

STAMPED TO DANGER HELD TO HER BREAST DANGER OF ESTRADA

One of Women in Divorce Court Makes Charges Against Husband.

Zelaya's Forces, It Is Rumored, About to Combine With Revolutionists—Dictator Blames Uncle Sam for His Downfall.

Washington, Dec. 17.—Representative Zelaya of New York today introduced a resolution directing the administration to recognize Estrada as the president of Nicaragua, and notify him that the United States demands the punishment of former President Zelaya.

Managua, Nicaragua, Dec. 17.—It was announced here today that President Zelaya sent the following to President Taft last night:

"On December 14 I cabled to Washington this message:
"Secretary Knox—I believe that the interests of your information and the United States send a commission of investigation. If its findings show my administration to be detrimental to Central America I will resign."
"I have received no reply. To avoid harm to my country and desiring that it shall renew friendly relations with the United States, I have today sent my resignation to congress. As my opponents consider my presence a disturbing factor, I propose to show my good faith by leaving Nicaragua. I stand ready to account for my action."

New Orleans, Dec. 17.—Following the resignation of President Zelaya of Nicaragua, it was reported in Managua today that General Vasquez, leader of the Zelayan troops near Rama, will surrender. It is also rumored that the Zelayan and the revolutionary armies would combine to support Estrada for the presidency. It is being whispered today that Nicaragua will become the pioneer equal suffrage nation of the world. The provisional president is reported to be a warm supporter of votes for women and it is said he has declared that women will be enfranchised should he become Nicaragua's chief executive.

Managua, Nicaragua, Dec. 17.—It was stated unofficially today that Provisional President Estrada and his chief lieutenant, General Chamorro, have agreed with General Vasquez and General Toledo, the Zelayan leaders, that there shall be no fighting at Bluefields. It was reported that the American government had been notified of the intention to keep the city outside the fighting zone.

The situation at Rama is unchanged. There is much speculation concerning the probable successor of President Zelaya. Dr. Madrid's supporters have developed unexpected strength, but the conservative element is trying by every means to persuade him to withdraw, as it is generally believed his appointment by congress would result in the continuance of the revolution.

If the revolutionists are successful in naming the new president an effort will be made to confiscate a portion of Zelaya's enormous holdings.

Zelaya refuses to discuss his resignation, beyond declaring "It was best for the country." He bitterly condemns the United States for interference here.

AUTO TOLL ROAD ON CALIFORNIA BEACH

Santa Barbara, Cal., Dec. 17.—A plan to construct an automobile toll road from this city to Ventura was made public today. A meeting with a committee of business men and the supervisors of Ventura for the purpose of discussing the scheme has been called for next week.

The movement is backed by four well known local capitalists, S. P. Underhill, J. F. Coker, J. R. Fitch and H. J. Donaldson, who have agreed to organize a stock company and attend to the necessary contracts.

It is expected that construction will start as soon as the franchise is secured from the Ventura county authorities. The road will skirt the beach most of the way, and will be practically level the entire distance. The estimated cost is \$200,000.

WOMEN READY TO STAND TO TRIAL Saves Money TO ENFORCE MILK LAW

Wounds Holdup Man Who Is Suspected of Many Robberies.

Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Snead Will Not Oppose Extradition to New Jersey—Both Say They Have Nothing to Fear.

New York, Dec. 17.—Mrs. Caroline W. Martin and Mrs. Mary Snead, mother and aunt, respectively, of Mrs. Okey Snead, the young woman found dead in a bathtub in an East Orange, N. J., house, who are accused of being responsible for the girl's death, today announced that they would not oppose extradition to New Jersey. Both say they have nothing to fear.

The authorities detailed to unravel the tangled skein of mystery surrounding the death of the unfortunate woman declared Mrs. Okey Snead was "hypnotized to death." The police allege that the mother and the two aunts, Mrs. Snead and Miss Virginia Wardlaw, used mesmeric influence to suggest self-destruction to the girl, whose life is said to have been insured in their favor.

Raking over past records the police learned that John D. W. Snead, a cousin of Mrs. Okey Snead, died in much the same manner, and it has since been given out from police headquarters that he, too, was insured in favor of the three old women.

The Wardlaw and Snead families, now so prominently before the public eye because of the recent alleged murder in New York of Mrs. Okey Wardlaw Martin Snead, are southerners, born and reared in Georgia.

