The program opened with two of Tracey's boxers in a three round bout which was called a draw, between Kid Sullivan and Young McCoy. Both boxers will be better after a little more training.

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SUSPENSION FOR AMATEUR BOXERS

O'Brien, Lee, Clement and Anderson Are Athwart Athletic Union Rules.

Dan O'Brien, who is registered in the Pacific northwest association of the Amateur Athletic union, will be suspended for the part he took in the unsanctioned meet of the Tracey Athletic club last night.

The above is the dictum of T. Morris Dunne, secretary of the P. N. A., who has the power of fixing the time of suspension. Dunne says he has as yet given the matter no consideration, but will do so in the next two or three days.

Had Tracey made the necessary move to get the open meeting sanctioned, then all would have been rosy, but as it is a suspension is starting all his boxers in the face who belong to the club.

Last year Tracey tried to get his meet sanctioned but was turned down and this year he concluded to take the bit in his teeth and pass the athletic union up.

So far as O'Brien is concerned he will probably throw his shoulders back to a 45 degree angle, elevate his thumbs to both ears, gently wag his digits and give the union the loud hee-haw. He intends turning professional shortly at any rate and whether he is suspended or not will pay little heed to the athletic union.
