See Trades School Work—About 30 employers of skilled labor throughout the city, and representatives of the Foremen's association, visited the Trades school at Eleventh and Davis streets last night. The work of the night classes, which include nearly 200 workmen from the different factories, was inspected. The courses pursued in these classes are machine shop practice, pattern making, electrical construction, carpentry and mechanical and architectural drawing. The visitors were well pleased with the work that is being accomplished, and much was done to make closer the relation between the school and the shops where the school's graduates put their knowledge to some use.

Trees Have Canker—Portland shade trees are afflicted to an alarming extent by the canker and San Jose scale, according to County Fruit Inspector J. J. Stansbury. He is at present making an examination of the trees in the suburbs, and serving notices, as far as possible, on owners whose trees are infested by the pest. These notices are to the effect that if the work of exterminating the diseases is neglected it will have to be done by the county at the owner's expense. Mr. Stansbury says it will be much cheaper for everyone owning diseased trees if they do the work themselves and do it promptly.

Wife Afraid to Go Home—Frank Curtis, having apartments at the Beaver, Twelfth and Marshall streets, tore up his wife's new dress last evening. He was also accused of breaking up the furniture and making things generally unpleasant for Mrs. Curtis. The wife reported the matter to the police, and said she was afraid to go home. Curtis was arrested and held in the city jail over night, and placed before the municipal court this morning on a charge of being drunk. He said he had only taken three drinks. A fine of \$5 was given him.

Back to Prison Cell—Albert Saloni, a paroled convict from the Oregon state prison, was given a year in the county jail this morning in the municipal court. He was charged with taking the money and clothes of Manuel Silva. The two men have been working at the Mount Tabor reservoir, and came to town Saturday evening. Both stopped at the New House. Saloni got up at midnight, took the money and clothing and left the house. He was caught the next morning.

This is Noley Saloon—On a charge of allowing boisterous noises in his saloon, Samuel Trachel, 208 Yamhill street, was fined \$25 yesterday in the municipal court. He was also given a fine of \$10 for being drunk and disorderly. Complaint was made against his saloon by people living nearby. \$20,000 LIBRARY IS PLANNED AT ASTORIA

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., Dec. 22.—Arrangements are being made to accept the Carnegie library, offer, which provides for the construction of a \$20,000 building in case the city will guarantee a \$2000 maintenance fund annually. The present charter provides that no more than \$2000 per year be raised by taxation for library purposes. Mayor Smith favors a special election to amend the charter in this particular, so that the required amount of \$2000 could be raised. This would be the first addition to the library since the city was founded. The library \$1500 by a half mill tax, but can only pay over \$800 under the charter.