Of aristocratic birth, with a long line of illustrious ancestors, the chafed against the quiet, commonplace life that fell to their lot as the wife and daughters of a plain Methodist minister. His appointments did not meet the requirements and aspirations of at least the eldest daughter, Caroline, now Mrs. Martin, so at the age of 18 she left the parental roof for the home of an uncle in Brooklyn, where she prepared herself to teach in the public schools of that city.

Falling to stand the required examination and determine that she would not return to the humdrum existence of her home, she sought a place as maid in a wealthy family of Brooklyn.

She Disappears.
Her refined manners soon disclosed to the family that she was no ordinary servant, and on being approached as to her reasons for this disguise, she mysteriously disappeared.

Returning to her uncle's home, she continued her studies, and finally obtained a teacher's position in a fashionable school in New York. Here she spent several years, but the slowest of which she accumulated money was a constant irritation to her restless nature.

"For daily cakes, not daily bread, she prayed," was once said of her, and this has been verified in her many plans.

Meets the Vanderbilts.
In some way she once obtained an invitation to a large reception given by one of the Vanderbilts. Beautifully gowned she swept through the rooms, her charm of manner and voice attracting attention, until she was heard the question, "Who is she?"

Her attractions, however, did not bring to her feet the sons of her hostess, though she later met and married Robert Martin, a man of some prominence in the business world.

Mrs. Martin's influence over her family has ever been strange, unaccountable. They bend to her every wish as though they were under her hypnotic spell.

Over her sister, Mrs. Snead's, sons her influence was also that of a hypnotist. The insurance of the life of Fletcher, the eldest, should not pass out of the family, she arranged a marriage between him and her daughter Okey.

Two of the Snead brothers met untimely deaths—one a suicide, and the other burned to death, whether by accident is not known.

Virginia Wardlaw, accused of the murder of her niece, has taught in schools in Murfreesboro and Nashville, Tenn. She emanates from her, as from the other members of the family, an air of secrecy, and one is kept wondering what there is back of it all.

Mystery shrouds the family, brilliant cultured, well fitted to shine in the most exclusive circles, they have drawn within themselves, almost apart from the world, until this sad tragedy has awakened horrors and speculations as to the perpetrator of the crime.

When it comes to resisting a holdup man, Vincenzo Vonomo, an Italian saloonkeeper at Front and Clay streets, deserves a medal. The highwayman is laying on a cot in the St. Vincent hospital with his face and body peppered with bullet holes, and has been identified as the man who held up the Royal cafe at Tenth and Everett streets. Vonomo is uninjured.

The holdup man, who gave his name as William Mitchell, came to the corner, looked up and down the streets, crossed over to where the two Italians were standing, advanced directly in front of Vonomo, and pulled a pistol in his face.

Mitchell commanded the saloonkeeper to throw up his hands and when Vonomo did not obey, began to fire.

The holdup man fired three shots, when Vonomo, grappled with him and the saloonkeeper fell underneath. Mitchell handed his revolver to the saloonkeeper, who began to fire into the man on top of him. Five shots took effect, and the holdup man rolled off his victim, and attempted to make an escape. The two men held him until the police arrived. The man was hurt in the abdomen, one of the legs of the nose, another on the right side of the nose, and a bullet hole in each cheek. While he is in a dangerous condition, it is thought he will live. He refused to talk, but said last evening that he came from Kansas, and has been rooming at 121 First avenue south, Levee.

Vonomo had about \$80, and still had it in his pocket after the fight.

Mitchell is about 25 years old, and is thought to be the man who has terrorized the saloons for the past 10 days. Frank Lord of the Royal cafe, who was held up, saw the man this morning, and said it is the fellow who did the job.

System Will Help Farmers to Record.

Indications are that the short courses for farmers and teachers which will commence at the Oregon Agricultural college January 4, will be very well attended.

Underground Jap City at Seattle.

Seattle, Dec. 17.—That a Japanese underground city, similar to that made San Francisco's Chinatown famous before the fire of April 18, 1906, has been operating for some time in this city, was the discovery made by the present grand jury, called by the superior court to look into charges of municipal corruption made recently.

The jury invaded the underworld today, traveled into basements, opened heavily barred doors, went through passageways as dark and tortuous as those found in San Francisco, and found every evidence of the widespread beneath the surface gambling that has long been suspected.

