NOTORIOUS SALOON MAN TURNED DOWN

The first of a number of special meetings for the purpose of considering applications for liquor and restaurant liquor licenses was held yesterday afternoon, when 419 applications were received. Less than half of these were passed upon by the committee at yesterday's session. By unanimous vote the members recommended the rejection of an application made by the notorious Tony Arnold for a license to run a saloon at Fourth and Davis streets. No other requests were turned down yesterday, but it is expected that a number of applications for restaurant liquor licenses will be refused.

Simpson Elected Mayor. (Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Dec. 15.—The blowing of all the factory and mill whistles in North Bend last night announced the election as mayor of L. J. Simpson of the Simpson Lumber company. He was opposed by A. W. Meyers and won by a majority of 165. A. H. Derbyshire was elected city recorder and J. W. Gardiner was elected treasurer. The councilmen chosen were Jacobson, McDaniel and Storm, all supporters of Simpson. Simpson has been mayor since North Bend was founded.

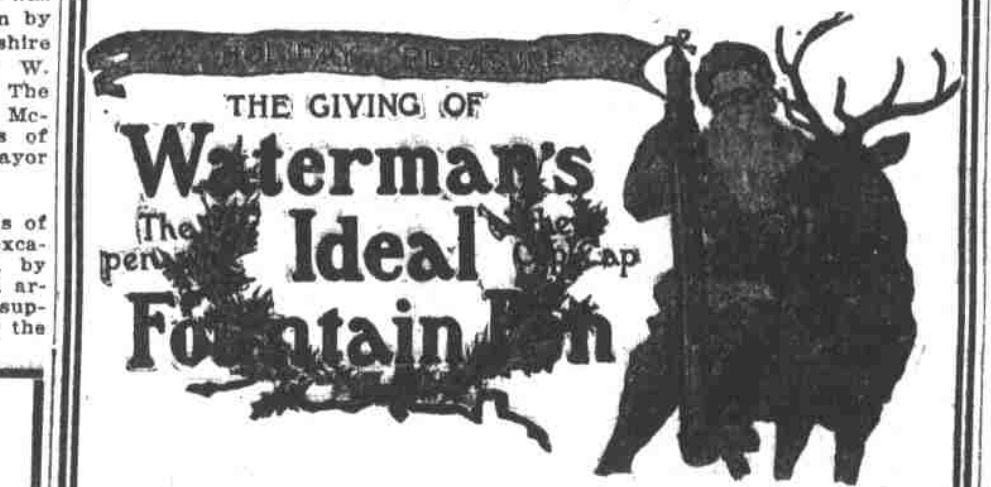
