SUNDAY MAIL TO BE CARRIED TO OFFICES

In the hope that agents of all the large office buildings in Portland will make arrangements for the distribution of Sunday mail to tenants, and that efforts will be made to aid in facilitating the erection of the Broadway or any the handling of all mail, Postmaster John C. Young has addressed the following letter to representatives of all building companies owning office struc-tures in Portland:

"The tenants in your building can get their Sunday morning mail distributed to them with convenience to themselves and the postoffice by authorizing you or your representatives, in writing, receive such mail on Sundays at the postoffice from the carrier who serves

your building on week days.
"Another matter of the utmost importance to them is that they should deposit their mail in the chutes as soon it is stamped. If it is left as late as o'clock in the afternoon, they take s of having it delayed from 12 to 24 hours in dispatching. This is by reason of the fact that the bulk of the business mail is dumped upon the mail-ing division only a short time before outgoing trains begin to leave the depot. It was an-nounced that more than \$1800 had already been subscribed for this fund, and the association decided that at least \$2000 should be raised for the remunera-

tion of the attorneys to be employed.

A committee was appointed to wait upon the Port of Portland and ascertain whether that organization could not be induced to withdraw its objection to the construction of the Broadway bridge as planned, and concur in the recommenda-tions of the city executive board.
