route and listed for the Columbia river argregates 4652 tons, with a total lum-ber carrying capacity of 6,700,000 fest, I'wo schooners are already in the river loading lumber. They are the Mable Gale, at Prescott, and the W. F. Jewett. at Linnton. The enrouts list of schoon-ers and barkentines, which have already. salled, are: American barkentine Arago, schooner Andy Mahoney, from San Francisco, November 27; schsoner King Cy-rus, from Guaymas, December 1; schooner Forester, from San Francisco, No-vember 22, and reported outside Decem-ber 10, but probably blown off shore



Mr. Ellis says that his method of pro codure will be to introduce a separate ordinance for each different street to be vacated and in this manner each, item will be given particular and spe-cial attention and decided on its merits. In this way also, some technicality that might arise as against the street vaca-tion will not pply to another. It is also believed that once the

streets are vacated it will be possible for the city to grant the privilege on every third street to private owners for a sum sufficient to constru lic docks on the other streets.


Wants to Save Rent Money.
