Jennings Lodge Woman Returns Home to Find 11-Months-Old Daughter Fatally Burned; Lives 2 Hours.

Jennings Lodge, Or., Dec. 21.—With her clothing burned from her body and her flesh terribly seared and a trail of fire following her across the floor, Roberta Crozier, the 11-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Crozier, was found by her mother too late to save the child's life.

BROKEN FEED PIPE IS CAUSE OF EPIDEMIC

Dr. Yenney Says He Has Repeatedly Warned City Against Supply.

Warnings that Salem water is highly dangerous have been going all unheeded from the state board of health to the Salem city officials during three long years, says Dr. Robert C. Yenney, state health officer. His statement is confirmed by Dr. Ralph C. Matson, bacteriologist to the state board of health, who said:

3 Years Ago I Examined the First Sample of Salem Water.

Three years ago I examined the first sample of Salem water. It contained colon bacilli. I warned against its use. It was shown that the feed pipe had broken in the slough and the people were drinking straight river water. Subsequent tests showed colon bacilli until a diver found the break, large enough to thrust his arm in, and made repairs. Then the colon bacilli disappeared.