Entrance was usually gained through the imposing shop of a supposedly respectable Japanese. From the back of the store a long flight of stairs led to a room where the prospective player was scrutinized by a guard stationed on the other side of the barred door. Another inspection followed later, and then the player was conducted in darkness through a passageway, up a winding flight of stairs and finally to the gambling tables in a way that took him again beneath the surface.

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Portland Assured of Pure Product Through Big Conference to Be Held Here by City, State and Federal Officials.

Health officials of the city, state and government will meet next week to confer together how to provide the people of Portland with clean milk by enforcing the pure milk ordinance. Tuesday has been set as the day for the conference.

Dr. S. W. McClure, representing the government in tuberculin tests of dairy cows, has advocated the utility of such a conference, and it was enforced enthusiastically by Mayor Simon, Dr. Yenney, state health officer, Dr. Alan Welch Smith, president of the city board of health, and others. It will be remembered that the new ordinance provides for the services of the United States bureau of animal industry, the state dairy and food commission, the state board of health, in addition to the health agencies represented by the city board of health and the health officer. The ordinance was so framed that a cooperative working agreement might be established between agencies which had hitherto been working independently of each other, and not always harmoniously at that. It was believed that all the forces combined would establish for Portland people a protection against bad milk and would be so prohibitive of lax milk supply regulation that the impure milk grievances and dangers of the city would be forever disposed of.

Certificate of Inspection Necessary.
A certificate of inspection from the state dairy and food commissioner was made a prerequisite to the issuance of a city license. To conform with this regulation the dairy commissioner sent deputy to make inspections. This deputy, Paul Y. Davis, reported yesterday that he had been inspecting a great number of dairies in the vicinity of Portland, but that he had found only a few to which he could give certificates certifying to their sanitary conditions. All dairies to receive a certificate must receive a score of 60 points out of a possible 100. Most of the dairies fall below this score, and a number of them, the deputy commissioner says, will have to be closed, unless noxious he has given for radical improvements to be made within ten days, are completed with.

This report, somewhat different from the report made from the commissioner's office in the beginning of the agitation for pure milk that the dairies were good, showed activity in the enforcement of state law. It was stated from the commissioner's office, however, that preparations had been made to issue certificates of inspection to all dairies making the required score. The state board of health, which is to give a certificate that cows have been tested and found free from tuberculosis, has been preparing for this work by invoking the assistance of the bureau of animal industry.

Thousands Cows Tested.
Already 1,000 or more cows in the vicinity of Portland have been tested and the condition reported on. As the tests proceed and the inspectors go farther from the city less disease is found. The percentage of tubercular animals, Dr. McClure stated in a recent letter, has been reduced to 10 per cent and 30 per cent. These preparations for the accomplishments of actual service on the part of the government and state convince pure milk crusaders that delay on the part of the city in enforcing the fundamental provisions of the ordinance is unnecessary.

The new ordinance contained an emergency clause providing for its enforcement from the time it was signed by the mayor. This included the appointment of inspectors, three in number, who were to report regularly to the city board of health on the condition in which dairies were found. By oversight an additional ordinance covering the salaries of these inspectors was not passed at the time.

"I think we have no authority to appoint the inspectors until provision has been made for their salaries," said Mayor Simon this morning. "But," he added, "we do not for such a reason wish to let the impression gain circulation that we are without laws governing the milk supply. Such an impression would be extremely erroneous. As a matter of fact, our work in all lines, save those which are to be covered by revisions to the ordinance, which are purely routine and incidental in nature, is proceeding satisfactorily."

Much Work Done.
"We have come a long way, and we have done a great deal of work," said Dr. Robert C. Yenney, state health officer. "We have done a great deal more than we would have expected at the beginning of the fight. Now we must allow for the time always necessary in getting the machinery of the law adjusted and ready for operation. At the same time I consider positively that no unnecessary delays should be tolerated. The ordinance places in the hands of the city health officer for enforcement should be enforced, and we should always be looking and moving forward, never spending valuable time wondering if we can do a thing when we have been given the power and authority for its doing."

When the council meets next Wednesday.

day morning it is assured that provision will be made for the salaries of inspectors, and their appointments will be made at once. The change of license issuance from the auditor's office to the health office will also be made, and the wisdom of including the inspection of butter and cheese within the provisions of the ordinance will be discussed. Foundation work for law enforcement has largely been made, and will be finished by the time the council meets. Then the milk supply regulation machine will move.
